Denims has made a name for herself online as a model who's not afraid to be bold and confident. Denims is also a political streamer and OnlyFans content creator. She was a regular on the stream hosted by Destiny, where she'd share her insights on politics from a leftist perspective. However, things got dramatic when Denims leaked some private info about Destiny, including his use of the N-word. This led to some pretty intense moments between them. Denims first appeared on Destiny's stream in 2019 during a Reverse King of The Hill episode. She was voted out by Esfand, but not before impressing DGG and Destiny with her debate skills. Denims went on to make an account on DGG and even played some Apex Legends with Destiny and Iman. Denims continued to pop up on the stream throughout 2019, including a stint on Rajjchelor where she chose Destiny as her love interest. She was also a guest on Big Brain Podcast, but unfortunately, the vod has been deleted. There was also some drama between Denims and MrMouton, but it seemed to be resolved after they talked things out off-stream. The TwitchCon drama is another saga involving Denims, which you can read more about in the article. Iman, along with Melina, a polarizing figure, took a neutral stance in the drama, attributing it to a series of miscommunications.[14][15][16] Initially, Iman kept his response low-key, avoiding sensitive information and keeping Atlasesque's identity hidden. However, after Denims' reply, Iman shared more details about the embarrassing circumstances, exposing Denims' deceptive behavior.[17] Following the incident, Denims apologized and claimed to still be "cool" with Iman, albeit without trust.[18][19] To shift attention away from her involvement in the TwitchCon drama, Denims threatened to release private logs showing Iman's use of a racial slur before leaving his apartment.[20] Iman responded by saying he uses the word privately as well.[21] The incident gained traction on Twitter, with clips posted on LiveStreamFails and later deleted. It is alleged that Iman only used the slur against Denims because she had uttered it first.[22] In November 2019, Iman appeared on a political panel alongside MindWaves, TruMalma, and EvaUnaLove, hosted by Pxie and Denims.[23] A month later, Iman appeared on Tom Foolery's panel, where he debated with Denims, Ahrelevant, Riley Grace Roshong, and Dylan Burns. The discussion revolved around cancel culture, platform usage for change, the \$15 minimum wage, and abolishing gender. Denims launched her own website, mirroring DGG's format.[24] Iman also engaged in a heated debate with Denims over his performance in a previous argument with Richard Wolff.[25] This exchange marked their last direct conversation on stream. Destiny and Denims engaged in a debate on the topic of company dividends and their role in returning value to shareholders. Initially, Denims challenged Destiny's assertion that companies must pay out dividends, arguing that this isn't how public companies operate. Destiny replied that there are other methods besides dividends to give returns to shareholders, such as stock buybacks and increasing the company's valuation. Denims then shifted the conversation to worker co-ops, citing Wolff from the debate. She argued that a co-op can pursue various goals, including profit, but it's just one of many objectives. Destiny countered that workers in a co-op aim to maximize benefits for themselves, not to generate profit for external investors. Destiny suggested that if a company earns more profit, all the workers receive higher pay. However, he pointed out that this perspective assumes that private firms require profit, whereas worker-run firms can provide value to their workers without focusing on profit. Destiny proposed alternative methods, such as raising worker wages and reducing work hours, which might inadvertently disadvantage private investors. Denims proposed that workers could vote to allocate "extra profits" from a quarter to branch out into a new sector. However, Destiny questioned how co-ops can produce profits and then grow, highlighting the need for clear mechanisms for profit distribution and growth. Denims expresses uncertainty about how a cooperative (co-op) can profit and use that profit to hire more workers or expand. He suggests automation could be an option, such as sealing cranberry bottles, which would replace human labor and allow for expansion. However, Destiny cautions that investors may hesitate to fund co-ops due to the potential risk of losing everything due to decisions made by the co-op's management. Denims counters that investors can make informed choices based on the co-op's financial statements. Destiny argues that the smart choice is to avoid investing in worker-run businesses because they are not obligated to give anything back to shareholders. Denims responds, suggesting that both the co-op and its workers share aligned interests with