School Community and Characteristics

The John Carroll School is located in a suburban residential community, 20 miles northeast of Baltimore in Harford County, Maryland. Enrollment is currently 715 students in grades 9-12 with 176 in the Class of 2030 and 172 in the Class of 2027. The school offers a multi-level college preparatory curriculum, including 24 Advanced Placement courses, 9 Advanced and 32 Honors classes available to qualified students.
