

Econ621: Programming in Python 2025-2026

COURSE AIMS & OBJECTIVES, KEY SKILLS AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

Course Aims & Objectives: This course introduces programming in Python. It covers the basics of programming skills, including data types, variables, loops and functions. Further, the course covers common Python libraries and frameworks for data manipulation, visualisation, and machine learning.

Key Skills: By the end of this course, students should have some knowledge and understanding of:

- Python Proficiency: Mastery of Python programming for data science.
- Data Science Basics: Fundamental concepts and skills for data science in Python.
- Library Competence: Efficient use of key Python libraries for data science.
- Practical Application: Applying Python to real-world data science tasks.
- Versatile Python Use: Adapting Python for diverse data science applications.
- Effective Coding Practices: Writing efficient and effective Python code

Desired Outcomes: By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- Present, interpret and analyse information in numerical form and use econometric and other packages effectively;
- Master the programming tools and important libraries for data science.

COURSE STRUCTURE

Econ 621 is a 10 credits course and therefore students are expected to input approximately 100 hours of study into the course. The total number of contact hours on Econ 621 is 15 hours. This leaves 85 hours for private study. Course Delivery comes in the form of Lectures with 15 hours delivered over the first 3 weeks of the term (10 hours of lectures and 5 hours of tutorials). There will be optional clinics on the last day of the course.

During your private study you should strike a balance between reading the course material (which is the primary source of information) and the recommended textbooks, thinking critically about how these fit in to the body of knowledge on the subject and about how our level of knowledge can be improved, performing exercises, completing coursework and revising for examinations. You can expect to perform well on this course only if you work consistently through the year.

COURSEWORK ASSESSMENT

The CWA mark will be calculated as 100% coursework. The coursework will be assigned at the end of the course

The coursework will be delivered to students at the end of week 6 of each term and is due for submission at the end of week 10 of the term, allowing students 4 weeks for completion.

Coursework must be submitted electronically through the Moodle site for this course.

Students will undergo a 20-minute interview for assessment. This will involve:

- A detailed explanation of the code submitted for their assignment.
- Answering questions related to class concepts as applied to their assignment.

FEEDBACK ON COURSEWORK:

The coursework will be marked and returned to students within 4 weeks of the submission deadline. Feedback will consist of marker's notes appended to the pdf of your coursework.
