Success Stories



James was making plans to move into an apartment with a friend when his friend died unexpectedly. Recovering from a broken leg, he knew he couldn't do it alone, and ended up in the hospital. James then went into a nursing home for rehab. The social worker at the nursing home referred James to Phyllis Reynolds at Disability Network Eastern Michigan's (DNEM) Community Transition Services (CTS) Program.

James and Phyllis worked well together. Phyllis diligently looked for a place that worked for him. James uses a wheelchair so accessibility was important. The apartment search was challenging because most complexes in Oakland County required a gross monthly income of at least three times the monthly rent. Ultimately, James rented a sunny studio in downtown Detroit with a good setup that only required an income of two times the monthly rent.

"The CTS program made the transition much easier," said James. It paid his security deposit and first month's rent. The program helped him with food and the necessities needed to start his household. He was thrilled that full-sized furniture fit in the studio apartment. "The CTS program was a huge benefit for me," he said.

James is enjoying doing whatever he wants whenever he wants. "The nursing home was good when I needed it, but it was restrictive. It would have been easy to stay there but I had to get the doctor's approval every time I wanted to leave. I never could have gone to a concert or Arts Beats and Eats if I was living there," said James. He is now exploring the city and loves having his freedom back.

"I'd like to thank Disability Network of Eastern Michigan and AT&T for the laptop. I plan to use it for business purposes, like job searches, medical virtual appointments, and for social reasons. Thank you for what you do for the Veterans!" - Harold Washington




