RESPECTING OUR HERITAGE, PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

My name is Danny Taylor, and I graduated from Portland Christian School (PCS) in 1967. I'm married with two children and four grandchildren—all of whom, along with many other relatives, have attended PCS. I served on the PCS Board from 2004 to 2009 and as Board Chairman from 2009 through December 31, 2024.

My family's connection to PCS dates back to the mid-1930s. My grandmother Taylor was inspired by the Christ-centered singing of PCS students, including a young Joe Blansett and his sister Billie (later Billie Searcy). That experience led our family to relocate from Tennessee to Louisville so her children could attend PCS.

My dad and aunt enrolled, were baptized through the influence of PCS and their church, and remained committed to Christian education. My dad eventually left school to support the family and later served in World War II. My aunt, Lorene Brown, graduated from PCS in 1947.

After losing their parents, my aunt and dad prioritized raising their families in Christian education. My aunt adopted two children—Terry and Karen Brown—who both graduated from PCS. During my high school years, my parents welcomed Darryl and Jerry Witten into our home; they attended PCS and came to know Christ.




In 1967, shortly before graduation, I met Kathleen Cummins. We married in 1970 and have now been together 55 years. Her mother also valued PCS and made sure Kathy had that foundation. When we had children, Kathy and I chose to continue the legacy. Although we lived 30 miles away and both worked full-time, we prioritized Christian education.

Today, our children and grandchildren have all been exposed to God's Word daily through PCS and remain connected to the school community. When I reflect on our family's journey, I'm reminded of PCS's mission: "Teaching truth and transforming lives." Because of my grandmother's faithful decision and my grandfather's support, generations of our family have been shaped by that truth.

As I conclude my third year as Director of Operations, I continue to be amazed by God's guidance in my journey. From my early days teaching with JCPS, to 21 years at Christian Academy, and leading Whitefield Academy, God has faithfully opened doors. I joined PCS in 2018 as Middle/High School Principal. In 2021, after much prayer and consideration, I accepted the newly created role of Director of Operations—an answer to prayer that aligned with my gifts and experience.

My current role involves overseeing Building & Grounds, Food Services, Health Services, IT, Safety & Security, and Transportation across both campuses. While the responsibilities are vast, I'm grateful for the strong team leaders in each area who carry out daily operations. I also manage property rentals and vendor partnerships.

Building & Grounds

Terry Hammond, a PCS alum and skilled leader, manages this department with the support of Mauricio Quesada and Damon Saulsberry. Since joining in 2017, Terry has spearheaded numerous improvements, including roof replacements, major Lower School remodels, relocation of the IT server room, and carpool flow design. Under his leadership, we've opened a new softball field and weight room and are currently developing a baseball field. His hands-on approach has brought substantial cost savings and stewardship.

Food Services

Led by Elizabeth Pulley, our Food Services team ensures daily meal operations run smoothly. Elizabeth brought on Jena Quesada, whose food prep background has been invaluable. Alongside part-time staff, they prepare and serve meals with care and creativity. Under Elizabeth's direction, we've expanded kitchen equipment and cafeteria space, launched themed lunches and the Snack Shack, and introduced daily breakfast options.

Health Services

Managed by RN Paula Tucker and assisted by RN Lee Juarez, our Health Services department ensures student health and regulatory compliance. Paula's experience is instrumental in training staff in CPR, First Aid, and AED use, as well as coordinating field trip safety protocols. Recent accomplishments include a revamped nurse's office, upgraded emergency backpacks, enhanced digital record systems, and the addition of AEDs and LifeVac devices.

Information Technology

Jonathan Lewter leads the IT department with unwavering dedication. With PCS for 19 years, Jonathan transitioned to full-time IT in 2021 and was recently joined by Philip Molenstina. Together, they manage extensive infrastructure and have driven major projects like relocating the server room, upgrading to fiber internet, launching a 1:1 student device program, and improving network and inventory systems.

Safety & Security

This area, managed by me, has evolved significantly. We've enhanced safety measures with a modern emergency alert system, expanded camera coverage, implemented secure door access and staff ID systems, and installed bullet-resistant film on vulnerable glass. We also rekeyed campuses to tighten security.

Transportation

Although PCS doesn't provide regular student transportation, we comply with state/federal guidelines for occasional student travel. The primary focus has been improving carpool logistics and parking lot functionality. In recent years, we've implemented consistent patterns, addressed van requirements, and restriped lots for better flow.


This remarkable opportunity will allow our students to not only represent Portland Christian School but our country and Christ on a global stage.

