Throughout 2025, our teams on the ground have impacted **112,693 people across 11 countries**: Armenia, Egypt, India, Iraq, Jordan, Kenya, Lebanon, Nigeria, Syria, South Sudan, and Turkey, making 2025 **our largest impact year to date**. This impact was made possible through the generosity of our donors who chose to invest in our projects.

Our work continued to focus on those most in need: **widows, orphans, elderly, and vulnerable women and girls, with an emphasis on persecuted Christians**. Many of whom are displaced or at risk of displacement.

Through both urgent humanitarian aid and long-term solutions: agriculture, community development, education, healthcare, and vocational training, we are helping restore stability in some of the world's most unstable and volatile places.



IMPACT DISTRIBUTION





HOW WE MEASURE IMPACT

WHAT COUNTS AS IMPACT?

We count individuals who directly receive support through our programs, including:

- Food assistance, medical care, education, and emergency aid.
- Participation in training, vocational, or agricultural initiatives.
- Access to infrastructure such as water systems, energy, or community development initiatives.

Each person counted has directly benefited from a completed project during the reporting year.

MEASURING INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES

In many regions, aid is delivered at the household level rather than to individuals.

When a project reports impact by family:

- We estimate the total number of individuals using country-specific average household sizes.
- This approach ensures impact is neither overstated nor underestimated.
- Household size data is based on national statistics and local partner verification.

This method allows us to accurately reflect the reach of each project.



MIDDLE EAST PROJECTS



Regional Context:

Armenia has absorbed **over 100,000 displaced families fleeing violence** and forced displacement from Artsakh (Nagorno-Karabakh). Many arrived having lost their homes, livelihoods, and access to basic necessities, placing immense strain on already vulnerable communities.

Executed Initiatives:

- **Education Center (January 2025 - Present):** Supporting approximately 400 displaced children from Karabakh with school supplies, books, and access to teachers.
- **Medical Support (February 2025):** Provided medical care, medications, and infant nutritional support to around 70 displaced families, approximately 250 individuals.
- **Food Canning Facility (March 2025 – Present):** Working on developing a multifunctional food production and training center focused on food preservation and long-term sustainability that will support more than 250 families.
- **Church Renovation and Sewing School (July 2025 – Present):** Restored a historic Armenian Assyrian church that was damaged in conflict. Within the church we launched a sewing school empowering 30 women, many of them widows, with income-generating skills, helping them provide for their families, about 150 people.



EGYPT

Regional Context:

Egypt faces significant economic despair with **21% living in poverty and nearly half of households struggling with food insecurity**. Rising living costs, high inflation, and limited access to education and healthcare, especially in rural and marginalized areas, have intensified the need for humanitarian support. **#42 on Open Doors World Watch List of countries with the highest levels of Christian persecution.**

Executed Initiatives:

- **Chicken Farm (December 2024 - Present):** Established a chicken farm to provide eggs and sustainable income for vulnerable Christian families, roughly 180 people.
- **Wheat Farm (January 2025 - Present):** Planted and harvested five acres of wheat, distributing it to approximately 2,500 Christian villagers facing persecution and economic hardship.
- **Medical Training and Medication Distribution (June 2025):** Trained local women and elders in first aid, blood pressure, diabetes, and heart attack response; providing them with blood pressure monitors and glucose testers. We also distributed medications to 275 individuals.
- **Education Support (September 2025 - Present):** Supported around 150 students at Durunka Monastery with books, bags, and supplies to help families stay rooted amid growing instability.



IRAQ

Regional Context:

Conflict, terrorism, and sectarian violence have **displaced more than 1.5 million** people, with **2.7 million still in need of humanitarian assistance**. Minority communities, especially Christians in Northern Iraq, continue to suffer from the aftermath of ISIS occupation, ongoing conflict, food insecurity, and damaged infrastructure, making recovery slow and fragile. **#18 on Open Doors World Watch List of countries with the highest levels of Christian persecution.**

Executed Initiatives:

- **Children Cancer Hospital Support (December 2024 - February 2025):** Provided transportation for parents of 50 patients and distributed food, clothes, books, and other education materials for the patients.
- **School Reconstruction and Operation (January 2025 - Present):** Rebuilt a war-damaged school near Sharanesh, restoring education for around 200 displaced students, and helping their parents get back to work to support their families.
- **School Reestablishment (March 2025 - Present):** Established a second school in Northern Iraq, supporting over 300 Christian students after prolonged disruption.
- **Olive and Fig Farm (March 2025 - Present):** Planted olive and fig trees, dug a water canal, and created a small field pond to irrigate their land. This initiative is helping 20 farmers, created jobs for another 50 workers, and providing food security for over 250 people.
- **Land Restoration & Agriculture (April 2025 – Present):** Returned confiscated Christian lands, restoring farming for 30 farmers, creating 200 jobs, and benefiting over 1,550 family members across three villages.



