For example, "friend," "buddy," and "pal" are all synonyms for "friend," whereas "enemy" and "foe" are antonyms. Now, let's dive into the more complex "-onym" words. Homonyms are words that have the same pronunciation or spelling but different meanings. There are two types: homophones (words with the same pronunciation but different spellings) and homographs (words with the same spelling). Things get even more complicated when we consider heteronyms, which are a type of homograph that has different pronunciations for each word. For instance, "bank" can refer to either a financial institution or the edge of a river. To keep things straight, remember that "-homo-" comes from the Greek word "homos," meaning "the same," and "-phone" is Greek for "sound." So, homo-plus-phone means "same sound."
