Celebrating Safety Milestones

We proudly celebrated a major safety milestone: SPF reached 1 million safe hours without incidents. Additionally, the Sur LNG Fire Station Building marked its half-million safe hours, highlighting our collective commitment to maintaining a safe working environment.





Safety Incidents and Learnings

During June, Dougals OHI reported a minor Lost Time Injury. A carpenter sustained a laceration to his left thumbnail while operating a hole saw cutter during ceiling work. Fortunately, he received appropriate medical care and was prescribed a three-day leave for recovery. This incident underscores the importance of safety vigilance and proper tool handling onsite.





Environmental Awareness and Engagement

In honour of World Environment Day, awareness sessions and campaigns were conducted across all project sites. These initiatives aimed to promote environmental consciousness among our teams and reinforce our responsibility toward sustainable practices.

Health & Wellbeing Initiatives

At Douglas OHI, safety is not just a priority, it's a mindset embedded in our daily operations. This month, we have multiple highlights that reflect our ongoing commitment to health, safety, and environmental excellence:

"Stop, Look, Think": Field Risk Assessment Initiative

A "Stop, Look, and Think" approach to field risk assessment emphasises the importance of pausing before starting work to identify potential hazards, assess associated risks, and implement necessary controls. This proactive approach encourages workers to actively engage with their surroundings, promoting a safer work environment by minimising potential accidents and injuries. The training was delivered on-site in multiple languages to educate the workforce through daily toolbox talks, enhancing the promotion of a safe working environment and a proactive safety culture.

Key Elements of a "Stop, Look, and Think" Risk Assessment:

Stop

Halt all activity and take a moment to survey the work area. Consider the task at hand and the environment.

Look

Identify potential hazards. This includes physical hazards (e.g., uneven surfaces, overhead obstructions), chemical hazards, and ergonomic issues.

Resume work

"Stop, Look, Think" Principle for Field Level Hazard Assessment

Look around & identify hazards

Control hzards

Think

Assess the risks associated with each identified hazard. Determine the likelihood of an incident and the potential severity of injury or damage. Implement appropriate control measures. This could involve using personal protective equipment, modifying work procedures, or utilising specialised equipment.







Benefits of this approach:

At Douglas OHI, we believe that recognition is a powerful driver of performance, motivation, and sustained excellence. Our Monthly Incentive Programme, implemented at our Abu Dhabi project site, is a testament to this philosophy, designed not only to reward outstanding contributions but to reinforce the behaviours that align with our core values and project goals.

From proactive adherence to HSSE protocols to innovative problem-solving and strong team leadership, the programme highlights the many ways in which our workforce contributes to successful project delivery.

The incentive programme also serves as a platform for reinforcing key priorities across the site, whether it is raising safety awareness, meeting project milestones, or embracing sustainable practices. Regular recognition helps maintain momentum and ensures that operational excellence is not a one-off achievement but a shared standard.

Initiatives like this are instrumental in ensuring that our workforce remains engaged, motivated, and aligned with Douglas OHI's mission to deliver with integrity, innovation, and care.

Project 5 Million Safe Manhours Celebration

Recenly our project in Abu Dhabi achieved the 5 million safe manhours milestone. As one of the major subcontractors, Douglas OHI LLC has completed its own 2 million safe manhours, which is a major contribution to project achievement. A memento was received from our clients to mark the company's dedication to proactively implementing the project HSE requirements, achieving milestones, and meeting the requirements.

As part of our ongoing commitment to health, safety, and environmental excellence, we are pleased to share key highlights and initiatives from across our projects this month:

Promoting Site Safety and Wellbeing

Multiple safety campaigns were conducted across our projects, focusing on housekeeping, heat stress awareness, working at height, scaffolding safety, defensive driving, and confined space entry. Health and wellness activities, including medical checks and awareness sessions, were also organised to promote employee wellbeing.



Actions for a Greener Tomorrow

In support of World Environment Day under the theme "Beat Plastic Pollution," dedicated collection boxes were installed for plastic recycling, trees were planted across the sites, and additional bird boxes were placed to enhance local biodiversity. Our team also joined the Client and subcontractors for a beach cleaning campaign.



Learning from Real Events On-Site

This month, the Zuluf Project reported a property damage incident involving a pickup truck bumper that was slightly damaged after contacting a foundation within the work area. At Riyas, five near misses were recorded, including a high-potential incident where a trailer truck carrying a 30 tonne manhole experienced a tire burst while reversing.

Training and Emergency Preparedness

Internal training sessions covered scissor lift operation, working at height, confined space entry, fire safety, and manual handling. Externally, 19 staff completed OSHA 30-Hour General Industry training, while 17 staff were certified in Basic Life Support First Aid.

A fire emergency and evacuation drill were successfully conducted at the Zuluf laydown area, reinforcing our preparedness. Additionally, a camp inspection was carried out at Riyas, ensuring all welfare, kitchen, clinic, and firefighting facilities met compliance standards.

We appreciate everyone's continued commitment to health, safety, and environmental excellence across our projects.

(gloves): Keeps my hands safe from sharp or hot objects.

Chaps pants:

Protects my legs from cuts and sharp tools.

(boots): Prevents slips and protects my feet from heavy things.

Ear plugs: Protects my ears from loud noises and helps prevent hearing damage.

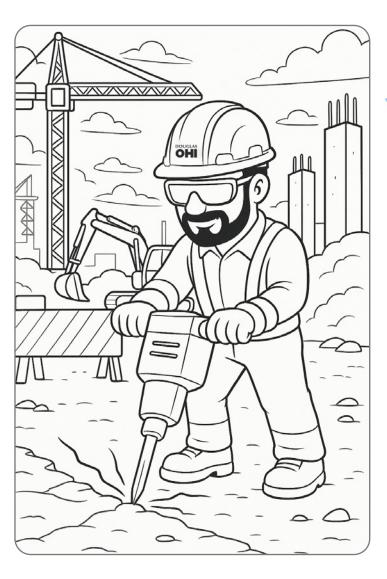
