Plague doctor mask free pattern

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Create an authentic Plague Doctor costume with our free pattern! Make your own medieval-style mask and cloak for a unique DIY Halloween masterpiece. This DIY Plague Doctor Costume is set to be a hit this year! It's super easy to craft an authentic plague doctor mask using this free printable pattern. Too busy? Pin it for later! Save this post to your favorite Pinterest board, and it'll be there when you're ready. Every year, my kids challenge me to create one-of-a-kind DIY costumes, and this year was no exception! In the past, we've made a Functioning Demogorgon Mask, Beaker Costume, Mario & Luigi Go Kart Costumes, and an Angry Bird family costume! When growing up during a global pandemic, dressing up as a Plague Doctor for Halloween is quite fitting. Plague Doctors were medical professionals who treated people with the bubonic plague. They worked in the middle ages during the black death in the 17th and 18th centuries. Their attire included beaked masks, wooden canes, leather hats, black cloaks, and leather boots. The full-face mask was a kind of respirator that housed aromatic substances like lavender to counter the smell of death and prevent infection. Charles de Lorme was one of the first doctors to treat plague patients in a beak-like mask. I've detailed every step of how to create this Plague Doctor outfit for you. It's very easy with this step-by-step tutorial, promise! (affiliate links) I've included photos along the way but if you have any questions at all, feel free to drop me a message. Print the pattern onto 8.5 x 11" paper, cut it out, and tape it together to ensure the correct fit for your mask. Use a large black leather bag (or one that looks like leather) as the base of the costume. Scavenge embellishments from thrift stores or other places to add details later. To create the mask: 1. Print the pattern onto 8.5 x 11" paper. 2. Cut it out and tape it together for a correct fit. 3. Use a white chalk pen to trace the pattern onto leather, adding 1/4" around each piece for a salvage edge. 4. Cut out the mask pieces from the leather. 5. Trace the pattern onto card stock using a pencil. 6. Cut the pattern out of card stock (this will serve as the base for your mask). 7. Trim the corners of each leather piece at an angle. 8. Use hot glue to wrap the edges of all leather pieces around the card stock pieces. To create glasses: 1. Find jar lids or similar objects to use as glasses. 2. Color in the clear plastic using a sharpie while keeping it see-through. 3. Paint over the silver detail with black acrylic paint. Now, you're ready to assemble your Plague Doctor mask and complete the costume! see-thru mesh or plastic can be used instead of lids on masks, which makes it easier to work with leather and find matching cording at craft stores like Michaels. It's helpful to use special needles designed for piercing through leather when sewing the mask pieces together to create a beak shape. The stitches should be close to the edge of each piece, and the finished seams should look neat. To attach eye pieces, glue them carefully around the hole while it's still bendable, taking caution with superglue. Decorative stitching can be done around each eye, but not attached to the mask itself for easier layering. The next steps involve adding straps made from a bag and gluing them into place using hot glue. Finally, embellish the rest of the costume with coordinating items like jackets, umbrellas, or spice jars, depending on your desired look. Small black jar lids, waxed cording, leather needles, long black jacket, black balaclava, leather gloves, wide brimmed hat, cane or staff are needed for the Plague Doctor mask. Print the pattern on 8.5 x 11" paper, cut it out, and tape it together to ensure a correct fit. Use white chalk pen to trace the pattern onto leather, adding 1/4" to each piece. Cut out the mask pieces from leather and card stock. Trim the corners of leather pieces at an angle. Wrap edges with hot glue around card stock pieces. Sew the pieces together for the beak shape. Glue eye pieces to the mask, stitching around each eye. Create straps using bag straps and attach them with hot glue. Add embellishments to the rest of the costume.
