Continuing in Hebrews 11, we center our study on the life of Enoch, a man who didn't perform miracles or achieve public greatness, but simply "walked with God" daily. His story shows us that true faith isn't just a belief system—it's a continuous, intimate walk with God. Enoch sought a relationship with God for its own sake, not for what he could get from Him. His life reminds us that the greatest achievement is not going viral, but going eternal, and that genuine faith is expressed through a quiet, consistent walk of obedience and integrity, even when no one else is watching.

Scripture.

Hebrews 11:5-6

Genesis 5:22-24

Engage.

Read Hebrews 11:5-6. What phrases in these verses stand out to you? What does it mean to "be well-pleasing to God" and why is faith essential to that?

Read Genesis 5:22-24. What is the key phrase repeated in these verses about Enoch? What do you think "walked with God" meant in the context of his time, and what does it tell us about his character?

You cannot walk with a God you do not believe in or know. Based on these scriptures, what did Enoch believe about God that enabled him to walk with Him?

Hebrews 11:6 says, "...he who comes to God must believe that He is and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him." How do Enoch's actions in Genesis 5 demonstrate both of these beliefs?

Enoch lived in a very dark period of human history. The sermon notes that he "walked with integrity" and "declared truth publicly." What are some of the challenges and temptations in our world today that make it difficult to walk with God and speak truth?

Derik differentiated between seeking God's heart and just his help. What do these scriptures teach us about the difference between a transactional relationship with God and a genuinely intimate one?

Faith doesn't just believe in God; it walks with Him daily. What is one practical difference you see between merely believing in God and actively walking with Him?

We often define a "hero" by extraordinary accomplishments. Enoch's life was described as a quiet, God-honoring life. How does Enoch's example challenge your definition of a life well-lived for God?
