Total amount of financial incomings from the donors for implementation of programs and projects (€ 778,061.21 / 1.79%)

In 2025, grant incomings comprised 1.79% (€ 778,061.21) of the total volume of assistance. These funds were directed at implementation of humanitarian, medical, research and social projects of Mission Kharkiv, ensuring provision of assistance to beneficiaries and development of program activity of the organization.

Oncology drug distribution (€ 6,328,257.77 / 14.28%)

14.28% of the total financing was determined at the Ukrainian Cancer Relief project. This allowed ensuring provision of free life-saving oncology drugs and complete treatment courses to patients, particularly in front-line and highly risky regions, where access to treatment remains critically limited.

General medicine (€ 35,583,365.10 / 83.13%)

The largest share of expenses (over 83.13%) was determined at the General Medicine program. These funds ensured large-scale supply of medical materials, drugs and equipment to healthcare institutions all over Ukraine, having significantly enhanced the capability of the medical system and ensured access to required assistance for thousands of patients.

Charitable assistance (GlobalGiving; € 28,191.41 / 0.07%)

Funds involved via the GlobalGiving international charity platform comprised 0.07% (€ 28,191.41) of the total volume of assistance. These incomings were directed at support of humanitarian and medical initiatives of Mission Kharkiv, allowing promptly reacting to needs of beneficiaries and supplementing implementation of the basic programs of the organization.

Economic activity (service provision; € 5,440.96 / 0.01%)

The incomings resulting from economic activity were 0.01% (€ 5,440.96) of the total volume of assistance.

Transport and equipment (assistance in kind; € 56,619.34 / 0.13%)

Assistance in kind in the form of transport and specialized equipment comprised 0.13% (€ 56,619.34) of the total volume of assistance. This category included automobiles of medical and social purpose, generators, thermal bags, wheelchairs and other equipment that enhanced the capability of Mission Kharkiv to ensure patient transportation, continuous assistance provision and reacting to humanitarian needs during the war.

Operating activities (€ 35,332.33 / 0.59%)

Operating expenses comprised 0.59% (€ 35,332.33) of the total volume of expenses and covered key expenses required for ensuring continuous work of programs and projects. This category includes administrative support, logistics, team activity coordination and other operating processes ensuring stable implementation of humanitarian and medical initiatives.

UKRAINE CANCER RELIEF

Basic facts:

20,804 units of drugs provided

1,292 beneficiaries

5 445 doses of drugs provided

The program is focused on provision of free antitumour drugs and accompanying medications to cancer patients in Ukraine.

In 2025, Mission Kharkiv continued implementation of its program, paying most attention to ensuring continuous access to treatment for patients in various regions of Ukraine. The number of reserved treatment courses significantly increased, which allowed the patients to continue their therapy and be confident about their treatment.

Within the year, 1,292 new patients received assistance, and the total number of doses provided reached 5,445. It should be noted that in 2025, the program also ensured access to the Oxaliplatin drug that expands the opportunities of treatment of complicated cases, particularly of metastatic colorectal cancer, and brings the level of treatment of Ukrainian cancer patients to the modern medical care standards.

FEEDBACK FROM BENEFICIARIES

Olena (not her real name)
Drug: Oxaliplatin

Ms. Olena received Oxaliplatin from Mission Kharkiv for the first time. Previously, especially when the drug was completely absent in Ukraine, she had had to purchase it abroad. According to her, it was extremely complicated both emotionally and financially. Despite her working on a full-time basis, her income would not have been enough to pay for the complete treatment course. Before her diagnosis was made, Ms. Olena had suffered heavy personal losses: her son had died at the front, and then she had lost her husband as well. After these events, she had felt strong stomach ache. After the examinations and fibrogastroscope, the stomach cancer diagnosis was made. She had stomach bleeding and underwent two surgeries.

Despite all the encountered challenges and treatment complications, Ms. Olena continued working and is determined to live a full life. Receiving Oxaliplatin gave her an opportunity to continue the required treatment.

She expressed genuine gratitude to the partners supporting provision of this drug and asked us to continue helping people in Ukraine, especially women who lost their loved ones, but continue fighting and living.

FEEDBACK FROM BENEFICIARIES

**Oksana (not her real name)
Drug: Trastuzumab (she also received Docetaxel
and Cyclophosphamide)**

Ms. Oksana is a resident of Kharkiv. She did not leave the city even when Kharkiv was in fact sieged. Oksana works as a veterinarian: all of her family members were physicians, but she consciously selected animal treatment. She raises two 15-year-old twin girls and also takes care of her mother who has recently had a stroke.

During our conversation, Ms. Oksana was cooking dinner for her family, frying cutlets for her mother and daughters, who were to return home soon. This usual household moment accurately reflects her life: she takes care of her loved ones even under complicated circumstances.

She remembers the beginning of her treatment well. On Saturday, February 15, 2025, Ms. Oksana felt an induration in her breast during self-examination. On Monday, she consulted the family physician, who referred her to the oncologist. She has been receiving Trastuzumab (supported by Mission Kharkiv) since March 2025.

