

Downtown includes a rich collection of neighborhoods



- **Belltown** is a dense, urban neighborhood that is home to nightlife, local restaurants, and entertainment venues.
- As the anchor of Seattle's Asian community for more than 100 years, the Chinatown-International District (CID) thrives as both a residential and business space.
- The Commercial Core is the central neighborhood of the Downtown urban center, where much of the city's economic and civic activities take place.
- Denny Triangle stretches from the edge of the Downtown core to the grounds of Seattle Center, next to the Pacific Science Center and Space Needle.
- Pioneer Square, known as Seattle's "first neighborhood" is a draw for many with its historic architecture, King Street Station and events like the First Thursday Art Walk.
- The **Stadium District** supports major sports, entertainment, retail gatherings, and events while maintaining the surrounding bustling industrial and maritime functions.

Seattle's Downtown Activation Plan is organized around seven bold goals to implement now while also laying the foundation for a new future for Downtown Seattle.

This plan recognizes that success depends on first addressing public safety.





Make Downtown safe and welcoming



*Note some of the safety initiatives are ongoing so they are labelled In Progress rather than Complete The City of Seattle became the <u>first in the nation to</u> <u>have firefighters/EMTs administering buprenorphine</u> <u>medication in the field</u>.

Mayor Harrell directed \$2.85M to increase dedicated detox and inpatient treatment bed capacity for those with substance use disorder. Funding will support additional bed capacity at Valley Cities Recovery Place Seattle in Beacon Hill through a pilot program.

"Working alongside our partners, this comprehensive strategy – laid out in our 2023 Executive Order – is helping make a difference; preliminary data shows 150 fewer fatal overdoses in 2024 compared to this time last year."


An Executive Order created the Downtown

Activation Team. Initial DAT operations have shown positive early results in the Pike/Pine DAT area compared to last year.

- 27% decrease in violent crime
- 14% decrease in emergency service calls
- 30% decrease in emergency medical responses

Mayor Bruce Harrell signed legislation waiving design review for new development projects Downtown. This action "establishes more efficient,

flexible design review process that will reduce the amount of time and cost of development... This will add more housing and employment opportunities in Downtown neighborhoods, strengthening the heart of our city and supporting its continued economic growth now and into the



Seattle City Council unanimously passed legislation to support the conversion of existing commercial buildings to resident uses. The legislation established clear guidelines for determining what qualifies as a residential conversion and provides broad exemptions from design development standards any time an existing structure is converted to housing from another use, or residential uses are added within an existing building.



space is open! Established in the 1980s, the school
aims to provide accessible care and education
regardless of income.



<u>Under new ownership, Smith Tower attracts nearly a dozen new tenants</u>, including Café Vida and Alexander Hutton, who signed a seven-year release.

Employers continue to bring workers back to office.

- King County and Sound Transit join Mayor Harrell in announcing return to office policy changes.
- Amazon will require employees to work from the office five days a week starting in 2025.

The Hope Corps Downtown Seattle Mural Project showcased the talents of local artists and <u>provided</u> work and funding to over 30 artists.

Applications for Seattle Restored at Base Camp
Studios 2 opened. Through this program, artists will have access to affordable studio space at the historic Bergman Luggage Building on the corner of Third Avenue and Stewart Street in Downtown Seattle.



<u>zone permit legislation</u> for live music venues to support easier parking and loading access for performers. The legislation authorizes SDOT to administer a Music Venue Zone Permit program and establish Music Venue Zones at qualifying music venues.

More than 22,500 music lovers showed up and rocked out to 35 concerts over 11 weeks during the 45th annual Downtown Summer Sounds outdoor concert series. Westlake Park saw the largest attendance for the DRAMA concert, which drew more than 4,000 people, followed by Occidental Square, which drew nearly 3,000 people for eight combined concerts, and Bell Street Park, where 1,000 people gathered to hear native Seattleite Ryan Caraveo.


<u>Night</u>. This communally-minded, season-inspired Solstice party brought light to the liminal space of the year's darkest day

<u>Seattle's newest iconic landmark is open – Overlook Walk!</u> Connecting the Waterfront and Downtown with breathtaking views and enhanced public space, Overlook Walk is located where the Alaskan Way Viaduct once stood, creating the first ever pedestrian connection between Downtown and the Waterfront. So far, the overlook walk has sent <u>foot traffic numbers soaring</u>.

Enchant Christmas returned to T-Mobile Park after a four-year hiatus—bringing the world's largest Christmas light maze and Santa's landing Downtown. As visitors travel through Downtown they will experience holiday lights in Westlake Park and end up at Seattle Center's Winterfest and Christmas Market.

More than 50 new murals have been or will be installed in Seattle's Downtown.


The mural project harnessed the resources of DSA, Belltown United, SCIDpda, SODO BIA, Visit Seattle and the Wing Luke Museum to connect artists with property owners.







Create a healthy, resilient, and green Downtown



Mayor Harrell advanced legislation to establish a shore power agreement with the Port of Seattle for Pier 66. With the passage of this legislation, Seattle would become one of the first cruise ports in the nation to offer shore power at every berth, significantly reducing port-related air emissions in the Northwest.

<u>City of Seattle was awarded \$17.2 million to implement Building Emissions</u>

<u>Performance Standard</u>, which will support multifamily and commercial buildings reduce climate pollution.

<u>**Pioneer Square East-West Pedestrian Improvements**</u> <u>**finished**</u> and create more accessible and enjoyable travel between the Waterfront Park and Pioneer Square.

The opening of the Lynnwood Light Rail extension saw more people visiting Downtown by rail since pre-pandemic.

Heart of the City

- In Q4 2024, a Westlake Steering Committee (City, DSA, Seattle Park Foundation) came together to align on the near-term actions around Westlake leading up to the World Cup in 2026 and create a plan for building a long-term vision
- In 2025, the City and partners will come together to create a Civic Committee to reimagine
 Westlake as an active, illuminated, and iconic Downtown District
- By the middle of the 2025, the City will look to share a catalytic District vision for what Westlake can become

Makers Campus


- Seattle Colleges has assigned a project lead, who led the development of the Health Education Center in Pacific Tower
- They prepared a letter of intent specifying their goals for the Downtown Campus including desired square footage and financing options
- Seattle Colleges attended the Real Estate Roundtable and is meeting with prospective partners for a Downtown campus including Hudson Properties, OED, Urban Visions (in progress), and Seattle Chamber (in progress)

BIPOC Mercado

- The pop-up markets hosted by Friends of Waterfront and supported by OED showcased a pilot of a Mercado concept
- Friends is looking to host vendors again in summer 2025
