About the Kit Wilson Trust

How It All Started

The Trust was established in 1975 when Katherine Wilson (always known as 'Kit'), a well-known cat show judge and campaigner for animal welfare, left a small legacy to be used for the benefit of animals. A cornerstone of the Trust's founding policy then, as now, was to promote the spaying and neutering of pets. The need for the Trust's work in rescuing and re-homing unwanted cats and dogs would be greatly reduced if there were fewer kittens and puppies being born; animals rescued by the Trust are the lucky ones - thousands of unwanted pets are destroyed every year by other organisations and authorities.

What We Do

From a modest beginning the Trust has grown and in 1986 set up its own Animal Rescue Centre in Hadlow Down, near Uckfield, in East Sussex. In addition to the animal rescue and re-homing work, the Trust has become increasingly involved in wildlife rehabilitation and operates a wildlife emergency help line. Over the years, the Rescue Centre has also become a permanent home to many animals that it is not possible or desirable to re-home; these include horses, donkeys, cats, goats, birds and small mammals.

How We Work

The Trustees give their time on a voluntary basis, including the Chairman who has overall responsibility for animal welfare, the organisation of the Rescue Centre, its staff and volunteers. Funds are raised mainly through local supporters' groups, individual donations, legacies, animal sponsors and our Charity Shops. We receive no Local Authority, Government or Lottery funding, relying on our supporters to continue our work

Welcome to Tails 2025/2026



2025 is a significant year for us as we commemorate our **50th Anniversary.**

It is interesting to look back on the years to remind ourselves of all our highs but not to forget the lows either. It has not all been plain sailing.

Without Kit (Catherine) Wilson's generosity in the early 70's, it is safe to say that The Kit Wilson Trust for Animal Welfare would not exist today. Many changes and much hard work have been carried out since those early days, but what has never changed is ensuring every animal we take in receives the very best care until they are placed in a suitable home.

Fast forward to March 1984, one of our lowest points, but who knew that when we were informed, due to a change in farming policy, we would have to close the cattery and vacate the loaned building in East Grinstead, we were using for our rescue work, it would turn out to be one of the best decisions for the Trust. Since the Trust was founded in 1975 we had homed 811 dogs, 2284 cats and 279 other animals as well as neutering 2,093 cats and dogs through our spaying/neutering scheme.

The time had come to find a suitable property to purchase to carry on our essential work. An appeal for funds was

launched over a two and a half year period and the search for property began. Continual fundraising and legacies were helping us ever nearer our target, all the time our rescue, rehoming and other welfare work continued apace. In 1986, after much anxiety, as only those who have purchased property can understand, we did it and the Rescue Centre in Hadlow Down became our reality.

The site had been used as an intensive pig rearing unit, so we were pleased to think that our future activities would wipe out the past misery that had taken place there. A huge amount of work was needed on the disused site, slurry pits to be filled in, buildings in need of repair, and in some cases pulled down. The massive electrical system was unsafe due to neglect and the water system nonexistent and would need to be completely rebuilt.

We have come a long way to where we are today and we are proud of what we have achieved but the journey does not stop here, we still have plans ahead, buildings to be updated and some still need replacing. It is all still a work in progress, as funds allow.

We would not be where we are today without the help of our supporters or the dedication and commitment of Colette in her voluntary positions as Trustee Chair, Centre Manager, and Chief Rehomer. Colette has been involved since the day KWT was established.



A trip down memory lane

As I put this newsletter together, I realise it is taking me far longer than it should. I have been totally engrossed and captivated by reading newsletters, from the very first one back in 1975, when the Trust was first established.

I have been transported back to a time before I became involved with the charity and adopted my first dog through them in 1986. Prince, a 3 year old Sheltie whose owner could not cope with him because she had a new baby, something over the years we have heard many times given as a reason the dog has to go. He was the sweetest dog and no trouble at all.

There is an overwhelming sense I get from those early days, that although the struggles were real, the work on occasions upsetting and never-ending, the sheer determination and camaraderie to deal with whatever came along was also real. Supporters then, as now, were always behind the Trust, donating, fundraising, and helping in any which way they could.

Looking back on a newsletter from 1976, It is certainly hard to remember a time when our 'Grand Raffle' tickets were being sold for 5p per ticket, or the approximate cost of an adult dog spay was £16 and an adult dog castration £9.50! But I suppose it was all relative.

I can honestly say that my time working at the Centre in the late 80's firstly as a Sunday volunteer, then as a kennel assistant was the best of my working life and the most rewarding. Yes the work was hard. At the time we were having to carry buckets of hot water from the kitchen down to the kennels as work to update the site was being carried out, but we were of the generation where if a job needed doing you just got on with it. Health & safety wasn't like it is today. You went home exhausted at the end of the day but you went knowing you'd done a good job!

I have had various voluntary roles over the years with the Trust, each one as enjoyable as the last. I have jumped a few gates at the Centre in the past, with Colette, at the sound of an incessant buzz, neither waiting to find out what it was! Splitting up in the vain hope that it may confuse the offending insect, rather than one of us being unlucky enough for it to follow. Even though many years have passed and your knees start to feel that first sign of arthritis, (no jumping gates these days), one thing never changes for me visiting the Centre; whether it be to drop off donations or to take photos of the animals for the newsletter and social media, it still transports me to a different world, one of tranquility, love and peace.

