


Charterhouse to Fargo River Festival Trail

1. Charterhouse Charterhouse is a medieval monastic house connected by acres of green space to Coventry's bustling urban community. To find out more follow the link <https://www.nationaltrust.org.uk/visit/warwickshire/coventry-charterhouse>



2. Charterhouse boundary wall The Charterhouse in Coventry features a well-preserved medieval boundary wall, designated as Grade II*. It is particularly notable for being one of the best-preserved examples of its kind in Coventry. The wall is constructed from ashlar stone and stands at a height of 3.5 meters (12 feet).

The wall forms part of the original monastic site, defining its perimeter. Excavations have revealed that the wall played a crucial role in separating individual monk's cells and their associated gardens within the monastic complex. It's also been noted that the wall was made of sandstone and faced with ashlar stone, according to Historic England.

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	3. Charterhouse precinct wall The outer precinct walls were built from 1400 onwards and have survived largely intact to this day extending to 400m in length. This is unusual with only one other Carthusian site, Mount Grace Priory within the North York Moors National Park, having substantial walls remaining." site, https://www.coventrysociety.org.uk/2021/06/11/restoration-of-charterhouse-walls-complete/
	4. Sluice gate You can still see what's left of one of the Sluice gate on River Sherbourne. The sluice was important during World War 2 in ensuring the river channel was well filled so that firefighters could fill their hoses from it. 	5. Part of the old medieval wall that surrounded the city A 638 year old badger pawprint was found on a excavation site here. Can you see any other animal tracks or signs? Use the guide to help you .If you google Coventry charterhouse a tale of two trenches you will find an article all about the excavations and what else they found.
	6. Mill Lane Originally called mill Lane due to the Mills on the river then changed to brick kiln Lane by the 1850s because of the brick works then changed again to Gulson to be named after the famous John gulson one of the philanthropist . 	7. Goose Ford The name Gosford is derived from Goose Ford .referring to the point where the river Sherbourne was crossed in early medieval times before any bridges were built . The Ford probably would have been broad and shallow to allow people , wagons and animals to wade across . This area would have been a wet meadow with willow, alder and Hazel we know this from pollen record's taken from an archeology dig. https://www.fargosfordstreet.com/yesterday/birth-of-a-street/
	8. Gosford gate The plaque faces the site of gosford gate. Constructed in the latter half of the 14th century. It overlooked the ancient crossing of the river Sherbourne, beyond which developed the medieval suburb of Far Gosford street .for more information on the gate follow this link https://www.historiccoventry.co.uk/wall/wall.php?pg=gulsonrd-gosfordgate
	9. Calcott Building The Calcott Bros moved to Gosford street in 1896. They built bikes then cars . They were then bought out by singer in 1926. Singer produced sewing machines then Ashley's took over the building and traded as rope, canvas and paint. Another true example of how Coventry changed to stay relevant. 	10. Burgage plots All medieval houses were built to same size frontage . If you were a burgess (registered citizen) of the city. This meant everyone had a frontage to trade from.
