Will Spend \$7,800,000 for Bird Conservation

Washington.—A total of \$7,800,000 will be expended under authorization of the migratory bird conservation act of 1926. \$2,000,000 has been provided for the fiscal year ending June, 1931. \$2,000,000 for the fiscal year ending in 1932, and \$3,800,000 each for the seven succeeding years. Thereafter \$200,000 is authorized for the year ending June 30, 1934, and for each succeeding fiscal year.

Before proposed areas are definitely settled on as sanctuaries following investigation by the Department of Agriculture, the commission consisting of the secretary of the interior, and the members each from the senate and house of representatives must endorse the selections.

Under the act establishing the bird reservations, provision also is made for the maintenance and improvement of the areas. The establishment of the sanctuaries and administration of the act is only one of the features of the program in which bird lovers have been actively interested.

Napoleon's Diamond Necklace Now in U. S.

New York.—The diamond necklace, which Napoleon I presented to Empress Maria Louisa on the birth of their first child, the duke of Reichstadt, has been brought to this country. The necklace consists of 47 large diamonds set in silver and gold and is valued at \$500,000. It is owned by the archduchess of Austria, Marie Theresa, now seventy-four.

PIED PIPER MAKES PETS OF ODD RATS

Recommends some of them for Children.

Washington.—Like Hamelin of legend, Pied Piper, Washington has its "Pied Piper," whose interest in rodents goes far beyond merely piping them out of town.

Rats may be but mere rats to cats and dogs, but to Dr. Vernon Bailey, chief field naturalist, bureau of biological survey, department of Agriculture, there are as many different kinds of rats and mice as there are different types of men, with as varied a range of habits and interests as diversified as those found among the human species.

Dr. Bailey has just returned from a tour of duty in the deserts and plains of Arizona and New Mexico, where he has been studying a variety of animals in the field. With particular pride Doctor Bailey tells of his capture of a rare species of horned toad, which he picked up on the Kaibab plateau, north of the Grand Canyon.

Good Pet for Children.

The queer little creature, which is not a toad, but a lizard, now is resting in the hands of an artificial home provided for it in the National Museum.

"This species of horned toad," Doctor Bailey said, "would make a lovely pet for children. It is gentle, friendly, harmless and has great value in the fact that it destroys and lives on insects."

In his home Doctor Bailey has prepared a room for the use and study of small animals, those of the rodent family in particular. "I have had guinea pigs, pocket mice, grasshopper mice, deer mice and meadow mice," the doctor stated in answer to a query as to what kind of mice he thought made the best pets. "I have no use for white mice or white rats," he continued. "They are merely the albino members of the ordinary white rat, a house mouse family, which are contemptible, filthy and destructive animals."

Dr. Bailey explains that the house rat or wharf rat and its cousin, the mouse, are as different from the little pets kept by him in his home as are the criminals of the human race from their intellectual and constructive brethren.

"The house mouse and the wharf rat are not indigenous to this country in the first place," said the doctor. "They have been brought to America from the old country. The American species which I have mentioned usually are wood animals, with clean habits and of value as insect exterminators."

Make Nice Pets.

"If one knows how to handle them they make nice pets, as they are clean and gentle. Take the grasshopper mouse, for instance. He lives mainly on insects and other mice. If you put one in your basement he will keep the house free of cockroaches, bugs, spiders and house mice. The grasshopper mouse will not climb into your food, as do the ordinary white rats, and he is very useful in fields, where he destroys insects but will not harm the crops."

Although Doctor Bailey has kept the little white footed deer mice as pets in the outfitting camps which he keeps for his animals, he does not recommend them as pets, as they are very timid and shy and do not become domesticated as quickly as do some of the other varieties.

The kangaroo rat, so-called because of its long hind legs and its ability to jump, makes a particularly good pet, as it is a gentle little animal with clean habits. A peculiarity of the kangaroo rat is that it never drinks water. It comes from the part of the desert country where there may not be rainfall for as long as three years. The animal gets its moisture from plants, buds and roots.

FEED SOLDIER ON 51 CENTS A DAY

Food Best in History of United States Army.

Washington—Soldiers are getting the best food served in the history of the United States army and it is costing the government only 51 cents a day per man, the annual report of Maj. Gen. Frank E. Cheatham, quartermaster general, shows.

Extension of the use of rayon, adoption of roll collar coats, and plans to provide mounted troops with leather-laced boots to replace shoes and leggins are expected by Cheatham to contribute to appearance and morale.

The problem of obtaining satisfactory cotton cloth for uniforms has been so difficult Cheatham has recommended adoption of a khaki shade identical with that used by the marine corps in place of the familiar olive drab.

All army housing projects authorized by congress in 1927 have been completed except the hospital at the Fort Leavenworth disciplinary barracks, Cheatham reported. Building authorized in 1928 has been completed except for barracks and quarters at Fort San Antonio, Texas; Fort Jay, N. Y.; Fort Monmouth, N. J., and Selfridge Field, Mich.