This spring, we're celebrating two exciting developments that will strengthen the foundation of our athletic program: the opening of a brand-new weight room and the completion of our softball field.

It supports our goal of developing well-rounded athletes who train with intention and purpose, both in-season and off-season. The facility will also allow our coaches to implement more structured and effective training programs tailored to each team's needs.

For the first time, our softball team has a true home—a place where they can practice, compete, and represent PCS with pride. At Portland Christian School, academic achievement is a top priority.

We use the nationally recognized MAP® test to measure student progress in reading and math. This assessment, taken by millions nationwide, gives valuable insight into student growth. We're proud to share encouraging news about our students' academic progress. Starting with the Spring 2023 MAP scores as our baseline, we now highlight the impressive results from Spring 2025. These recent scores reflect some of the most significant academic gains we've seen. The data demonstrates steady growth and highlights the success of our strategies since adopting MAP as a key evaluation tool.

The class of 2026 (our rising seniors), went from 54th percentile in the US in achievement to the 64th percentile in the US.



The class of 2028 (our rising sophmores), went from 38th percentile in the US in achievement to the 63rd percentile in the US.



The class of 2027 (our rising juniors), went from 37th percentile in the US in achievement to the 64th percentile in the US.



The class of 2029 (our rising freshmen), went from 38th percentile in the US in achievement to the 49th percentile in the US.



That's why we're here to walk with you as you consider how best to invest in Portland Christian.



This school year has been one of growth, inspiration, and transformation for the Spiritual Life Department at Portland Christian School. As we reflect on all that God has done, we are especially excited to highlight new initiatives and meaningful experiences that have drawn our students—both in the Upper and Lower Schools—closer to Jesus.

UPPER SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

Ignite Conference: "Let's Gooooooo!"

In October, PCS launched the Ignite Conference, a two-day off-campus experience for students in grades 6–12. With the theme "Let's Goooooo! Answering God's Call, the event invited students to step away from routine and fully engage with God's presence through worship, powerful messages, breakout sessions, and intentional community.

The conference centered on four pivotal biblical stories—Abram, Esther, the Woman at the Well, and the Disciples—each showing individuals who were faced with a choice to follow God's call wholeheartedly. Students were encouraged to consider how God is calling them today and to respond with boldness and faith. It was a time of spiritual breakthrough, commitment, and excitement for what it means to live on mission.

Missions Week: Living the Gospel Out Loud

Building on the momentum of Ignite, PCS launched its first-ever Missions Week, an opportunity for students to explore what it means to serve locally and globally. Grounded in Matthew 28, students heard real missionary stories, participated in hands-on service projects, and reflected on how to live out the Gospel in practical ways. Portland Christian also sent a team of 24 teachers and students to the Dominican Republic to work in partnership with GO Ministries -the largest group of students we have sent in years! Missions Week helped teach our students that mission work isn't just something we talk about—it's something we do.

LOWER SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

Spiritual life in the Lower School continued to flourish through engaging and faith-building weekly Chapel services. Our youngest students experienced God's love through creative, interactive teaching that helped them understand and apply biblical truth in their everyday lives. Here are just a few of the exciting series our Lower School students experienced this year:

Mystery Manor

In this imaginative series, students became detectives solving big spiritual mysteries—like who God is, what the Bible says, and what heaven is really like. Each week, students discovered that God's Word holds the answers, teaching them to be curious, ask questions, and seek truth through Scripture.

The Great Outdoors

Through the beauty of nature, students explored how to grow in their friendship with God. They learned to get quiet, spend time in the Word, and open their hearts in worship. Just like exploring the outdoors, developing a relationship with God became an adventure full of wonder and discovery.

Think About It

This impactful series taught students the power of their thoughts. In a world full of noise, kids learned how to recognize and reshape their thinking through a relationship with Jesus. By learning to catch, check, and change their thoughts, they began to understand how God can renew their minds and lead them in truth.

Beyond Chapel, Lower School students also had opportunities to live out their faith through giving and service. During Missions Week, students collected hundreds of items for our local Ronald McDonald House, learning firsthand what it means to care for families in need. They also participated in a fun and spirited Penny War, with all proceeds going to help send Upper School students on a mission trip to the Dominican Republic. Who knew that Lower School students could raise \$3,800 in a Penny War! These moments reminded us all that you're never too young to make a difference in God's Kingdom.

LOOKING AHEAD

From the youngest learners in Chapel to middle and high schoolers stepping into God's mission, this year has been a powerful testament to God's work in our community. 
