Becoming a licensed Tattoo Artist in New York requires dedication and creativity, as well as understanding of state regulations and prerequisites. The process can seem daunting, but with this guide, you can demystify it and take the first steps towards your career. ##### Step 1: Understand State Regulations and Prerequisites The NYC Health code requires completion of the Infection Control Course for Tattoo Artists, which includes a three-hour class conducted twice a month. The course covers material that will be tested in the final written examination. ##### Step 2: Gather Required Documents You'll need to provide your Social Security Number (SSN) or Individual Taxpayer ID, as well as a valid government-issued photo ID. If someone other than you is submitting the application, they must also provide these documents. ##### Step 3: Register for the Infection Control Course Register online or in person at the Citywide Licensing Center to ensure your spot and receive a copy of the study manual. The course includes material that will be covered on the final written examination. ##### Step 4: Complete Application for Tattoo License Review and complete the application, which can be done online or in person. Ensure you have all required documents, including proof of identification and any other specified requirements. ##### Step 5: Final Written Examination After completing the Infection Control Course and submitting your application, you'll need to pass a final written examination. The study manual provided with the course will help prepare you for this step. Power of Attorney / Authority to Act form is required for business owner representation. Submit a valid photo ID with your application. Upon licensing, complete the NYC Health Academy's Infection Control Course for Tattoo Artists and review the Study Manual (PDF). Permit fees: \$100.00 for two years (Tattoo License), \$26.00 (Infection Control Course), and \$126.00 (Online Application fee) with a 2% Convenience Fee added to online payments. Gather required documents, upload electronic versions to the online permit system, and create an account with the NYC Online Licensing system. Payment is needed for application completion. You can save and return to incomplete applications later. Register for the Infection Control Course, complete all fields, upload documents, and pay with a credit or debit card. A receipt will be sent via email upon completion. Scheduling in-person licensing services at Manhattan or Queens locations requires an appointment with DCWP (PDF). New York State health regulations are being developed by the Department of Health under Public Health Law Article 4A. Local regulations may apply until new statewide regulations take effect. For more information, contact your county or city health department. Tattooing and body piercing carry risks including infection, bloodborne disease transmission, allergic reactions, prolonged bleeding, swelling, scarring, and discomfort. Existing medical conditions like allergies, heart disease, diabetes, skin conditions may be affected. You may have an increased risk of complications from tattoos and piercings if you have conditions that affect your immune system. Before getting a tattoo or piercing, it's suggested to speak with a doctor about the potential health risks involved. Additionally, learn about the laws regarding tattoos for minors in New York State, which prohibit tattooing anyone under 18 without parental consent. When getting a tattoo, ensure that your artist washes their hands, uses gloves, cleans the skin, and disposes of needles and ink properly. For body piercing, be aware that it's against the law to pierce a minor without written parental consent in New York State, effective October 26, 2012. If you're getting a piercing, your artist should also follow proper hygiene procedures, such as using sterile equipment and providing aftercare information.
