# **Equity Moment**

The Equity moment was shared by Giselle Zapata-Garcia. They reflected on the last time they shared the Equity moment and how they spoke about a community member and their



experience at Seattle Childrens Hospital. The last time Giselle expressed her concerns regarding the community member treatment as well as the cultural practices at the hospital. They spoke about the role of providers to serve the community and learn about them as well. The specific case they are speaking about the family speaks Spanish, but they are actually from an indigenous community and they have different practices they follow. They spoke about the importance of communication within the teams in the hospital and how that's changing. Giselle appreciated how Seattle Children's Hospital was able to look at these types of situations and make improvements to their internal systems.

John highlighted a variety of initiatives HealthierHere has engaged in and their effect in cross-sector collaboration, addressing disparities. # November 2023 Chief Executive Officer Report

Dear Governing Board Members,

With fall fully settled in, I hope you're enjoying the rituals that come with this time of year. I personally enjoy pumpkin carving and decorating for Halloween.

This November, HealthierHere is proud to celebrate National Native American Heritage Month. Please join us in honoring the cultures, traditions, and histories of American Indian, Alaska Native, and Indigenous (AI/AN/I) peoples who have lived on these lands since time immemorial. As part of our efforts to improve Tribal health and uphold Tribal sovereignty, HealthierHere remains committed to ongoing learning and action to implement the principles of actively decolonizing and undoing settler colonialism in our work and relationships, as outlined in our Equity Definitions and Guidelines.

This month we celebrate completing two cohorts of participants in the <u>Wrestling with the Truth of Colonization training</u> – including staff, board members, board member alternates, and committee members. Having gone through the training myself, I can personally attest to the learning and reflection that comes from this powerful experience. At its core, this challenging but critical work is about mending and building trusting relationships.

We don't see this training as a one-and-done. It is part of a larger process of what it means to be in good relations with each other, also interconnected with advancing equity and becoming an anti-racist organization. These activities help us uncover and face the harmful historical relationships, policies, procedures, and cultural norms sown by colonization. Then, they call us to challenge their ripple effects today.

I look forward to continuing to explore how to apply the lessons and calls-to-action from the training across HealthierHere's efforts. I am grateful to the training leaders Miskanahk Iskwew and Riley Irish and, HealthierHere's Community and Tribal Engagement Manager Abriel Johnny, and others who have developed and guided so many of us through this training.

Below, please see updates from HealthierHere and our partners that demonstrate the importance of leaning into and leveraging strong relationships across our efforts.



#### **Cross-Sector Collaboration**

At our August board meeting, we highlighted a HealthierHere-supported partnership between Downtown Emergency Service Center (DESC) and Community Health Plan of Washington (CHPW) focused on "Co-Designing a Low-Barrier Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) Benefit."

Since that meeting, DESC and HealthierHere met with the Healthcare Authority (HCA) to share learnings and successes from this collaboration, including a patient story of someone with complex needs. The meeting was a great success, and HCA invited us to take this information to other Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) to demonstrate how they could also move into this space and adopt this approach. HCA also committed to following up with us in six months to get updates on our progress.

I'd like to recognize HealthierHere's staff members Bethlehem Kebret and Madelyn Devoe for their leadership in this work and convening. This was an excellent example of cross-sector collaboration, where a payor, government entity, on-the-ground provider, and convener can come together to co-create sustainable solutions that improve health outcomes.

### **Addressing Disparities**

This winter, HealthierHere and our partners are wrapping up several projects focused on **Reducing Emergency Department (ED) Health Disparities**. HealthierHere funded and supported providers to leverage data they had through Point Click Care or their EHRs to identify disparities in follow-up care after ED visits, and to improve follow-up care for that population. Knowing ED visits and acute care in hospitals are the highest cost to our healthcare system, by helping partners better meet patients' needs in primary care and lower-acuity settings, we can help ensure people get what they need to avoid ED visits, and also reduce costs for the system.

HH worked closely with partners to hone their focus populations and identify data sources, help define success, and provide feedback on workflows to ensure follow-up care was appropriate.