Sixteen housing or hospital projects of the 1928 program representing an expenditure of about \$3,000,000 are completed or under way. Work has not yet been started on the remaining 17 projects of the 1928 program which will require expenditure of between \$6,000,000 and \$7,000,000.

Under authority of congress Cheatham has begun correspondence to identify widows and mothers of American soldiers, sailors, and marines buried in Europe preliminary to pilgrimages to the graves at public expense.

"Folding Husband" Seen for Flats of Future

Washington—"Will the busy and crowded housewife of the future, along with folding beds, folding kitchens and folding baby carriages, have a folding husband to match?"

Thus inquires the Journal of Heredity, presenting a report by Dr. Arthur Kelley on a strangely constructed man who can crane himself down the middle and touch his two shoulders together. He is able to perform this feat, quite impossible to ordinary humans, because he has no collarbone. Neither the usual physical examination, neither x-ray photographs show a trace of this favorite subject of horseback-riding accidents.

The condition presented by the "folding man" is apparently hereditary, for he reports that his mother had no collar bone; and his only child a daughter, is also without one. His only brother, now dead, was normal.

There are drawbacks to being a folding person, however. Doctor Kelley's discovery has defective bones in his head, which leave a soft spot on the top of his cranium and cause a slightly "fishy" appearance at the top of his nose, and also make his features rather smaller than they are in most persons. Doctor Kelley reports that his "folding man" is a native born, of old American stock.

WHAT WE SHOULD TEACH FUTURE WIVES

THE thought of this column reverberates in the intriguing idea, which we hope will before long have developed beyond the embryonic state—of a school to train women to be good wives.

I asked a woman of many years and much experience and the record, not of many marriages but of one eminently happy one, to tell me what she would teach in a school endowed for the purpose of turning out good wives, happy women, the wives of happy men.

"I should begin," she said, "by teaching the girls a sense of value in choosing the right man to make choice worthy of their future efforts. I should teach them to choose a man, not for the cut of his coat and the way he can light a woman's cigarette, but for the lines of his chin and the way he treats his mother. I should urge them to put in the balance, not his steps on the dance floor but the path with which he tackles a job. I should prepare them to observe how he looks at a pretty woman, if his smile then is clean, if there is in it something of reverence—or if it's the other kind of a look.

"The fundamental having been dealt with, I should encourage girls to give some thought to what a man likes in people and things as compared with what they like. Also, I should teach them to value the thing called charm, which we should not have to describe because they will feel it—the cool and pleasant way in which he manifests something from within. Above all, teach them to judge not in the light of the moon, but in the clear glare of all-revealing day.

"That may take some time, depending on how much of this kind of judgment a girl is born with. Some will come with no need at all of this preliminary training. They are the lucky ones. Others will come with a sense of value to discriminate that you will almost despair of straightening them out. But I should choose soundly. Lies their first chance of a life's happiness.

"In a school for training wives we must of course have something of the prosaic requirements; that is those which to the eye of romance are prosaic and inconsequential, but which often prove of great consequence to the life of romance. The well-equipped wife, no matter how highly placed, should be familiar with every duty that goes into the making and keeping of a home—then she can with safety delegate the tasks, from creating an atmosphere of beauty in the home, to producing a good meal, to budgeting resources—so that the Lares and Penates may indeed be household gods and not demons.

That would be a part of the routine in training for wifehood.

"And now for the higher grades, subjects upon which most graduates will extend into post graduate work, and in which we can always continue to learn. They are such subjects as understanding, give and take, consideration, tact, the smallness of self in the language of love, the joy of giving and where lies happiness. An important class would be that on human nature and its quirks and turns, and the real proposition of little spots on large natures. And that, but not least, if I had the School for Making Good Wives and happy women, I should teach my girls something of child psychology—for in no other way can they so well approach the psychology of men—and husbands."

GOOD THINGS OLD, NEW

Indian Pudding.

Mix one cupful of corn meal and one-fourth cupful of flour, one-fourth cupful of molasses and sugar, one beaten egg, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth teaspoonful each of ginger and cinnamon, add slowly to one quart of boiling milk, stir until smooth. Pour into a baking dish adding one-half cupful of chopped suet and a handful of raisins. Bake slowly for three hours, stirring occasionally the first hour. Serve with a hard sauce or a lemon or orange sauce.

Udridge Lemon Pie.

Boil together one cupful each of sugar and water, add a tablespoonful of butter and thicken with one-half tablespoonful of cornstarch mixed with a little water. When cool, add two well beaten eggs, the juice and grated rind of one lemon and bake with two crusts.

Rhode Island Johnny Cakes.

Sold one cupful of corn meal, the water ground meal, add one teaspoonful each of salt, sugar and butter, then when it stiffens until it will stand drop from a spoon add a little milk. Drop into smoking sausage fat and brown on both sides. Serve with sausage or bacon for breakfast cakes. Serve with butter.

