#### From the Editor:

I wonder how many of you, like me, were reminded of the 1974 cyclone "Wanda" during the deluge and strong winds in Brisbane on Friday, 5<sup>th</sup> March. We certainly are experiencing some extremes here in Queensland, especially of heat and our summer this year is reminiscent of the conditions which applied during my 'younger'

days. Maybe weather does go in cycles. One thing seems to have changed though. Monday's Courier Mail referred to the loss of power during the 'storm' on Friday. I think of storms as the electrical type and I was confused for a while, until I realized that the reference was to the gales and rain which occurred that day.

Most of you would have experienced extremes of weather and it is hard to define which is worse – heat, cold, rain, drought, fire, gales or no wind at all and sultry. Biting cold can be a killer but so then can extreme heat as evidenced in the recent heatwave when 28 people, mostly elderly, died in Brisbane. Anyway such amazing events stay etched in the memory or are recorded in diaries as mine are and I will tell you about them.

Whilst living in London and working at our West End Branch, I experienced four days of smog from 4/12/1962 and my London workmates told me that forever afterwards, I would be able to say 'Yes, I was there for the 1962 Smog'. This exhibits the sense of humour which enabled the Londoners to cope with the awful conditions. For me, walking from the tube station to my 'digs' after work in the dark with swirling fog, poor visibility, deadened sounds and crossing roads with traffic scarcely visible was alarming. The buses ran until the last night when smog density beat them. During daylight (limited at that time of the year) the fog lifted to the first floor of buildings only making the atmosphere quite claustrophobic. After this smog, the Authorities brought in strict regulations to ensure that there were no more smogs, just fogs. London lies in the Thames valley which makes it prone to the vagaries of the weather.

On my last trip to the UK in early 1996, I drove 40 miles alone in a large hire car through dense fog from Charteris across the fens to Peterborough to catch a train to London. I was frightened. It was eerie and scary but what I could see through the 50 metre visibility was breathtaking. It was a magical white world of frost with the stark bare trees, fences, fields and everything else outlined in icicles. I followed the tail-lights of the car in front to get my directions. On reaching Peterborough the fog was not as thick but I had trouble locating the railway station where I had to return the car and, in my anxiety, I entered a roundabout to find myself going the wrong way and facing oncoming cars. I stopped immediately and so

did they and gave me time to do a 'U' turn and exit. Eventually I found a car park and asked a woman there for directions and so reached the station.

On that holiday, whilst on a train in southern Denmark traveling from Odense to Svendborg, I though that I was going to be stranded in a snow storm but on my arrival at Svendborg I was relieved to find it clear of snow. The snow scenes had been fantastic, so I appreciated this experience.

Snow falls are enchanting and I recall the joy I felt on first seeing it and hearing it fall in London. However, another event I was there for was the 'deep freeze of 1962/3' – began 26/12/62. The temperature in London did not rise above freezing for 6 weeks and it was a white world of snow and ice. I recall being out sightseeing when I was so miserable and in pain from the cold, that I just wanted to sit down on the gutter and cry. Even though we wore thick overcoats, lined boots, lined gloves and head coverings, it was miserably cold out of doors, hot in the tube trains and shops and warm at work. I developed painful chilblains as did lots of others but overall, I managed quite well despite having only a one bar heater in my room and about 6 blankets on my bed - plus a hot water bottle! Now when I stay with my friends in London and the UK their homes are centrally heated and so comfortable. Those who still have fireplaces like me to sit close to the fire and they really are so cosy!

Another problem of the deep freeze was that the points on the underground froze and one could be stuck for some time in a tube in a tunnel with the sounds of the other tubes flying through adjoining tunnels and one would just hope that when one heard a train coming, that it was not in the same tunnel. A lot of my workmates travelled to work by train and these were overcrowded because people chose to travel by public transport rather than drive in the awful conditions. I was told a couple of amusing experiences they had. On one train someone began to 'moo' as though they were a mob of cattle and the laughter of fellow passengers broke the tension. To one girl's shock, in the crush she found that she was caressing a stranger's arm and not that of her boyfriend!

Maybe these chilly stories will make you feel a bit cooler in the heat we are experiencing. Perhaps being hot in better than being cold –

that is why so many people come to live in Sunny Queensland.
