Motorious NEW CounER

Edie sat down for a kōrero with Whaea Maraea at Ngāti Kotahitanga

It's a beautiful sunny afternoon and we can hear the laughter of tamariki out playing at lunchtime at Te Kura o Ngā Puna Waiora / Newtown School. Maraea Pukeke-Pine is one of the kaiako o Ngāti Kotahitanga, the Māori-medium education here at te kura.

Even though she was born in Pōneke, her whakapapa is elsewhere, Ngāti Tūwharetoa, Ngāti Kahungunu ki te Wairoa and Ngāti Pahauwera. "Wellington is a place I reside in. My whānau is my home and my whakapapa is my place of belonging - my turangawaewae". As an ex-student of Te Kura o Ngā Puna Waiora, she has now been working as a registered kaiako here for the past 8 years and was a teaching assistant and a Kaiārahi i te reo here for 7 years before that.

Ngāti Kotahitanga at the hīkoi

Maraea and her whānau have been living in Kāpiti for the past 7 years and she commutes to Newtown every school day, along the coastline. "Whānau is a massive part of my life. We have four tamariki, two of my own and two are an extra bonus on top of that." Her partner Peter is an outdoorsy, hunter-gatherer type, passing down knowledge to their kids. "The moana is a very grounding place for us, where we go to reset, reflect and feed ourselves."

The role of Kaiako Māori is massive. The mahi has many more responsibilities than that of English-medium teachers. Being a kapa haka tutor, speaking as tangata whenua on matters of Te Ao Māori, or ensuring that mana whenua are being acknowledged and represented - it's all important and is a lot of work on top of teaching. Their work is innately political, from a history of colonisation attempting to erase Te Reo Māori to modern day legislation - there is more pressure on kaiako to stand their ground when protecting and sharing their reo.

"That's why I became a kaiako, an educator, to pass down knowledge to our tamariki Māori and to share the reo that I have. I want to share that it's okay to be a learner of reo and to be humble with it. It's important to keep the doors open, especially to those who didn't get an opportunity to learn." Even though she's spoken Te Reo Māori all her life, Maraea still makes sure she is refreshing her reo.

Maraea shares a beautiful quote by Dame Whina Cooper, "Take care of our children. Take care of what they hear. Take care of what they see. For how the children grow, so will the shape of Aotearoa." She reflects, "I think of this quote and I think it sums it up when we are creating a better version of Aotearoa - this is what we want to do."

When she's not at school, Maraea enjoys playing cards with her kids and partner, going on a walk down to the beach, visiting whānau, thrift shopping and sometimes just sitting and chilling. She loves turning up the music singing at the top of her lungs. "I find it such a whakatau mauri, it resets my energy". Around Newtown, some of her favourite spots are Pranah and Cafe Laz for their yummy kai. She loves the pockets around Newtown that make sure Te Reo Māori is always being seen and heard, like the library, community centre and around the community.

Kõrero Hītori

Puke-ahu, meaning 'Hill Heaped up', is the Te Reo Māori name of Mt Cook, where the military barracks stood. On the opposite side of the swampy stream Waitangi, which ran down from near the foot of Puke-ahu and through the Basin Reserve to the sea, are the slopes of Kai-papa, where Government House now stands.

The high hill above the foreshore between Island Bay and Houghton Bay was named Uru Hau or 'windy head'. The traces of ancient earthworks can be seen to this day on these hill slopes. Kai-tawaro was the original name of Point Halswell and the vicinity. It was so named according to Te Whata Horo, after an ancestor of this name was killed and eaten by a shark near the point.

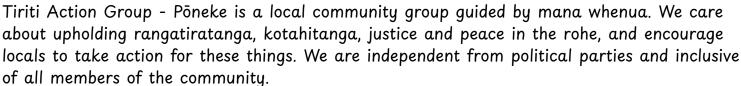

Introducing Tiriti Action Group Pōneke



You may have met our volunteers at the Newtown Markets, seen our posters and placards in the streets, joined us for DIY Sign making for Māori Wards, supporting Jack Keretai-Barrett when he arrived at Pāremete/Parliament to present a letter in support of Māori wards after cycling the motu to raise awareness, Marched with us during the National Hīkoi in November 2024, Listened to our kaikōrero and marched with us on Waitangi Day this year.



