



Applying to medical school is a multi-year process that requires careful planning. While exact deadlines vary by school and application cycle, most successful applicants follow a similar timeline. Use this guide to stay organized and avoid last-minute stress.

12-16 Months Before Applying

The strongest medical school applications are built long before application season begins. This stage is focused on developing the academic, clinical, research, and service experiences that will ultimately demonstrate your readiness for medical school. By investing time in these areas early, you'll be in a much stronger position when it's time to apply.

Focus On:

- Completing prerequisite coursework
- Gaining clinical experience and physician shadowing opportunities
- Participating in research projects
- Engaging in community service and leadership activities
- Building relationships with professors, mentors, and supervisors
- Preparing for the MCAT

Tip: Keep a running record of your activities, awards, leadership roles, and accomplishments. You'll need this information when completing your application.

6-12 Months Before Applying

As application season approaches, it's time to begin assembling the materials that will tell your story to admissions committees. This phase focuses on taking the MCAT, securing recommendation letters, refining your personal statement, and researching schools to ensure your application accurately reflects your experiences and goals.

Focus On:

- Taking (or retaking) the MCAT
- Identifying and requesting recommendation letters
- Meeting with your pre-health advisor, if available
- Brainstorming and drafting your personal statement
- Researching medical schools and admissions requirements
- Reviewing application timelines and deadlines

Tip: Give recommenders plenty of notice and provide them with your resume, accomplishments, and other materials that may help them write a strong letter.

Application Season

Once applications open, attention shifts from preparation to execution. This is the time to finalize your application materials, submit your primary application, and respond promptly to any additional requests. Staying organized and submitting materials early can help maximize your opportunities throughout the admissions cycle.

Focus On:

- Finalizing your personal statement
- Completing your Work & Activities section
- Ordering official transcripts
- Submitting your primary application
- Completing secondary applications promptly
- Monitoring application portals for updates

Tip: Many medical schools use rolling admissions, meaning seats may be offered throughout the cycle. Applying early can be advantageous.

Interview Season

Receiving an interview invitation means a school sees potential in your application. Interviews provide an opportunity to expand on your experiences, communicate your motivation for pursuing medicine, and demonstrate the personal qualities that will make you a successful physician. Preparation and authenticity are key during this stage.

Focus On:

- Preparing for common interview questions
- Refining your "Why Medicine?" story
- Researching each school thoroughly
- Participating in mock interviews
- Practicing professional communication skills
- Sending thank-you notes following interviews

Tip: Be prepared to discuss your experiences, motivations, challenges, and future goals with confidence and authenticity.

Decision Season

As admissions decisions arrive, you'll have the opportunity to compare programs and determine which medical school is the best fit for your goals. Beyond acceptance offers, consider factors such as curriculum, clinical opportunities, student support services, residency outcomes, location, and financial considerations before making your final decision.

Focus On:

- Reviewing admissions offers
- Comparing financial aid and scholarship opportunities
- Attending admitted student events
- Speaking with current students and alumni
- Evaluating program fit and career opportunities
- Selecting the medical school that best aligns with your goals
