About the Kit Wilson Trust

How It All Started

The Trust was established in 1975 when Katherine Wilson (always known as 'Kit'), a well-known cat show judge and campaigner for animal welfare, left a small legacy to be used for the benefit of animals. A cornerstone of the Trust's founding policy then, as now, was to promote the spaying and neutering of pets. The need for the Trust's work in rescuing and re-homing unwanted cats and dogs would be greatly reduced if there were fewer kittens and puppies being born; animals rescued by the Trust are the lucky ones - thousands of unwanted pets are destroyed every year by other organisations and authorities.

What We Do

From a modest beginning the Trust has grown and in 1986 set up its own Animal Rescue Centre in Hadlow Down, near

Uckfield, in East Sussex. In addition to the animal rescue and re-homing work, the Trust has become increasingly involved in wildlife rehabilitation and operates a wildlife emergency help line. Over the years, the Rescue Centre has also become a permanent home to many animals that it is not possible or desirable to re-home; these include horses, donkeys, cats, goats, birds and small mammals.

How We Work

The Trustees give their time on a voluntary basis, including the Chairman who has overall responsibility for animal welfare, the organisation of the Rescue Centre, its staff and volunteers. Funds are raised mainly through local supporters' groups, individual donations, legacies, animal sponsors and our Charity Shops. We receive no Local Authority, Government or Lottery funding, relying on our supporters to continue our work.

I think we can now definitely say that she has claimed our house and garden as her own space.

"She is so gentle. It's really difficult to understand why she did not find a forever home sooner, but as we've said earlier that is so much our gain and however long or short her remaining life we will love and cherish her."

◆ Sooty & Cola

Maggie needs an experienced cat home. She is independent but inquisitive. She has only ever been an indoor cat so will need time to get used to going outside. She is playful but her mood needs to be read as attention needs to be on her terms.



◆ Lucy

11 year old female.

Came into our care after her owner moved into a care home. Lucy can be shy to begin with but is very friendly once she knows you. Lucy just wants a lap to sit on.



I'd like to give a home to a Rescued Animal

CAN I CALL IN TO THE CENTRE AND LOOK AROUND FOR AN ANIMAL?

You can visit our reception between 9.00am and 5.00pm daily to leave your details and the kind of animal you are looking for, BUT you will need an appointment to look at the animals.

AT SOME RESCUE CENTRES I CAN JUST TURN UP AND LOOK AROUND.

This system is for your benefit as well as that of the animals. We like to give people individual attention, so our animal care staff are assigned to appointments for re-homing within their daily work schedule, which allows the time necessary to deal with the important decision of which animal is right for you. As far as the animals are concerned, the Rescue Centre is their home and, as with established pets in their own homes, strangers walking through 'their' property can be distressing for them. Many of the newer arrivals have recently had traumatic experiences and disturbance to them is kept to a minimum.

WHEN I PHONE?

You will be asked about the kind of animal you are interested in and the facilities you are able to provide, as well as details of your family (i.e. whether you have young children, other pets, livestock, etc.) and whether you are working, retired or at home. If there is a suitable animal at the Centre we will arrange an appointment for you to visit.

I HAVE TRIED TO PHONE THE RESCUE CENTRE, BUT THE PHONE IS ON ANSWERING MACHINE. WHEN CAN I SPEAK TO SOMEONE IN PERSON?

We rely mostly on volunteers to deal with enquiries and it is not possible to deal with every call in person; the care of the animals here must come first. However, we do assure you that if you leave your name, telephone number and the nature of your enquiry, we will return your call as soon as possible. We endeavour to have the general line (01825 830444) covered from 10.00am to 4.00pm daily.

I LEFT DETAILS OF THE TYPE OF ANIMAL I WAS LOOKING FOR AND I HAVEN'T HEARD FROM YOU. HAS MY ENQUIRY BEEN OVERLOOKED?

A record is kept of all telephone calls and we do our best to contact people when an animal that may suit them comes into our care. However, we receive hundreds of calls every week and it is not always possible to do this immediately. We do, therefore, ask you to phone from time to time, quoting the reference number that you will have been given when you called, to let us know whether you are still looking for an animal, or indeed if you have found one elsewhere.



Many people have questions about how to adopt an animal from the Trust – we hope to answer most of them here.

WILL YOU NEED TO VISIT MY HOME?

We have a number of home-checkers in the area and prefer to ask them to contact you to arrange a visit to your home before you decide on an animal to adopt. However, because these people are volunteers and may have to travel some distance to your home, the visit may sometimes be carried out after your appointment at the Centre.

WHAT RULES DO YOU HAVE ABOUT WHETHER SOMEONE CAN ADOPT AN ANIMAL?