Executed Initiatives (Continued):

- **Emergency Support After ISIS Attack (April 2025):** Assisted injured Assyrian Christians in Duhok and restored destroyed water systems for affected communities.
- **Farmer Support Program (May 2025 - Present):** Supported 35 Christian farmers with land preparation and spring planting, benefiting around 200 people.
- **Library and After-School Center (July 2025 – Present):** Established a library and tutoring center in Tal Kayf, equipping over 300 children and adults with learning resources to encourage families to remain in Iraq.
- **Education initiative in Baghdad (November 2025 - Present):** Equipping 65 children with books and stationery while providing advanced training for three teachers, strengthening classrooms and creating a stronger foundation for lasting learning.
- **Supporting Orphaned Christian Children (December 2025 – Present):** After war left more than 450 Christian children orphaned in Northern Iraq, our team partnered with local priests to support education and essential care for the children living in their monasteries.
- **Security and Solar Lighting Initiative (December 2025 - Present):** Following repeated attacks on Christian sites and homes in Sarsing, our team partnered with the local municipality to restore safety. Solar-powered lighting and fuel for patrol vehicles enabled nightly security operations, helping protect approximately 700 Christian villagers amid ongoing threats.



JORDAN

Regional Context:

Jordan has become a key refuge for people displaced by conflict in Syria and Iraq, **hosting over 1.3 million Syrian refugees**, growing the strain on food systems, healthcare, education, and housing. Many refugees, especially Christian minorities, face prolonged displacement, economic hardship, and limited access to support, leaving families vulnerable and uncertain about their future. **#49 on Open Doors World Watch List of countries with the highest levels of Christian persecution.**

Executed Initiatives:

- **Community Kitchen and Training (June 2025 – Present):** Established a community kitchen in Amman, training around 50 displaced Christian women from Iraq in cooking skills to generate income and support their families after prolonged displacement. Also provided food to families in need, roughly 2,000 people.
- **Medical Support for Iraqi Christian Refugees (October 2025):** Covered the cost of essential medications for approximately 100 Christian Iraqi refugees in Amman, providing critical medical relief to families lacking formal aid.



Regional Context:

Lebanon faces a severe humanitarian crisis from economic collapse, political instability, and ongoing conflict. **Over 80% of the population lives in poverty**, with more than **3 million people facing food insecurity**. Christian communities in South Lebanon are particularly affected by displacement, destroyed infrastructure, and insecurity, putting homes and livelihoods at risk. **#74 on Open Doors World Watch List of countries with the highest levels of Christian persecution.**

Executed Initiatives:

- **Medical Clinic in Beirut (January 2025 - Present):** Established a new medical clinic to address those most in need due to regional conflict and those who cannot afford treatment for illness, sickness, injury, etc. This clinic provides service to an average of 160 people per week, totaling over 8,300 over the year.
- **Kitchen For Refugees (January 2025 - March 2025):** Supported about 100 families, around 500 people, from three Christian villages in South Lebanon by operating a small kitchen inside the safe house we provided.
- **Food and Hygiene Support for Displaced Families (January 2025):** Provided food packages and hygiene kits to over 120 displaced Christian families, around 800 individuals, who fled South Lebanon for safer areas.
- **Doctor Visits For Displaced Elderly Christians (January 2025):** Sent a doctor to give essential care to around 70 people needing medical attention.
- **Diesel Distribution For Refugees (February 2025):** Provided diesel to support around 350 people, helping them stay warm in the monasteries where they sought refuge from the ongoing war.
- **Medical Assistance During Active Conflict (March 2025):** Supplied essential medications to around 800 elderly Christian villagers unable to access pharmacies or hospitals due to ongoing violence.