Ms. Oksana talks about this assistance very modestly, but genuinely. She emphasizes importance of continuing receiving this support, because she understands it well how difficult treatment would have been without access to the required drugs. At the same time, she understands that many other people require similar assistance today.

FEEDBACK FROM BENEFICIARIES

Vira Drug: Trastuzumab

Ms. Vira learned about her diagnosis in spring of 2025. First of all, she thought about safety and care for her young daughter. After the treatment started, Vira had to quit her job, because uniting the roles of a mother and a patient and working at a bakery became impossible.

She was prescribed Trastuzumab, and that was when she learned about Mission Kharkiv. Receiving this drug became life-saving for her, because continuing the treatment without it would have been impossible.

Vira warmly tells us about her daughter and about complications in terms of explanation of changes related to treatment. She projects benevolence and supports other patients, inspiring them to stay positive.

Ms. Vira emphasizes that support from Mission Kharkiv gives her not only medicines, but hope, strength to live and belief in tomorrow as well.

FEEDBACK FROM BENEFICIARIES

Svitlana (not her real name)
Drug: Oxaliplatin

58-year-old Svitlana lives in Lviv and keeps a small family business together with her daughter. Her diagnosis was made in 2024 after the additional examination that clarified her previous wrong diagnosis. Although she managed to achieve about six months of remission, the disease reoccurred.

During the reporting period, she started receiving Oxaliplatin, supported by Mission Kharkiv. At a certain moment, provision of the drug was temporarily suspended because of supply limitations; it emphasizes vulnerability of oncology treatment support chain during the war.

When the support was continued, it allowed her to continue undergoing the chemotherapy course. Svitlana states that access to the required medicines becomes more and more complicated every month. Support with Oxaliplatin at the expense of donated funds became essential for continuation of her treatment and keeping hope for recovery.



PSYCHOLOGICAL SUPPORT FOR CANCER PATIENTS: WE ARE HERE FOR YOU

Basic indicators:

This project is focused on improvement of access to high-quality psychological support for cancer patients and their families during the war in Ukraine.

In 2025, the Mission Kharkiv team implemented the Psychological Support for Cancer Patients: We Are Here for You six-month-long project determined at satisfaction of substantial need of cancer patients that encounter double pressure of the disease and the war for psychological support. The project ensured access to professional psychological assistance despite the limited accessibility of such services.

The complex support model uniting online group therapy sessions and individual consultations by qualified psychology was developed. This approach allowed the participants to receive both support from the community and individualized assistance according to their emotional and psychological needs.

During the implementation of the project, 110 beneficiaries received assistance. Generally, 225 group sessions and 130 individual consultations were conducted, which ensured systemic psychological support, emotional pressure reduction and increase of endurance of the participants.

Informational and public awareness activity determined at increasing awareness of psychological support importance for cancer patients and their families in times of crisis also became an important part of the project.

The program is focused on support provision by medical transportation and psychological support.

The transport component ensures safe and reliable transportation of palliative patients, cancer patients, people with mobility impairments and people suffering from severe chronic diseases. Mobile brigades, each of which consists of a driver and two paramedics, work every day (Monday through Friday), conducting 2-3 transportations per day to hospitals, hospices, diagnostic centers and places of treatment. This work is based on the principles of dignity, confidentiality and humanity, safety and comfort of the patients being prioritized.

The mental health element is a part of the MHPSS program of Mission Kharkiv integrated in all the humanitarian and medical initiatives of the organization. It ensures systemic and accessible psychological support for cancer patients, medical workers, children and families of war prisoners and released civilians, as well as for other groups that suffered as a result of the war, helping them cope with their traumas, forced displacement and mental pressure related to the disease and the war.

FEEDBACK FROM BENEFICIARIES

Nadiia (not her real name)
Diagnosis: Hodgkin lymphoma

I learned about my diagnosis accidentally, during a usual scheduled examination. My first reactions were complete shock and panic. I had dozens of questions in my head. What should I do? Where should I be treated? How am I going to tell this to my loved ones? Will I be able to cope? There were no answers, and that was the scariest thing.

I started searching for support on social media, in communities and everywhere I could. And that was when I found the MHPSS program from Mission Kharkiv. It was a real salvation for me. The psychologists Polina and Viktoriia are my “guardian angels”. Thanks to them, I was not left alone with my fear. I attend both group and individual sessions, and these formats are equally important for me. At the group, I felt that I was not alone. There, I found people who became my real friends and “expedition companions”. We share our experience, support each other and simply understand each other without many words.

One of the most important things I learned is that when anxiety becomes too intense, you should try looking at the situation from the outside, as if you are not the protagonist, but a watcher. This really helps to calm down and return the control. I even started calling my way the expedition against cancer. Yes, this way is full of difficulties and unexpected moments, but this is merely a stage I am going to pass.

I am still undergoing treatment, but my emotional condition significantly improved. I feel alive again and find strength to move on.



SAVE THE WORKERS

Key indicators:

63 training sessions conducted

3 critical infrastructure facilities

1 216 workers participated

€ 189 295, 21 of the total cost of the project

Support of the workers of critical infrastructure that provide the population with essential services.