shareholders, as they all want their companies to turn a profit. However, Destiny challenges this perspective, pointing out that labor aims to raise operational costs, which detracts from profits – the main priority for shareholders. She also notes that startups often reinvest in their businesses to expand operations, suggesting co-ops could follow a similar path. Denims counters that co-ops might also choose not to do so and risks awarding themselves a hefty payout at the investor's expense. The debate continues with Destiny expressing frustration, accusing Denims of not understanding her perspective. Denims responds by highlighting Destiny's previous statement about public companies distributing dividends. Destiny concedes that she misspoke, clarifying that she meant returning value to shareholders. She presses further, stating that Denims has investments of his own and understands they generate revenue without relying on dividends, that she never thought he was stupid enough to believe dividends were the sole method for companies to reward shareholders. Destiny then asks why she implied he held that belief earlier. Denims reasons it's because he expressed it during their debate. Destiny counters, asking whether it's more probable that he misspoke or was echoing Wolff's words. Denims suggests they could go back into the debate vod to see what he had said, which makes Destiny claim that Denims might be retarded. Denims decides to cite directly from a transcript of Destiny's conversation with Wolff: Wolff said public companies don't have to pay out dividends to shareholders, and Destiny agreed it was market 101. Denims asks what Wolff meant by this quote, causing their voice to drop in pitch and a legendary soundbite can be heard. Destiny suggests reviewing an earlier part of the debate where Wolff claims private companies don't owe it to shareholders to return value. In the instance Denims mentioned, Wolff chose to use the word "dividends," so Destiny responded using the same term. Shortly after, Destiny clarifies that companies don't necessarily only use dividends to return value to shareholders. Denims offers to prove Destiny wrong by getting Richard Wolff to say he didn't mean dividends, which leads Destiny to question if Denims even watched the conversation. They decide to watch the point together and see (seconds after the dividends comment is made) Destiny make a statement regarding the "returning of capital" to shareholders, and Wolff saying "not at all." Destiny and Denims had a heated debate about a potential co-op, with Denims claiming they would still hold the meeting in court due to their fiduciary responsibility to investors. Destiny responded by saying "THAT'S NOT A FUCKIGN CO-OP". The two rewound the debate to clarify some points, with Destiny reflecting on how he wishes people would listen to his opinions because of his cute appearance. He later expressed support for the "hot-tub" model and wished Denims good luck while playing his spaceship games. Notably, Denims and Atlas were talking negatively about Destiny behind his back to other creators. This was revealed by a chat log where Destiny mentioned that they were trying to get him hated by others in the political circles. At a TwitchCon meeting focused on improving the platform for IRL streamers, Melina recounted how awkward it was listening to content creators and staff discussing how to make political content better on Twitch, given her status as Destiny's wife and his past ban from the platform. Tom Foolery released a video essay breaking down misinformation from the far left, featuring Denims as one of the first content creators mentioned. Denims also called FroggyFresh a Nazi after he trained for a boxing match under Sam Hyde. Additionally, Denims tried to gain clout by riding the wave of criticism directed at Ana Kasparian (an executive producer and host at TYT) due to a clash between her and radical left members. Denims reacted negatively to news of Destiny potentially debating Ben Shapiro, appearing visibly disgusted upon seeing the paid promotion for the debate. Denims also read Osama Bin Laden's Letter to America on her stream, with Destiny reacting later that day. Osama Bin Laden's Letter to America was discussed on a Twitch stream, where the host Denims expressed agreement with sentiments that America deserved the 9/11 attacks. She later attempted to mitigate damage control for viewers who shared the video and claimed they weren't idolizing Bin Laden. Destiny reacted to the stream, pointing out Denims' potential violation of Twitch's terms of service by promoting pro-terrorist propaganda. The two engaged in a heated discussion about American politics, with Denims stating that the US is not secular and Destiny countering that Americans have significant control over their government. This led to Denims receiving her first Twitch ban on November 21, 2023, which was later lifted on November 22, 2023.