Executed Initiatives (Continued):

- **Plant Distribution – Mount Lebanon (April 2025 – Present):** Distributed 35,000 vegetable and fruit plants to 500 families, supporting food security and sustainable income for roughly 3,000 individuals.
- **South Lebanon Medical Outreach (May 2025):** Delivered medications and coordinated doctor visits for approximately 50 displaced elderly individuals suffering from chronic illnesses.
- **Supporting the Return of Christians to South Lebanon (June – August 2025):** Encouraged safe return and long-term stability by providing food, medications, doctor visits, sleeping kits, psychological support, and essential services to over 1,000 people.
- **Medical Clinic Reconstruction (June 2025 – Present):** Rebuilt a war-damaged medical clinic, restoring access to doctors, diagnostics, and care for 1,500 patients every six months from surrounding Christian towns.
- **Agriculture Project – Phase 1 (August 2025 – Present):** Supported over 15 Christian farmers through land cultivation, water systems, and job creation, benefiting approximately 400 individuals.
- **Latin Church Reconstruction (July - August 2025):** Coordinated the reconstruction of the Latin Church in South Lebanon, a communal center serving three Christian villages and welcoming over 5,000 worshippers monthly.
- **Sustainable Chicken Farm (October 2025 – Present):** Launched a poultry farming initiative supporting 15 Christian farmers, strengthening household food security and income generation for roughly 250 people.
- **Bakery Project (November 2025 – Present):** Established a large bakery serving over 3,000 Christians across five war-affected villages, helping families remain on their land and avoid forced migration.



SYRIA

Regional Context:

Syria's civil war has **displaced over 6.9 million people**, with 5.6 million refugees abroad and **13 million in need of aid**. Over **60% live in poverty, and nearly 12 million face food insecurity**. Christian communities have been heavily targeted, reducing their population from **1.5 million in 2011 to under 500,000**, leaving families vulnerable and struggling to remain in their ancestral lands. **#6 on Open Doors World Watch List of countries with the highest levels of Christian persecution**.

Executed Initiatives:

- **Bakery Project (December 2024 - Present):** Created jobs for around 20 Christian workers, supporting nearly 100 family members, while also providing food to approximately 8,000 individuals throughout 2025.
- **Water System – East Syria (2024 – April 2025):** Supported 40 farmers and their families, around 300 Christians, with land preparation, planting wheat and barley, and distributing harvests to another 500 Christians.
- **Healing Trauma Victims (January - March 2025):** Provided medical care and emotional support to young women who survived brutal ISIS assaults and children recovering from the trauma of forced drug addiction.
- **Aid for Fleeing Christian Families (March – April 2025):** Distributed sleeping kits and food packages to roughly 6,500 individuals displaced by conflict.
- **Sewing Project for Widows in Rojava (March – June 2025):** Trained 50 widows in sewing and clothing production to start small businesses, supporting families in Ras Al Ain Camp.
- **Rescue of Katerina and Her Daughters (April 2025):** Relocated a widow and her children from extremists near the Turkish border to safety in East Syria.



SYRIA

Executed Initiatives (Continued):

- **Support for Christian Farmers (April 2025):** Assisted five farmers in Tal Tamer with planting, harvesting, and agricultural sustainability.
- **Honey Farm Project (May 2025):** Trained 35 Christians in Tal Abyad in beekeeping to produce income and stability for over 100 people.
- **Damascus Church Attack Support (June 2025):** Provided food packages and aid to roughly 250 victims and families after an attack on St. Elias Church.
- **Damascus Safe House (June 2025 – Present):** Supports over 300 displaced Christians with daily meals, protection, and operational needs.
- **Seed Production for Farmers (July 2025):** Produced and distributed seeds to 150 families, supporting sustainable agriculture for over 800 Christians.
- **Support for Families of Christian Defenders (July 2025 – Present):** Providing food and aid to over 2,000 individuals of Christians defending their communities.
- **Tree Planting and Land Support (July 2025 – Present):** Planted 350 apple, olive, and almond trees with 20 farmers to grow food for over 800 people.
- **Syrian Coast Community Kitchen (August 2025 – Present):** Trained 15 women and provided food to over 18,000 Christians.
- **Solar System Installation For Our Safe House (August 2025):** Installed solar panels, batteries, and generators for 170 Christians to ensure access to electricity at our safe house.
- **Humanitarian Support for Displaced Christians (September 2025 – Present):** Provided essential goods and food to over 25,000 internally displaced Christians, reaching individuals in camps and safe houses.



SYRIA

Executed Initiatives (Continued):

- **Doctor Visits For Those in Need (October 2025):** Provided examinations and treatment for chronic and severe cases, supporting over 200 Christians from the Syrian coast.
- **Saydnaya Shop for Christian Villagers (November 2025 – Present):** Supports 15 families, providing affordable goods and jobs, benefiting around 1,600 Christians monthly, roughly 20,000 annually.
- **Sewing Project for Christian Women (November 2025 – Present):** Trains and equips 35 women monthly, aiming to support 140 women, and 2,000 dependents over four months.
- **Support of Christian Businesses (December 2025):** Our team hosted an exhibition in Damascus for over 250 farmers and artisans, attracting over 10,000 visitors. Around 1,500 vulnerable Christians from 250 families benefited.



