HONORABLE JOHN J. McKEITHEN
Public Service Commissioner
State of Louisiana

Commissioner McKeithen was a combat officer of the 77th Infantry Division in World War II and spent two years in the Pacific Theatre.

Upon his return after WORLD WAR II, he ran and was elected to the Legislature from Caldwell Parish where he served four years with distinction. At 28 years of age he served as Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee and Floor Leader for the State Administration Forces. He was the youngest man to hold that position in the history of the State.

Mr. McKeithen made an unsuccessful race for Lieutenant Governor with Judge Carlos Spaeth in 1952. Although he out-ran his ticket by nearly 75,000 votes, an unprecedented accomplishment which has been rarely equalled in political races in this State.

After that he returned to Columbia and entered private law practice. In 1954 he ran for the Louisiana Public Service Commission from the Third Public Service Commission District which area comprises 28 parishes and includes the Fourth, Fifth and Eight Congressional District. He defeated the

incumbent Commissioner and another candidate by a majority of almost two to one in the first primary in 1960. He was re-elected to the Louisiana Public Service Commission by a margin approximating five to one. (The only other Commissioner from the Third Public Service Commission District to be elected twice was the late Senator Huey P. Long, who was elected to this position twice before successfully running for Governor.)

Mr. McKeithen is the head of the law firm of McKeithen, Mouser & McKinley which maintains offices at Columbia, the parish seat of Caldwell Parish, and Monroe, the parish seat of Ouachita Parish. He holds two degrees from the Louisiana State University, is married and the father of six children.

SCHIRO OPENS NOPSI'S NEW MICHoud PLANT

Beginning Operation of the New 248,000-Kilowatt Plant

Mayor Victor H. Schiro flipped a tiny golden switch in the massive central control room of New Orleans Public Service Inc.'s \$20 million Michoud turbogenerating plant to light the fires to begin operation of the new 248,000-kilowatt plant.

The "cutting in" of the plant, according to Clayton L. Nairne, president of NOPSI, will provide the utilities company with a total local generating capacity of 770,000 kilowatts, more than four times NOPSI capability at the end of World War II.

The Michoud plant represents a greater capacity than NOPSI's entire summer net generating capability at the beginning of the war.

The new plant is an enlargement of the first generating unit on the Michoud site in 1957, with a net capability of 118,000 kilowatts.

Construction of the present plant, at France rd. and the new Mississippi River-Gulf Outlet, began in 1961.

The site totals more than 32,000 acres in the rapidly expanding eastern section of New Orleans.

Nearby is the NASA Saturn plant and under development in the area are thousands of acres for residential, commercial and industrial uses.

ITALY'S TRADE CHANGES TOLD

Commissioners Say ECM Effects Growing

Italy's trade within the European Common Market now represents one-third of its total foreign trade, reported the Italian Trade Commissioner here.

Ettore Scampicchio, addressing an annual Freight Forwarder's Day luncheon of the Traffic Club of New Orleans, said:

"In the past 12 months the value of this trade has been increasing at a rate of 50 per cent greater than the average for exports."

"It can truly be said that the liberating forces set in motion by the European Economic Community are having revolutionary consequences."

ECONOMY CHANGES

Noting other changes in the Italian economy, Scampicchio reported:

"Steel output increased to 10.4 million tons, while new invest-

Washington, --Following a conference with Italian Ambassador Sergio Fenoaltea at the Embassy, Jules Alberti, an executive of San Reno USA, Inc., of New York, announced that participants in the famed San Remo Festival in Italy would make a tour of the United States this Spring.

The premiere is planned for Constitution Hall in Washington on, March 21st. The following night the performance will be presented at Carnegie Hall in New York.

The troops of singers--outstanding artists selected from all Italy--will then appear in concerts in approximately 40 leading cities, including Philadelphia, Providence, New Haven, Boston, Detroit, Chicago, Toledo, Cleveland, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Louisville, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, Richmond, Norfolk, Baltimore and Washington.

The San Remo Festival is held annually in February in the municipality of San Remo on the Italian "Riviera of Flowers", which stretches for over 60 miles along the Mediterranean, from the French frontier to Alassio.

This "Canzone Italiana", presents each year outstanding artists of Italy in songs composed by Italians. A distinguished jury of Italian critics selects the winners. In recent years a troupe of the best singers designated San Remo nel Mondo (San Remo in the World) has presented the most successful of the San Remo Festival songs in European and South American capitals. Two years ago the attraction played to standing room only in New York's Carnegie Hall.

This year for the first time the group of popular Italian artists will be presented to audiences throughout the United States. The performances here will include, in addition to the Italian singers, a full orchestra.

Nothing quite like the San Remo "Song University" exists in the United States. It is as is all the leading singers of stage screen, radio, television, and records --Perry Como, Frank Sinatra, Judy Garland, Connie Francis, Tony Bennett, and others -- met in Miami Beach or at Palm Spring to compete before a jury of critics for the title of "best or leading" singers of the year, and the outstanding performers were banded together in a troupe to tour the country and the world.

