As we move into the final quarter of 2025, our commitment to safety, environmental responsibility, and operational excellence remains unwavering. Here's a roundup of key incidents, initiatives, and achievements from September that underscore our collective dedication to a safe and sustainable work environment. Additionally, DNV completed a periodic & scope extension external audit, reaffirming our compliance standards and identifying continuous improvement opportunities.

Incident Reporting

In September, we had one restricted work case, one road traffic accident and three minor first aid cases related to hand injuries.

Safety Initiatives & Training- Awareness & Campaigns

Our "Let's Protect Our Hands" campaign has rolled out across the region, emphasising hand safety through workshops and awareness drives. The focus remains on preventing hand injuries, our most common workplace injury.





Embracing Digital Safety & Environmental Stewardship

Our safety data is now more accessible than ever through Power BI dashboards, enabling real-time monitoring of monthly reports, health performance, and audit records. These digital tools are vital in driving data-driven safety and environmental strategies.



First Aid – CPR training

To strengthen emergency preparedness and enhance lifesaving capabilities at the workplace, First Aid and CPR training sessions were conducted for employees. The training focused on equipping participants with practical skills to respond effectively to medical emergencies such as cardiac arrest, choking, and unconsciousness before professional medical help arrives.







Training - Power tools

A specialised Power Tools Safety Training session was conducted in collaboration with DeWalt, focusing on the safe operation, maintenance, and handling of various power tools used on-site. The session aimed to enhance workers' technical knowledge and reinforce safe work practices to prevent injuries and equipment damage.

Environmental Stewardship – Plantation Initiative

As part of our ongoing commitment to environmental stewardship and sustainability, a plantation drive was organised to enhance green cover and promote ecological balance within and around the facility. Employees actively participated in planting trees and native species, reinforcing awareness about the importance of biodiversity and carbon absorption in mitigating climate change.





Housekeeping Campaign

Employees actively participated in cleaning drives, tool and material organisation, and waste segregation activities. Regular inspections were conducted to identify improvement areas and reinforce accountability for workplace upkeep.

Importance of the Permit to Work System

A Permit to Work (PTW) system is crucial in construction safety because it provides a formal, documented method for managing high-risk activities by identifying hazards, ensuring safety precautions are implemented, and improving communication between management and workers, ultimately preventing accidents, ensuring legal compliance, and fostering a stronger safety culture. By authorising specific tasks only after they've been assessed and controlled, PTW systems act as a vital safety barrier, reducing incidents and protecting workers.



In our project (HGCP – 2) team conducted a Permit to Work awareness campaign to increase the awareness of the people about the permit to work system requirements, which followed in the site and the steps to be followed. The campaign emphasised more on the importance of the permit-to-work system and the roles and responsibilities of the signatories involved.

Flu Awareness and Vaccine Information

Habshan site team and Medic conducted a Health awareness session at site level to increase the awareness on flu and the importance of receiving vaccine. As we head into the flu season, we want to prioritise the health and safety of everyone working on our projects. The flu is highly contagious and can cause serious health problems.

The Importance of Flu Awareness

We strongly encourage our team to take precautionary measures to protect themselves from the influenza virus. Key preventive measures include:





Frequent Handwashing: Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.



Respiratory Etiquette: Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze.



Stay Home When Sick: If you or any member of your team experiences flu-like symptoms (fever, cough, body aches, etc.), please stay in your room until you are fever-free.





Benefits of Getting the Flu Vaccine

The single best way to protect against the flu and its serious consequences is to get a flu vaccine. We highly recommend that all our staff and employees receive one this season.

KSA

In September 2025, our projects maintained a strong focus on health, safety, and environmental excellence through proactive reporting, awareness, training, and preparedness activities, reinforcing our commitment to a safe and sustainable work culture.

A major milestone was achieved at the Zuluf Project, reaching 5 million safe manhours, with Majan DOHI contributing 4 million safe manhours to this accomplishment. Our client, Fisia and the owner company AWS recognised our efforts by presenting us with the Best Contractor Award. Additionally, we proudly received individual honours for Best HSE Manager and Best Supervisor among all contractors.



Incident Reporting

A total of four near-miss cases were reported during the month, zero at Zuluf and four across Riyas (CK002). These reports demonstrate our workforce's growing vigilance and commitment to identifying and addressing potential hazards before they escalate.