In 2025, the Mission Kharkiv team continued implementation of the Save The Workers project determined at increasing readiness of critical infrastructure workers to act in emergencies. The initiatives covered the facilities ensuring continuousness of basic services for the populations during the war.

Within the framework of the project, the Mission Kharkiv team held pre-medical aid training sessions for the workers, as well as supplied critical infrastructure facilities with first-aid kits. This allowed increasing the level of preparation of the personnel to reacting to emergency situations and enhancing safety at workplaces.

During the implementation of the project, 63 training sessions, in which 1,216 workers participated, were held. 3 critical infrastructure facilities received assistance, which supported enhancement of their stability and ability to ensure continuous service provision to the population.

POWERCARE

Key indicators:

The program is focused on enhancement of power stability and ensuring continuous provision of medical care in the front-line regions of Ukraine.

In 2025, Mission Kharkiv implemented the PowerCare project for supporting healthcare institution in the eastern and north-eastern regions that suffered during the war. The initiative was determined at ensuring continuous provision of medical services by providing alternative power sources during electric power outages and crisis situations.

Within the framework of the project, 97 portable power stations were transferred to 36 medical institutions. This allowed the hospitals to support the key processes, continue medical care provision and efficiently react to emergency situations even when electric power support was unstable.

Due to this support, the project indirectly covered 87,659 patients, having enhanced the capability and stability of medical institutions. Ensuring energy independence supported protection of the patients and medical workers and ensured access to essential medical services under complex circumstances.

EVERY MINUTE COUNTS: PROVIDING OXALIPLATIN TO COLORECTAL CANCER PATIENTS

Basic indicators:

212 beneficiaries received assistance **€ 17 057, 58** of the total project cost
1000 doses of the drug procured

The project is directed at ensuring continuous access to life-saving treatment for colorectal cancer patients in Ukraine.

In 2025, Mission Kharkiv stated implementation of the Every Minute Counts: Providing Oxaliplatin to Colorectal Cancer Patients project determined at coping with critical deficiency of life-saving oncological drugs caused by state procurement delays. The initiative was concentrated at ensuring stable supply of Oxaliplatin, which is the key drug for colorectal cancer treatment.

Within the framework of the project, procurement of the drug and its delivery to the Mission Kharkiv warehouses was performed; the system of individual distribution of drugs for patients was established as well. This approach ensured timely and individualized access to treatment for patients in Kharkiv and Lviv.

RESEARCH: COMMUNITY VOICE

The project is focused on researching the influence of war on the health of cancer patients and improvement of access to medical care in the front-line regions of Ukraine.

In 2025, the Mission Kharkiv team implemented the Voice of the Community research advocacy project determined at studying the influence of chronic war-related stress on the course of oncology diseases and access of the patients to medical assistance.

Within the framework of the project, 8 information sessions in the communities and 3 round tables with participation of medical community, authorities and community representatives were held. Also, an analytical report generalizing the acquired data and key conclusions of the research was prepared.

On the basis of the collected information, practical recommendations for improvement of cancer care quality and ensuring the right for health both at the community level and within state policy establishment were developed.

RESILIENCE THROUGH HEALTH AND CASH ASSISTANCE

The project is determined at support of vulnerable categories of the population residing in front-line or shelled communities of Kharkiv region.

In 2025, the Mission Kharkiv team implemented the Resilience through Health and Cash Assistance project determined at reacting to essential humanitarian and medical needs in Kharkiv region. The initiative was aimed at ensuring access to basic services for people who suffered as a result of the war, forced displacement and limited access to medical assistance.

The project united several support directions, particularly provision of primary medical care and psychological and social support, as well as direct financial support. This complex approached allowed providing comprehensive support to the beneficiaries, considering both their medical and social and economic needs.

During the implementation of the project, 571 beneficiaries received primary medical care; 292 persons used the psychological and social support services; and 145 people received financial assistance. Besides, 3 study sessions for 60 medical workers were held, which supported increase of capability of the local specialists to react to current challenges.

In 2025, the financial incomings from the donors for implementation of programs and projects comprised 1.79% (€ 778,061.21) of the total amount of incomings. These funds include grant financing determined at implementation of project activity. This relatively small share emphasizes the constant focus of the organization on operating efficiency and maximization of influence of the provided resources.

The in-kind medical assistance in the area of oncology and general medicine comprised the most part of the general volume of incomings, namely 97.41% (€ 41,911,622.87). This amount reflects the cost of provided in-kind medical care within the Ukraine Cancer Relief program, ensuring continuous access to life-saving drugs for cancer patients all over Ukraine.

The charitable assistance comprised 0.07% (€ 28,191.41) of the total amount of incomings and includes donations received via the GlobalGiving program. Despite the small amount, these funds allowed covering the essential individual needs.

The equipment comprised 0.13% (€ 56,619.34) of the total amount of incomings and includes procurement of equipment required for implementation of humanitarian and medical programs of the organization.

Service provision comprised 0.01% (€ 5,440.96) of the total amount of incomings and covers the expenses related to covering certain service and operating needs within the framework of program implementation.