Prior to the premiere in Constitution Hall, the San Remo Festival artists will be received by the Italian Ambassador in Washington.

Plans are now being perfected to establish, as a result of the San Remo Festival appearances in this country, a number of Italian Language teaching fellowship in the United States. It is hoped the details of these fellowship can be announced to the Italian Ambassador at the time of his reception for the troupe in Washington.

Nairne said it was indeed fitting the new Michoud plant should be dedicated at this time when the electric industry was observing National Electrical Week, for on this date February 11, is the 116th anniversary of the birth of Thomas A. Edison.

He called Edison the "man of genius and determination who brought electricity out of the laboratory and into practical use for the benefit of mankind."

The flames which Mayor Schiro started in the gas burners beneath the boilers of the new Michoud plant will generate 3000-degree heat.

These flames will produce 1,650,000 pounds of steam per hour, turning the giant turbines to produce the electricity.

The new plant is one of three on the Public Service system, the others being the Market Street Station on the Mississippi River at Market st., and the Paterson Station on the Industrial Canal north of Chef Menteur hwy. Nairne said the three plants can more than take care of the city's needs for many years.

The three stations are interconnected by 115,000 volt lines, and all are interconnected with the vast Louisiana Power and Light Co. and the Middle South Utilities system, and to other major electric systems, which provides greater dependability of service, Nairne said.

He said NOOSI has also taken the necessary steps to expand their transmission and distribution systems to move electricity from the three plants to the ultimate users.

President Nairne was joined by vice-president L. J. Cucullu in entertaining the visitors to the dedication at a luncheon at the plant.

Both imports and exports increased 13 per cent last year with a corresponding increase in the trade deficit of \$1.2 billion.

TO BE TAKEN OVER

During this year, the commissioner reported at the Roosevelt Hotel, the first steps will be taken to nationalize the Italian electric power industry. This, he said, is the "first large-scale and planned intervention of a type made familiar in the post war history of a number of European countries."

He also noted that Italy's agricultural work force today accounts for only 27 per cent of the total, compared with 40 per cent in 1950.

"The shift from the land to the cities, or to non-urban industrial or service activities, is far from completed; and by 1972 probably no more than 20 per cent of the labor force will find gainful employment on the land.

"That these internal migrations pose major problems of urban development, of reorientation of the educational system, goes without saying," he said.

Tra le immagini dei miei undici anni c'è D'Annunzio, come si vedeva quasi tutte le sere, fermo sul marciapiede davanti Aragno: diritto, a non perdere un centimetro della sua alta statura, pallido, nero il cappello duro ed il soprabito, foulard di seta candida, ghetta: per lo più solo

Allora e poi il suo destino fu singolare.

Non ebbe i vastissimi consensi di un Carducci e neppure quelli che prima avevano avuto del minor, come Prati, e (venuto in fama forse un po' dopo di lui, se pur più vecchio) ebbe Pascoli. Ma in compenso adorazioni appassionate, alcuni amici che avevano i tratti del discepolo di un profeta.

Lo stesso segui quando, qualche anno più tardi, entrò decisamente nella politica.

Il giudizio su D'Annunzio spetta anzitutto ai letterati, in minor parte, ai politici; perché non è dato dimenticare quel che rappresentò tra il '14 ed il '21 e come certe idee attuate dal fascismo venissero direttamente dalla « reggenza del Carnaro ».

Ma c'è pure un D'Annunzio che ha segnato una traccia nel costume italiano; anche degli italiani che ben poco conobbero della sua opera letteraria e che detestarono le magniloquenze delle *Canzoni della gesta d'Oltremare* e del discorso di Quarto.

Fu sostanzialmente la mia generazione a ricevere quella impronta.

Chi consideri i vari documenti della letteratura e della storia d'Italia degli anni che precedono la fama di D'Annunzio — si può con qualche approssimazione dire: gli anni fino al 1900 — trova ancora il costume dell'Italia risorgimentale: i romanzi di Rovetta e della Serac, le novelle di Ojetto, lo stesso Diario di Domenico Farini, ci danno sempre il volto dell'Italia a mezzo Ottocento. Non è questa una connotazione moralistica; buoni e cattivi, adulterii, imbrogli, ci sono prima e dopo; ma fino a D'Annunzio c'è una preoccupazione, oserei quasi dire una dimensione che manca: quella del bello. Anteriormente (ma ancora in Oriani, nella borghesia di Pirandello) pare ignorarsi il bel mobile, la villa, il parco, gli angoli più suggestivi delle nostre città: Ferrara od Orvieto possono evocare fantasmi di condottieri o di preti, non danno la suggestione delle loro strade. Anche il tipo umano è colto in espressioni convenzionali; matrone, fanciulle dal collo di cigno, occhi di cielo, mai una figura che marchi. Il capo

che mal sopporta il peso dei troppi capelli, la ciocca ardente nascosta nel folto delle chiome, nascono con D'Annunzio.