We do not have a rigid set of rules, but try to assess each potential home according to the animal being adopted. However, there are certain guidelines that we follow, such as not homing cats in houses on busy main roads and not putting animals into situations where they will be left alone for long periods of time, since their mental well-being is just as important as their physical needs.

WHAT WILL HAPPEN WHEN I HAVE BEEN GIVEN AN APPOINTMENT TO VISIT THE CENTRE?

A member of staff will introduce you to the animal that your enquiry relates to. This may take the form of a dog being brought up to Reception or you being escorted to the cattery, rabbitry or rodent house. The member of staff will discuss with you the animal's history and needs.

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN I ADOPT AN ANIMAL?

You will be required to sign an adoption form, which includes an agreement to have the animal spayed or neutered (if not already done, due to age or

health reasons) and to return it to the Trust if you are, for some reason, unable to keep it. The latter does not happen very often and we are always happy to give advice if there are any problems following the adoption.

IF I AM UNABLE TO KEEP MY ADOPTED ANIMAL, WHAT SHOULD I DO?

Telephone us first to discuss the problems. If these are insoluble, we would ask you to give us at least 24 hours' notice to make accommodation arrangements, as our kennels and catteries are always full, with urgent cases waiting to come in every day.

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST TO ADOPT AN ANIMAL?

We do not sell animals, believing they are beyond monetary value. However, we invite you to make a donation, entirely at your discretion, towards the care of other animals at the Centre, either when you take the animal home, or whenever you feel appropriate. Our motivation is to secure a permanent home and, whilst we desperately need funds, we do not view the re-homing of animals as part of our fund raising activities.





Rabbits in need of homes



◆ Eddie

Approx. 1 year old neutered male Chinchilla Rabbit.

Eddie found himself in dire straits when his owner suddenly passed away. He is an amazing boy all-round. He's inquisitive and friendly, loves his food and comforts. All he wishes for now is a female companion to spend his life with.

◆ Buttons

4 year old neutered male Mini Lop.

Sadly, returned to the Trust after his companion passed away and his owners felt unable to accommodate his needs, when their circumstances changed. He is a curious chap and likes to assist the staff with the daily cleaning of his pen. Buttons doesn't like being picked up but thoroughly enjoys sitting on your lap.



◆ Hazel & Blitzen

6 year old spayed female Lionhead and 9 year old neutered male Dwarf x Lionhead.

This couple has been at the centre for several years. Due to their very different personalities, they do not appeal to the same potential homes and are often overlooked. Hazel is your typical middle aged female. She is friendly but independent, likes doing her own thing and mooching about.

Whereas Blitzen is bursting with personality. His larger than life character makes us laugh every day. He is a little old man, who likes to think of himself as a Rottweiler. Being set in his ways, he lets you know in no uncertain terms when he feels you are invading his personal space. We find that his little quirks only add to his charm, he is one in a million.





◆ Cuddles & Snowy

2 year old neutered male Lop and 2 year old spayed female Lop.

This bonded pair has spent most of their lives in an indoor home but sadly their owner was unable to keep them any longer. Both are very friendly and outgoing. They love to explore their surroundings and skipping to their heart's content.

◆ Benjamin & Peter

1 year old neutered males.

This curious, friendly pair were brought in due to their owners down-sizing. Peter is slightly more independent and has a great love for food. 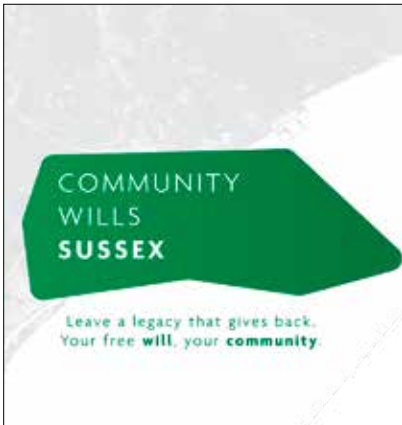

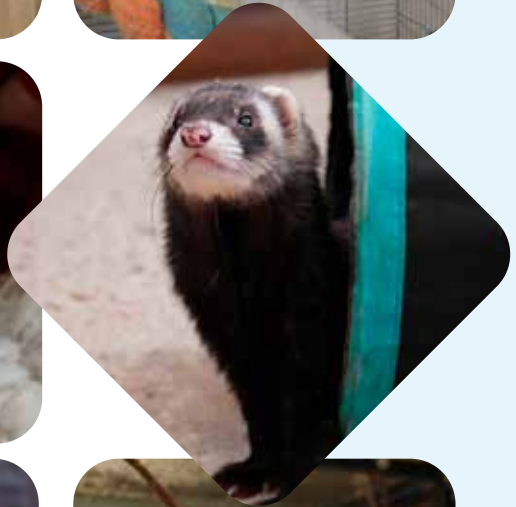