Flaked Crab Meat Fricassee.

Cook one small green pepper finely chopped in two small shallots and four tablespoonfuls of butter until lightly brown; add one and one-half cupsful of crab meat and cook five minutes; add five tablespoonfuls of orange juice, two tablespoonfuls of lemon, one-half teaspoonful of paprika, with salt and pepper to taste. Just before serving add one-third cupful of heavy cream and the yolks of two beaten eggs diluted with two tablespoonfuls of cream. Serve in timbale cases or in patty shells.

Poppers.

Beat two eggs, one-fourth teaspoonful of salt, one-half cupful each of milk and water and one cupful of pastry flour. Add only half the liquid and beat well. Add one egg beaten for the entire mixing. Bake in smoking hot gem pans twelve minutes.

Preserving Corn Meal

Since corn meal spoils rather fast, special attention should be given to the way in which it is stored. It should be kept in a cool, dry place and should be closely covered to exclude insects. This applies to the mill and the bag, as well as the home. The water-ground meal spoils more easily than the granular meal. When convenient, therefore, it should be milled, only in small quantities as needed.

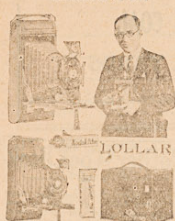

was dismissed.

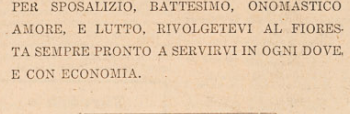
Woman Discovers Mouse

THE WHY of
SUPERSTITIONS
By H. IRVING KING

NUTMEGS

THE popular superstition about nut-
megs is that, placed and hung
about the neck in the manner of a
charm, they are a cure for various
physical ills. Not long ago a school-
teacher advised her pupils to wear
nutmegs in this manner to prevent
colds, and the daughter of a New
Hampshire legislator wore one for a
night and day to cure earache.

Though different sections select dif-
ferent diseases for which the nutmeg
is most recommended the general be-
lief is that nutmegs are efficacious in
all diseases. The key to the supersti-
tion is found in the name of the
genus of plants to which the nutmeg
belongs, which is myristica from the
Greek word myristikos, meaning "fit
for anointing." Though a native of
the islands of the Indian sea the nut-
meg, or its kila, appears to have found
its way, though sparingly, to Egypt
and the eastern shores of the Mediter-
ranean when it became known to the
Greek communities of Asia Minor and
received its Greek name. It was the
oil produced from the covering of the
kernel of the nutmeg which was "suit-
able for anointing" and it was that
figure of speech known as metonymy
which extended the name myristikos
to the whole fruit.

Originally anointing had three pur-
poses—bodily health and comfort,
honor, and consecration. Reasoning
by analogy the best authorities con-
sider the most ancient use to have
been for purposes of health. The
"School-marm" advising her pupils
to wear nutmegs around their necks
to prevent colds shows a survival of
a primitive sanitary idea de-
generated through the long ages into a
popular superstition.

REALITY

SITTING under the spell of the mu-
sic of Kreisler's violin for an en-
tire evening's concert gives rise to in-
teresting questions concerning the
cause of the power which the music
had over us. Was it genius? Can it
be attributed to perfection in tech-
nique? Was it the superior instru-
ment used upon this particular occa-
sion, a Stradivarius perhaps? Yes,
all of these, plus something more, and
that something more was reality.

Two persons at
different times play
upon the same in-
strument, both
wedding from the
same sheet of mu-
sic, one moves you,
the other does not.
What causes the
difference? Reality.

One appeals to your imagination as
that you are able to feel what he feels,
the other fails to convince you. The
difference again is reality. Because
Kreisler lived his music it was real.
Only that which is real in the moment
of creation, whether in art, music
or literature, lives. The artificial and
unreal is soon forgotten. Shams and
pretenses are shuffed off in the struggle.
Only the real is permanent.

In the business world, as well as in
the world of art and music, reality
is a most important asset. Once it
becomes known that you are not on
the level, that you are endeavoring to
show, that your merchandise is not as
advertised—failure has already begun.

In salesmanship the agent must him-
self be convinced both of the quality
and need for the merchandise he has
to sell. If he does not believe this he
will not sell his goods. He cannot
convince another of something that is
not real to him. He must first ac-
tually believe as true what he would have
his customer believe. The world of
friendship rests entirely upon reality.
Once you prove yourself false to a
friend or confidence or endeavor to pass
off imitation for reality—the mystic
chord of friendship snaps. The home
is built upon reality. Love is the most
real thing in the world. When love
dies the home is gone. It is impos-
sible to maintain a home upon the
basis of sham, imitation, or pretense.
"That the people want to be fooled"
may serve well enough as a creed for
a circus world but fails in the modern
world of stern realities.