E' vero che altri l'aveva preceduto; altri aveva già visto le bellezze nascoste delle nostre città; le novelle italiane di Balzac, l'opera di Stendhal, pur nel loro convenzionalismo, ci avevano dato figure fisiche di italiani che non erano manichini. Ma quanti nella borghesia italiana dell'anno 1900 conoscevano vuol Ruskin, vuol Stendhal? Ci riesce difficile inquadrare bene il cerchio di conoscenze, del resto solide, ma ancora eminentemente fondate sul culto dell'antico, che era proprio anche ai buoni professionisti dell'inizio del secolo.

Se a questo culto del bello tutta l'Italia fu nel complesso recettiva, non lo fu invece allo scetticismo morale del romanzo dannunziano.

Credo che si accentui troppo l'importanza che viene data all'influenza letteraria sulla vita morale: che non suole mutare se ad una letteratura convenzionalmente casta ne succede una verista, ma animata da un grande anelito di riforma, di giustizia sociale, od una scettica. Non credo

possa imputarsi all'innocente alcun infanticidio, né alcun omicidio-suicidio a *Il trionfo della Morte*. Anche perché quei personaggi, quei Tullio Hermil, quei Giorgio Aurispa, quei conti di Ugenta, tutti signori che non facevano assolutamente nulla, neanche amministrare le loro terre, non erano dei simili per la comune degli italiani. Se mai la descrizione dell'aristocrazia che si vede nel *Piacere* poté dare qualche apporto al fermento socialista.

Invece quella preoccupazione del bello poté qualche po' nella visuale politica.

Trovava un terreno già preparato; il disprezzo per un Parlamento di pacifici borghesi succeduto ad uno dove si mescolavano grandi nomi storici cospiratori che avevano conosciuto le carceri o l'esilio, guerrieri di tutte le campagne della libertà; l'insofferenza per la nuova Roma con i suoi quartieri d'impiegati dove non si vedevano che mogli d'impiegati, figli d'impiegati, servette d'impiegati, come ebbe a scrivere la Serao.

Le prime cento pagine de *Le vergini delle rocce* segnano uno scorcio nuovo, ignoto alla panoramica del tempo: Maria Sofia di Napoli vi appare come l'ultima Valchiria; Leone XIII è un gradino più alto di re Umberto, re d'una stirpe guerriera che deve adattarsi ad un modesto compito quasi impiegatizio. Nulla è accordato all'antclericalismo, alla storia risorgimentale in auge.

A suo tempo quelle pagine furono certo meno notate dall'articolo di Sonnino « Torriamo allo Statuto ». Ma questo fu presto dimenticato; per la mia generazione quelle pagine furono un virus che opera lentamente. Certo quando si guarda a quelli che nel 1920 avevano tra i 25 ed i 35 anni, a spiegare quanto si fossero allontanati dal pensiero del

loro padri, dall'illuminismo dall'ottimismo democratico camminando verso il culto della forza, occorre pure ricordare D'Annunzio (naturalmente sarebbe erroneo scorgere in lui qualcosa di più che uno tra molti fatti).

Non sono un critico letterario, né in grado di giudicare cosa sia vivo e cosa morto dell'opera di D'Annunzio. Constatò che ai diciannovenne d'oggi occorre imporre come un compito faticoso la lettura di un suo romanzo; e che non stimano quella poesia giovanile che per me ha mantenuto il suo fascino. Non amo le analogie, ma ne vorrei una che salvasse trecento pagine della prosa di D'Annunzio, non foss'altro per certe descrizioni di una Roma sparita materialmente o sommersa sotto le automobili, che mi sembrano di una straordinaria vivezza.

Penso possa dirsi caduta l'influenza politica; se anche disgraziatamente dovesse sopravvenire nuove generazioni inebriate del mito della forza, avrebbero ben altri più numerosi maestri.

Credo che la cosa più viva che resti di D'Annunzio sia quella preoccupazione del bello che ha dato agli italiani. Sarà forse illusione, ma le rare volte che mi affaccio oltre frontiera e visito case borghesi od università o circoli di studio, tra le molte considerazioni che a volte a volte nascono in me, una c'è sempre: « qui non è passato D'Annunzio ».

MEXICO - El Presidente de Venezuela Rómulo Betancourt fue objeto de una apoteósica recepción por el gobierno y pueblo mexicano. Toda la capital de México se preparó debidamente para la llegada del Mandatario venezolano, fijada para el sábado 24 de febrero recién pasado.

Los carteles anti-Betancouristas colocados en remotas secciones de la ciudad fueron destruidos. Se aumentaron las medidas de seguridad y los preocupados funcionarios tomaron todas las medidas posibles para evitar desórdenes.

Los periódicos publicaron informaciones, fotografías y notas biográficas sobre Betancourt que es muy conocido en México desde sus días en el exilio.

Betancourt es el cuarto Presidente que visita México en menos de un año. Los otros Presidentes fueron John F. Kennedy de EE.UU., José Goulart de Brasil y Jorge Alessandri de Chile.