Our focus right now is on increasing voter enrolment for the upcoming local elections, campaigning to KEEP Māori wards in the referendum, and supporting mana whenua strategies and candidates standing for existing Māori wards seats. We think manaakitanga, kotahitanga and safety are important. Voting to KEEP Māori wards is how we open the door to decisions that put care for our people and environment at the forefront of local and regional decision making! Keeping Māori wards is one concrete action we can take to ensure our communities are connected & cohesive, resulting in better decisions and a democracy that fits all of us better.

Your pātai answered by Citizens Advice Bureau Te Pou Whakawhirinaki o Te Whanganui-a-Tara

Am I allowed to speak te reo Māori in Court?

Yes. Under the Māori Language Act, you have a right to speak in te reo Māori in a court or tribunal if you wish to. But you do not have the right to insist that everyone else in the hearing also speaks Māori.

If you are on one side or other in a court or tribunal case (for example, either the applicant or the respondent, in a civil case), you need to fill out a Notice of Intention to Speak Māori. In the form, you must state your iwi.

You can:

- download the form here (bit.ly/4mmZXfw), or
- pick up a printed copy at your local court or Community Law Centre.

You need to take or send the form to the court or tribunal you will be appearing in at least 10 working days before the hearing. You also need to give a copy of the Notice to the other side in the court or tribunal case.

If you do not give notice in time, you still have the right to speak te reo Māori, but it may take longer for the court to organise an interpreter.

If you will be speaking in court as a witness, the person you are the witness for must notify the court.

If you speak te reo Māori in court, an interpreter will repeat your words to the court in English. You will not have to pay for the interpreter's service.

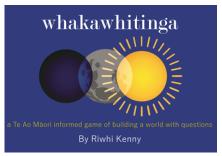

My incredibly talented friend, Riwhi Kenny is a prolific game writer who has made some absolutely breath-taking beautiful Te Ao Māori informed collaborative games.

Whakawhitinga is a world-building game for 2-5 players, which uses questions being asked and answered to develop a world. It uses the framework of a Māori creation history.



Earth Mother, Sky Father is a 2 player conversational game where you ask 7 questions back and forth, as these atua (Ranginui, the sky father, and Papatūānuku, the earth mother), exploring their relationship to each other, their children, and the world, following a series of branching paths, leading to many stories waiting to be told.

In 'It is a beautiful day on the marae and you are a baby pūkeko', you play as a baby pūkeko who lives on a marae. In this solo journaling game, a group of manuhiri are coming to the marae and will be going through a pōwhiri and you know you can help this process go even better! Play to improve the pōwhiri, find out what friends you have around the marae, which could be the nearby mountain, the deity of wind, parts of the marae itself, or more!

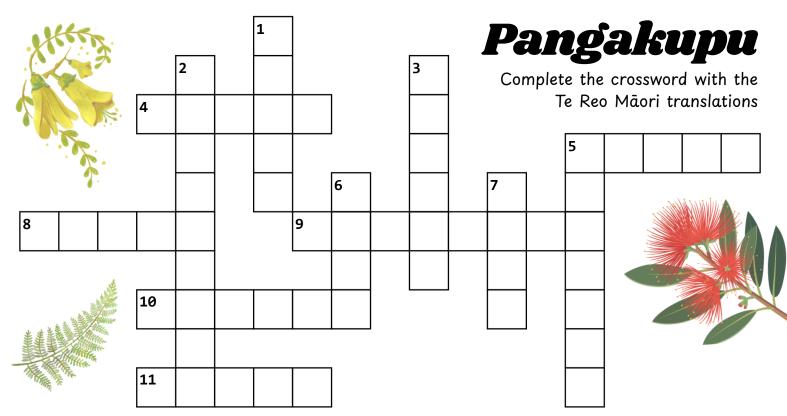
