GREAT is a word commonly used for describing something excellent, but it has been lost its original meaning over time. It was originally used to describe something grand or of high quality, but now it's mostly used to mean superior or top-notch. Brilliant is another synonym for excellent, with a different origin. It comes from the French word 'briller', which means 'to shine', and has been used as an adjective since the 17th century. Splendid is also a synonym for excellent, but its meaning has shifted over time. Originally, it meant grand or sumptuous, but now it's often used to describe something impressive or attractive. Exceptional is a word that starts with the same letters as excellent and is often used interchangeably, but it implies something that stands out from the crowd due to being uniquely talented or skilled. It has also been used to mean 'amazing' or excellent. Several compound terms, such as FIRST-RATE and TOP-NOTCH, are often used synonymously with TERRIFIC. SMASHING is another slang term that has endured despite falling in and out of favor over generations. WICKED is a similar example. The word SICK was unexpectedly used to mean 'excellent' in some contexts, particularly in skateboarding and surfing, where it conveys a sense of risk. On the other hand, words like EUJIFFEROUS and QUEEM have largely fallen out of use due to their rarity. Antonyms for TERRIFIC include TERRIBLE and DREADFUL, which initially meant similar things but now convey opposite meanings. AWFUL is another antonym that was once used to mean 'inspiring awe.' HORRIBLE is a useful antonym for excellent, particularly in the context of horror. Other words like UNPLEASANT, REPULSIVE, and REPELLENT are also used to describe something as bad or unpleasant. When describing someone's performance or skills, USELESS and INCOMPETENT can be used as antonyms for TERRIFIC.