Safety Campaigns

Enhanced Plant Equipment Awareness Campaigns were conducted at RNGL, where a forklift wooden model was fabricated and used to demonstrate safe lifting operations and highlight key forklift safety practices.

Toolbox Talks & Trainings

At Zuluf, mass toolbox talks focused on scaffolding safety, LOTO, pre-commissioning awareness, and the correct use of the Venom Extractor Kit in case of a snake bite. At Riyas, sessions centered on fire prevention, OSHA standards, and First Aid & CPR. Training programmes also emphasised STARRT card procedures.







Camp Inspection and Audits

Both sites and camps underwent internal audits. An external DNV Audit was conducted at the Zuluf project. While Riyas was inspected by Aramco and TR representatives.

Catering staff at Riyas participated in internal refresher training sessions covering hygiene, PPE compliance, food safety (CCP 3), and store management (FIFO & FEFO).

Emergency Preparedness

Emergency medical drills were carried out at both RNGL project locations, including the Lifting Station and building facilities, ensuring the teams remain ready to respond swiftly to any incident.

Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs)

Non-communicable diseases (NCDs) are chronic medical conditions that are not spread from person to person. Unlike infectious diseases, NCDs are often caused by a combination of genetic, physiological, environmental, and behavioural factors.

They are currently the leading cause of death globally, responsible for over 70% of deaths worldwide, according to the World Health Organisation (WHO).



Common Types of NCDs

- 1 High blood pressure (Hypertension)
- 2 Heart disease
- 3 Diabetes (high blood sugar)
- 4 Cancer
- 5 Chronic lung problems (like asthma or COPD)

Risk Factors

- 1 Unhealthy diet (high in sugar, salt, and fat)
- 2 Physical inactivity (Lack of exercise)
- 3 Smoking and Chewing tobacco
- 4 Alcohol Consumption
- 5 Obesity
- 6 Too much stress
- 7 Environmental factors (e.g., air pollution)

Prevention and Control

The good news is that NCDs are largely preventable.

- Eat healthy: More vegetables and fruits, less fried and salty food.
- Quit smoking: Ask the nurse for help if you want to stop.
- Reduce alcohol: Limit drinking, especially after work.
- Check your health: Get your blood pressure and sugar checked regularly.
- Exercise: Even 15-30 minutes of walking helps.
- Manage stress: Talk to someone if you're feeling low or stressed.

Why NCDs Matter?

NCDs not only reduce life expectancy but also severely impact quality of life. Many people live with these diseases for years, facing complications and disabilities that affect their ability to work, care for their families, or lead independent lives.

Why Importance of Construction Workers Care?

Long working hours, stress, poor diet, and smoking are common on construction sites.

Many workers ignore signs like tiredness, chest pain, or frequent urination. NCDs can cause serious health problems, hospital stays, or even sudden death if not treated.

Conclusion

Non-communicable diseases are a growing public health concern. As nurses, we are at the frontline of prevention, education, and management. Promoting healthy behaviours and early interventions can significantly reduce the burden of NCDs in our communities.

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

Dougie's Quick Guide to Fighting Fire Safely



Dougie says:

If you discover a fire stay calm, raise the alarm, and assess if it's safe to extinguish.

Never attempt to fight a large or spreading fire. Evacuate and call emergency services.



Locate the nearest fire extinguisher quickly and check the label for the correct type.

Always make sure you have a clear escape route before approaching the fire.



Remember: P-A-S-S - Pull, Aim, Squeeze, Sweep.

Aim at the base of the fire, not the flames. Keep a safe distance and move side to side.



Ensure the fire is fully out and report the incident immediately.

Do not turn your back on the fire until it is completely extinguished. Replace or service used extinguishers.

Why Fire Safety Matters

Fires can happen unexpectedly.
A small spark, faulty wiring, or even overheated equipment can quickly become dangerous.
That's why every team member must know how to act fast, stay calm, and use the right extinguisher safely.

How I Stay Safe Around Fire

- Stay calm: Don't panic. Assess if the fire is small and can be extinguished safely.
- Raise the alarm: Always alert others and call for help before taking action.
- Use the right extinguisher: Check the label for the correct type (CO₂ for electrical fires).
- Remember P.A.S.S.: Pull, Aim, Squeeze, Sweep. Aim at the base of the fire, not the flames.
- Report and replace: Once the fire is out, inform your supervisor and service the used extinguisher.
