THE NEED FOR AUTHENTIC COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

To effectively improve health and eliminate health disparities, our work must be data-informed and equity-focused. This requires a community-centered process for data collection, and analysis that prioritizes authentic community engagement.

HealthierHere strives to proactively engage with, listen to, and respond to requests and feedback from community partners. One way we have done this is through the Community Grants Program, which was designed


to gather input from community members in a way that centered authentic community engagement.

When we set out to design and implement a community-centered data collection and ownership process, we did so in an iterative manner, cocreating alongside the Community and Consumer Voice committee (CCV), Indigenous Nations Committee (INC), and Community Grants Alumni (organizations that participated in the Community Grants Program).

COMMITMENT TO EQUITY

HealthierHere is committed to the principle and practice of equity and authentic community engagement. This means that our efforts to transform the health system must center the voices of people with lived experience and people experiencing health disparities.

The CCV and INC are Governing Board committees that are led by and made up of community-based organizations, Medicaid beneficiaries, community members and tribal communities. While input from the CCV and INC provides expansive perspectives and broad reach, committee members acknowledge the need to incorporate multiple voices and experiences in our efforts to improve health outcomes and address health disparities in King County, WA. From this recognition, the Community Grants program was born.



COMMUNITY GRANTS PROGRAM

TO INCORPORATE MULTIPLE VOICES AND EXPERIENCES IN OUR EFFORTS TO IMPROVE HEALTH OUTCOMES AND ADDRESS HEALTH DISPARITIES



The Community Grants program started in 2018, led by a close partnership between HealthierHere and the Center for MultiCultural Health. A core value of this project was to include a community-centered process for data collection, analysis and ownership.

Historically, data collection has been an extractive process, in which communities are surveyed or studied and then never see the data nor influence how it is used or analyzed. This extractive approach does not center equity, which is why the Community Grants Program's process of data collection and data sharing has been community-centered throughout.

PARTNERING FOR RESULTS

RESOURCING TRUSTED COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS TO LEAD THE WAY

Over the course of 2018 and 2019, the Community Grants Alumni (listed to the left) collectively engaged with and gathered survey responses from 2,860 individuals, from over 40 different communities in King County.

With a primary focus on Medicaid beneficiaries, HealthierHere wanted to learn more about how people experience the healthcare system and the barriers they face when accessing care.

To accomplish this, HealthierHere partnered with organizations that had longstanding community relationships and were seen as trusted advisors in their communities. Partners received resources to engage with community members about HealthierHere's work and to ask them questions about their experiences with healthcare.

During the survey development process, organizations were also resourced to edit and approve survey translations into 15 languages so that community members would not experience language barriers.



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


Above: excerpt from an early data results poster in Arabic. Poster is available in multiple languages at healthierhere.org/listen

A NEW APPROACH TO DATA

CO-CREATING AN APPROACH WITH COMMUNITY





After the data was collected, our partners at Public Health - Seattle & King County quickly uploaded the raw data and made it available in a dashboard on our website. This was to ensure that Community Grants Alumni and their community members had access to the data as soon as HealthierHere did.

However, we knew that just posting the numbers on a public website would not be enough to proactively put the data back into the hands of the community. We also needed to ground-truth the quantitative data with qualitative data to better understand the stories behind the raw numbers.

The Community Grants Program was designed to include programming that extended far beyond the initial data collection. Programming supported organizations to both engage with the data as Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) and be able to share the data with their own community members in ways that were reflective of their values.

SHARING DATA BACK TO COMMUNITY

AND MAKING SPACE TO LISTEN

The next step in our process was to engage with the Community Grants Alumni to better understand the narrative behind the data and the implications for HealthierHere's healthcare system transformation work.

In late March 2020, at the height of the Coronavirus pandemic, we heard from committee members that it was difficult to focus on broad data questions due to the urgency of COVID-19 response. We honored the requests of committee members by offering more time to sit with the data, and then created space to come back together for discussion at a later date.

On July 22nd, HealthierHere and the Center for MultiCultural Health hosted a Community Grants Data Report-Back with Community Grants Alumni, CCV, and INC. The approach to this event focused on themes from the data that were most relevant and useful during this time.



MAXIMIZING IMPACT

WORKING TOGETHER TO TAKE DATA-INFORMED ACTION

More than 70 Community Grants participants gathered for a virtual event to explore the data on July 22, 2020.

Attendees discussed the following themes that were reflected in the data:

Upon learning about the data associated with each theme, community members expressed the desire to use this data to help tell their communities' stories, support them in navigating the healthcare system, and advocate for necessary changes.

Highlights from the event include, but are not limited to, the following:

(1) Community members wanted to know how COVID-19 impacts the way people access healthcare and what can be done to support them.

- (2) The critical importance of having culturally competent care from providers who reflect your community was a consistent takeaway.
- (3) Culturally competent care related to increasing access to traditional medicines and Indian health services was further highlighted in the 492 survey respondents identifying as American Indian, Alaska Native, Native, Indigenous, and/or tribally affiliated.
- (4) As next steps, participants expressed a desire to see the data shared with community members and decision-makers.



IT'S AN ONGOING PROCESS

TO HELP ENSURE THAT EFFORTS TO ADVANCE CHANGE ARE GUIDED BY COMMUNITY

In service to HealthierHere's values of equity, community, and partnerships, our next steps will include continued engagement with Community Grants Alumni to ensure that the data informs HealthierHere's collaborative work. This engagement includes supporting Community Grants Alumni in sharing the results of the data with their communities and learning from them what stories the data should tell in a summary report.

As a result of this ongoing process, HealthierHere's efforts to advance systemic change within the healthcare system and social determinants of health services will continue to be guided by voices from communities impacted by health disparities.

In a time when racism is being publicly declared a public health crisis, and communities continue to be disproportionately impacted by COVID-19, we hope that this process of data collection, analysis, and ownership can serve as a model for sustainable, community-centered decision-making that results in improved health outcomes for all.