Xena is a magnificent, friendly girl and will make someone a loyal companion. She oozes warmth and intelligence, has a velvety coat and the most soulful eyes that seem to read your every emotion. She moves with a playful bounce and grace that defies her size. Her expressive face and eyes are a window into her keen mind, always eager to solve problems,

learn new things, or to simply comfort her favourite humans. Loyal to a fault, she will lean against you for reassurance, offering an embrace that feels almost human. Approx. 9 years old.



New Website


Exciting news....

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


Dogs in need of homes




2 year old crossbred spayed female

Many people have questions about how to adopt an animal from



CAN I CALL IN TO THE CENTRE AND LOOK AROUND FOR AN ANIMAL?

You can visit our reception between 9.00am and 5.00pm daily to leave your details and the kind of animal you are looking for, BUT you will need an appointment to look at the animals.



AT SOME RESCUE CENTRES I CAN JUST TURN UP AND LOOK AROUND.

This system is for your benefit as well as that of the animals. We like to give people individual attention, so our animal care staff are assigned to appointments for re-homing within their daily work schedule, which allows the time necessary to deal with the important decision of which animal is right for you. As far as the animals are concerned, the Rescue Centre is their home and, as with established pets in their own homes, strangers walking through 'their' property can be distressing for them. Many of the newer arrivals have recently had traumatic experiences and disturbance to them is kept to a minimum.





WHEN I PHONE?

You will be asked about the kind of animal you are interested in and the facilities you are able to provide, as well as details of your family (i.e. whether you have young children, other pets, livestock, etc.) and whether you are working, retired or at home. If there is a suitable animal at the Centre we will arrange an appointment for you to visit.



I HAVE TRIED TO PHONE THE RESCUE CENTRE, BUT THE PHONE IS ON ANSWERING MACHINE. WHEN CAN I SPEAK TO SOMEONE IN PERSON?

We rely mostly on volunteers to deal with enquiries and it is not possible to deal with every call in person; the care of the animals here must come first. However, we do assure you that if you leave your name, telephone number and the nature of your enquiry, we will return your call as soon as possible. We endeavour to have the general line (01825 830444) covered from 10.00am to 4.00pm daily.



I LEFT DETAILS OF THE TYPE OF ANIMAL I WAS LOOKING FOR AND I HAVEN'T HEARD FROM YOU. HAS MY ENQUIRY BEEN OVERLOOKED?

A record is kept of all telephone calls and we do our best to contact people when an animal that may suit them comes into our care. However, we receive hundreds of calls every week and it is not always possible to do this immediately. We do, therefore, ask you to phone from time to time, quoting the reference number that you will have been given when you called, to let us know whether you are still looking for an animal, or indeed if you have found one elsewhere.

WILL YOU NEED TO VISIT MY HOME?

We have a number of home-checkers in the area and prefer to ask them to contact you to arrange a visit to your home before you decide on an animal to adopt. However, because these people are volunteers and may have to travel some distance to your home, the visit may sometimes be carried out after your appointment at the Centre.



WHAT RULES DO YOU HAVE ABOUT WHETHER SOMEONE CAN ADOPT AN ANIMAL?

We do not have a rigid set of rules, but try to assess each potential home according to the animal being adopted. However, there are certain guidelines that we follow, such as not homing cats in houses on busy main roads and not putting animals into situations where they will be left alone for long periods of time, since their mental well-being is just as important as their physical needs.



WHAT WILL HAPPEN WHEN I HAVE BEEN GIVEN AN APPOINTMENT TO VISIT THE CENTRE?

A member of staff will introduce you to the animal that your enquiry relates to. This may take the form of a dog being brought up to Reception or you being escorted to the cattery, rabbitry or rodent house. The member of staff will discuss with you the animal's history and needs.



WHAT HAPPENS WHEN I ADOPT AN ANIMAL?

You will be required to sign an adoption form, which includes an agreement to have the animal spayed or neutered (if not already done, due to age or health reasons) and to return it to the Trust if you are, for some reason, unable to keep it. The latter does not happen very often and we are always happy to give advice if there are any problems following the adoption.



IF I AM UNABLE TO KEEP MY ADOPTED ANIMAL, WHAT SHOULD I DO?

Telephone us first to discuss the problems. If these are insoluble, we would ask you to give us at least 24 hours' notice to make accommodation arrangements, as our kennels and catteries are always full, with urgent cases waiting to come in every day.



HOW MUCH DOES IT COST TO ADOPT AN ANIMAL?

We do not sell animals, believing they are beyond monetary value. However, we invite you to make a donation, entirely at your discretion, towards the care of other animals at the Centre, either when you take the animal home, or whenever you feel appropriate. Our motivation is to secure a permanent home and, whilst we desperately need funds, we do not view the re-homing of animals as part of our fund raising activities.





Cats in need of homes

All our cats have been microchipped, vaccinated and neutered.

AMBER, OPAL, SAPPHIRE AND MALACHITE - BORN 14TH JULY 2024












3 year old Himalayan spayed female sisters.