TURKEY

Regional Context:

Turkey is facing mounting humanitarian and economic pressures as it hosts the **world's largest refugee population, with over 3.5 million refugees**, primarily from Syria, living within its borders. Widespread inflation, unemployment, and rising living costs have pushed millions of Turkish citizens and refugees alike into poverty, increasing food insecurity and limiting access to basic services. **#41 on Open Door World Watch List of countries with the highest levels of Christian persecution.**

Executed Initiatives:

- **Aid Packages For Struggling Families (April 2025):** Our team distributed essential food packages to approximately 55 families, roughly 200 people, in Gaziantep. The packages included basic staples such as oil, rice, pasta, sugar, salt, and canned tuna. Several of the supported families are Christians connected to local churches we have worked with since our earthquake response in 2021–2022.
- **Medication Support for Displaced Christian Families (May 2025):** We provided essential medications to around 60 displaced Iraqi Christian families, roughly 330 people, living in Antakya. These families fled Iraq following ISIS violence in 2014 and remain stranded in Turkey due to failed migration applications. Many are living in severe poverty, with limited access to healthcare, education, and proper nutrition, particularly for their children.



AFRICA PROJECTS



Regional Context:

Kenya is facing significant humanitarian stress driven by change of climate, worsening food insecurity, and limited resources; it is also a major host country for refugees in East Africa. Security threats from extremist groups like al-Shabaab create localized instability, especially near the Somali border, and pockets of social vulnerability contribute to community tensions. **#53 on Open Doors World Watch List of countries with the highest levels of Christian persecution.**

Executed Initiatives:

- **Joel's Village School (All of 2025):** Supporting the school we built by providing education materials, teachers, and necessary supplies for over 120 students.
- **Joel's Village Farm (All of 2025):** Agriculture support for Joel's village to provide sustainable food security for the village and surrounding area.
- **Education at Green Peak Academy (All of 2025):** Provided school support for over 100 students with uniforms, books, tuition, and daily meals.
- **Orphanage Support and Farm Initiative (All of 2025):** We continued the operation of our orphanage taking care of 169 children, providing daily food through the farm run by the project manager.
- **Equipped and Solarized Borehole (January 2025 - Present):** We finished our borehole in Samburu Land to provide water for agriculture and the surrounding communities, helping over 300 people.
- **Support for Students and Families (February 2025):** Assisted 48 students and 17 households with school fees, food, housing, seeds, and farm land.
- **Culinary Training (April 2025 - Present):** Trained 15 vulnerable women in high-demand pastry skills for employment opportunities to support their families.



KENYA

Executed Initiatives (Continued):

- **Farming Support (April 2025 - Present):** Provided seeds and tools to 23 households across three counties to improve food security.
- **Education Support for Vulnerable Students (April 2025 - Present):** Covered fees, meals, and school supplies for 190 students from disadvantaged households.
- **Matepes Village Humanitarian Aid (April 2025):** Distributed food, clothing, and essential items to families in need while promoting sustainable income solutions.
- **Agriculture Project - Green Peak Academy (May 2025):** Harvested crops across our 15 acres of farmland to feed 150 students and support sustainable growth.
- **Sponsorship of Nursing Students (May 2025):** Supported 5 students at Trans-Mara Medical Training College in health education and community service.
- **Textbook and Learning Materials Distribution (June 2025):** Provided over 600 textbooks and materials to schools lacking resources.
- **Eye Medical Camp (June 2025):** Helped the facilitation of exams and treatment for 900 individuals, provided food for the patients as well.
- **Empowering 50 Farming Households (July 2025 - Present):** Supplied water solutions, tools, seeds, and fertilizers to boost productivity and livelihoods.
- **Training and Equipping Farmers (August 2025 - Present):** Supported 80 farmers with sustainable farming training and resources for long-term stability.
- **Poultry Farming Empowerment (August 2025 - Present):** Trained 54 young women, provided chicks and guidance for income generation.
- **Continued Farmer Support (September 2025 - Present):** Provided seeds and fertilizers to 40 farmers to strengthen harvests and improve food security.



KENYA

Executed Initiatives (Continued):

- **Osingo Village Borehole (November 2025):** Launched another borehole serving over 350 people, providing clean water for homes, irrigation, and livestock.
- **Medical Outreach Camp (November 2025):** Our team organized medical camps, supporting around 40 people with disabilities and health needs.
- **Green Peak Academy Expansion (December 2025 – Present):** Renovated and added classrooms for 60 Grade 6 students, increasing access to education.



