There's another wonderful Italian expression: l'arte d'arrangiarsi - the art of making something out of nothing. The ability to turn a handful of simple ingredients into a banquet or a group of select friends into a party. What's important isn't being rich, but having the talent for being happy. 6. We settle for living unhappy forever because we're afraid of change and that everything will be reduced to ruins. But often, ruins are also a gift; ruins are the path to transformation... 9. It was when I was lying in a bathtub in New York, reading aloud from a dictionary, that I began to heal my soul. My life was in shambles: I was so unrecognizable that if the police had put me on an identification lineup, I would have been unable to point myself out. And going through that same suffering again...is hellish. Instead, break free from that relentless repetition and move on to a new level of understanding - it's celestial. 44. It's like a story with a moral. When you throw yourself into the world to see if you can fix your life, in the end you'll be helping...Tutti ("everyone" in Italian). 45. Throughout my life, I've made decisions about men quickly. I always fall in love at lightning speed without considering the potential risks. I tend to only see the good things about people. I've fallen in love countless times with the best version of a man, not the real one, and then I dedicate myself to waiting for a long time (sometimes forever) until the man reaches his maximum potential greatness. In love, I often fall victim to my excessive optimism. 46. There have been many times when I've given myself completely to a man just because of love. And sometimes, I've even lost everything. If I want to be a truly independent woman, I need to know how to protect myself. 47. Losing balance for love can sometimes be part of a balanced life. 48. I don't really know what I want. I do know that, deep down, I've always wanted someone to tell me: "Let me take care of you forever," but none have said it to me yet.