Below are two examples of our partners' efforts:

Seattle Children's worked on implementing the Caring Contacts program to improve follow-ups within 7 days of ED visits for children 13 – 18 with suicidal ideation. Adolescents struggled with decreased mental health during the pandemic, and health systems have been strapped to address this increased need. Seattle Children's created an innovative, low-barrier way to reach this high-risk population through an outreach program that sends encouraging messages and resources to teens once per month after they leave the ED. By the end of the program, after overcoming obstacles related to privacy, consent, and language access, Seattle Children's enrolled over 40 adolescents in text follow-ups. The program will continue beyond this year and they aim to increase enrollment and track successes to share back.



ACRS worked on improving patient follow-up within 7 days of ED visit for adults who identify as Bhutanese and have multiple high-risk chronic conditions. They implemented new workflows to coordinate care more effectively for this population they identified as having disproportionately high ED visit rates. Case managers interviewed clients to assess their well-being and get them set up with their primary doctors' office as quickly as possible. They also coordinated with primary caregivers and created a reporting system within EHR to pull out the data.. In their last data collection period, they were able to follow up with 18 out of 21 clients in their target population. 41% of the follow-up was on the same day, and 59% of the follow-up was done in 6 days. They foresee that continuing psychoeducation on the importance of medication adherence, social engagement, and a routine visit to primary care will help their clients maintain their health and live healthier lives.

### **Equity in Process and Effect**

Starting soon, I'll be engaging with representatives from organizations across HealthierHere's multi-sector network to build relationships and provide a forum for folks to share about their work, priorities, and communities. Through these CEO Meet & Greets, I want to make it clear that I am not too busy or operating at a level that prevents me from coming to the table to play. To establish equity in the process, nurturing trustful and two-way relationships is the foundation. I look forward to getting to know and learning from the diverse organizations and people that comprise our collaborative and beginning to envision our shared futures.

#### **System Transformation**

We are deep in planning for the HealthierHere Community Hub under MTP 2.0. Our goal is that by creating a sustainable Hub, we can tangibly create and steward the system transformation and change that our collective envisions.

Building on the vision for the Hubs, the ACHs are developing a Social Care Network model for Washington State. This model formally organizes community-based organizations (CBOs) into an equity-centered network of social care providers, creating a single point of contracting for social care needs. We think this creates a tremendous opportunity for ACHs and MCOs to partner, even beyond the waiver.

State Medicaid programs have increasingly focused on addressing social determinants of health over the past decade; however, these efforts continue to fall short of the need, and the network of community-based services needs strengthening. A Managed Network Model would allow us to sustainably bridge health and social care systems, and better manage health-related social needs. Additionally, this model would build on existing strengths and relationships.



The ACHs are still in early conversations developing this framework, and I will share more information as the work progresses. We are excited to continue to find ways to create the change we – and our communities – want to see in our systems.

## **HealthierHere Internal Operations**

We are currently developing a formalized Recruitment Policy to ensure that all recruitment and selection procedures follow fair and consistent practices, promoting diversity and equity in the recruitment and selection of employment as well as in alignment with HealthierHere's Equity Definitions and Guidelines. We aim to finalize and begin implementing the policy in the coming months.

On the recruitment front, we are now hiring for the role of <u>Partnership and Engagement Manager</u>. Please share the opportunity with folks in your networks.

We pleased to welcome <u>Julia lanelli</u> to HealthierHere as our first Community Hub Training & Support Specialist and **Haley Osborn**, our newest Community Hub Referral Specialist! We are also excited to share that Tavish Donahue has stepped into the role of Community Hub Director, and Bethlehem Kebret recently took on the role of Community Hub Manager. All of these team members' leadership and expertise will be critical to set us up for a successful launch and management of the Hub, and stewarding the many relationships that make it run.

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As the HealthierHere team grows and our work evolves, I know we will come together to face the challenges and create an organization that is stronger and more resilient than ever.

Thank you for your continued engagement, and I look forward to seeing you at this month's meeting.