Regional Context:

Nigeria faces a severe humanitarian crisis driven by extremist muslim terror groups. **Over 3.6 million people are displaced, 8.3 million need urgent assistance, and 4.4 million face food insecurity.** Violence has left **2.2 million children malnourished, disrupted education for 1.5 million children**, and restricted access to healthcare. Christian communities are heavily targeted and attacked weekly. **#7 on Open Door World Watch List of countries with the highest levels of Christian persecution.**

Executed Initiatives:

- **Sewing School (January 2025 – Present):** Trains young women in tailoring, providing sewing machines and hands-on instruction. Our second cohort of students graduated in December 2025, ready to start small businesses and support their families.
- **Chicken Farming (February 2025 – Present):** Trained 100 girls and children of widows from 10 communities in poultry farming. Each received 5 chicks to raise for food and income, creating sustainable livelihoods.
- **Education Sponsorship (March 2025 – Present):** Supporting 100 women pursuing the Nigeria Certificate in Education (NCE) at the National Teachers Institute, helping them gain a vocation and break cycles of marginalization.
- **Agriculture Project (April 2025 – Present):** Cultivated over 250 acres of farmland and equipped 135 widows with land, training, seeds, and tools. The project now supports over 2,300 people through sustainable crop production.
- **School Support (September 2025 - Present):** Provided education materials and sponsorship to 50 students who could not afford to go to school.



Regional Context:

South Sudan continues to face conflict, political instability, and recurring food insecurity, with over **2 million people displaced and 7 million in need of urgent aid**. Decades of war have left schools, healthcare facilities, and infrastructure in ruins, while communities, particularly Christians and other minorities, remain highly vulnerable. Ongoing violence and issues have made recovery slow and fragile. **#76 on Open Door World Watch List of countries with the highest levels of Christian persecution.**

Executed Initiatives:

- **Large-Scale Farm Project (May 2025 – Present):** In May 2025, our team secured a 250 acre plot of suitable farm land to establish a large-scale farm aimed at supporting communities facing severe hunger and food insecurity. The project began with extensive land clearing, carried out by a dedicated team of volunteers using heavy machinery to prepare the fields for cultivation. This initiative will provide a sustainable source of food for thousands of people in surrounding areas, offering hope to families struggling to access adequate nutrition. Future phases of the project include planting staple crops, introducing modern farming techniques, and creating a model for long-term agricultural development, with the goal of feeding entire communities and strengthening local livelihoods.



ASIA PROJECTS



Regional Context:

India faces a growing humanitarian crisis driven by poverty, natural disasters, and rising religious tensions. **Over 14 million people are displaced**, including nearly 2 million due to ethnic and religious conflicts, particularly in Jammu and Kashmir. **Food insecurity affects over 200 million people**, while Christians and other religious minorities face increasing persecution. **#12 on Open Door World Watch List of countries with the highest levels of Christian persecution**.

Executed Initiatives:

- **Food Support for Struggling Families (February – April 2025):** Provided essential food kits to over 2,000 families, around 9,000 people in restricted slum areas, helping meet basic nutritional needs.
- **Education and Training Program (February – November 2025):** Equipped 500 college students with structured training to support academic and personal development.
- **Supported Foundational Education (February – November 2025):** Enabled 150 schoolchildren to access foundational education through essential learning support.
- **Medical Care for the Elderly (November – December 2025):** Delivered medical care, therapeutic check-ups, and ongoing support to 200 elderly residents.
- **Visually Impaired Children Assistance (December 2025):** Supplied essential materials to 70 visually impaired children and facilitated inclusive recreational and engagement activities.
- **Medical Assistance for Autistic Children (December 2025):** Provided medical support and care to 150 autistic children and their parents in slum communities.

LOOKING AHEAD

The needs facing vulnerable communities across the Middle East, Africa, and South Asia continue to grow, but so does our commitment to respond with compassion, wisdom, and action. In the year ahead, our team will focus on deepening impact, strengthening local partnerships, and expanding sustainable solutions that help families remain rooted in their communities with dignity and hope.

2026 PRIORITIES

Our priorities lie in the countries that are facing the most dire need. We will invest in our projects in those areas as well as aim to expand our operations into the countries we do not currently serve. Following our standard approach, utilizing local leadership and establishing long-term initiatives, we plan to continue growing our reach to the people who need it the most.
