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HAPPY AND PROSPEROUS 1964: MAY PEACE PREVAIL IN OUR COUNTRY AND IN THE WORLD

GREATEST INDUSTRIAL AND ECONOMIC MOVEMENT FOR NEW ORLEANS

In his year-end report to the people, Mayor V. H. Schiro said that New Orleans is enjoying the greatest industrial and economic movement in history.

The mayor singled out the beginning of the new International Trade Mart Tower as one of the most significant and exciting events of the year.

"THIS MULTI-MILLION-DOLLAR project," Schiro said, "will transform the face and vision of New Orleans outward towards the river."

New Orleans is tops on foreign waterborne traffic, its Michoud complex is making remarkable, continuing economic contributions to the city's prosperity, employment is very encouraging, there is an upswing in commercial and residential building, the tidewater channel is complete and city employees have received their long-awaited pay raises, Schiro said.

New Orleans enjoyed a banner building year, the mayor said, with a record of over \$112 million in building permits issued. He cited the New Orleans East and New Orleans West projects as the most optimistic dream of city planners a decade ago.

"Industry is also on the move with multi-million-dollar plants under construction or in the planning stage," Schiro said.

Among these are a 500,000 square-foot office building on the rocket center grounds at Michoud, a multi-million plant of the Linde Division of Union Carbide to be built next year on 110 acres fronting the Intracoastal Waterway, an \$8 million plant for production of gases for use in the rocket industry by Air Reduction Sales Company and a \$12.5 million plant of the Oklahoma Cement Co., on 50 acres fronting the Michoud canal near the rocket center.

IN THE BUSINESS DISTRICT, the mayor said, pile driving has begun for a new Federal Reserve building near the old City Hall and the Jung and Monteleone hotels have expansion programs with a combined cost of \$6 million.

THE GREATER NEW ORLEANS Mississippi River Bridge traffic totaled 11 million vehicles during 1963, 1½ million more than the previous year, he said. Revenues increased \$120,148 over 1962.

School building programs, especially at the university level, were the greatest in local history. Tulane, Loyola, LSU and LSUNO are all engaged in rebuilding.

"In conclusion," he said, "I am happy to report that we are operating in a climate of commendable rapport with our neighboring parishes and communities. And I would like to repeat that the city administration and the City Council never enjoyed better relations.

"The destiny of our city in this space age is irretrievably linked with the well-being, friendliness, and cooperation of our neighbors and coworkers. We are confronted by the greatest forward movement industrially and economically in history. We must meet this challenge at all levels of government. I, as mayor, pledge all of my resources and energy to that purpose. If I may be allowed to repeat myself—'If it is good for New Orleans, I'm for it.'"

LBJ Okays \$1.5 Million For N.O. Lab

President Lyndon B. Johnson has signed a bill appropriating \$1.5 million for the expansion of the U.S. Agriculture Department's Southern Regional Research Laboratory on the lake-front.

Edmund Stephens, director of the budget and finance division of the Agriculture Research Service in Washington, said to

day details of the expansion are being worked out and it will be several weeks before the General Services Administration can turn over specifications to architects.

Construction is not expected to start for another six to nine months, he added.

The appropriation was contained in a \$6.23 billion measure. Included in the overall bill is \$1.5 million for a weed control laboratory in Mississippi.

The New Orleans laboratory, located at 1100 Robert E. Lee blvd., is concerned with cotton and textile experiments.

H. H. POPE PAUL VI IN VISIT TO THE HOLY LAND

Penitential Pilgrimage of the Supreme Pontiff

The eyes of the world, through television, will be on H. H. Paul VI as he travels in the Holy Land.

The Pope will stay at the Apostolic Delegation which rises on the slopes of the Mount of Olives.

Promises by Jordan and Israel to allow facility of movement were taken to mean that the iron rule restricting passage from Israel into any Arab country will be lifted.

The Pope will take part in a penitential service at night at the Garden of Gethsemane. In effect an Holy Hour, the service will include the chanting of the Passion narratives of the Gospels in Latin, Greek, Aramaic, and Armenian.

In Bethlehem, the Holy Father will deliver a major speech on the theme of world peace. He will visit the Church of the Nativity, the only building of its size and importance to survive substantially unchanged since its erection by Constantine 17 centuries ago.

In Jerusalem's Old City, he is expected to offer Mass on the Feast of the Epiphany, Jan. 6, in the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, custody of which is shared by the Catholic, Greek Orthodox, and Armenian Orthodox Churches. The church was designed as a companion to St. Peter's Basilica in Rome.

The Holy Land is a country of contrast: arid desert, bleak mountains and a river valley of tropical fertility.

The mountains of Moab to the east and the Judean plateau toward the west could be part of the landscape of the moon. Seen from a distance, they stand out bluish gray in the clear air.

They are not high as mountains go, rarely reaching 3,000 feet above the sea. But they seem to soar because of the fantastic trough lying between them.

That is the valley of the River Jordan, plunging south from the high mountains of Lebanon and Syria, through the Sea of Galilee, to the Dead Sea, 1,397 feet below sea level. There it is the lowest spot on earth.

The Holy Land is split between the states of Jordan and Israel.


Arab Jordan, 37,000 square miles, is shaped like a tomahawk with its cutting edge pointing south. It is called a desert country. But relatively near the Israeli border of today, it is by no means bleak.

Palm, pine, cypress, paplar, olive and fruit trees patch the hills near Jerusalem with green. The winter rains bring vegetation to the fields.

On the Israeli side, the people are relatively prosperous. There are good farms, a variety of industries and plans go ahead

to irrigate the deserts and turn them green.

The trip has wide religious, psychological and historical connotations.

'LET IN FRESH AIR'

The aim, as phrased by the late Pope John XXIII, was to open windows and "let in some fresh air."

The "Holy Land is sacred ground" to Protestants, Orthodox, Jews and Roman Catholics alike. To go there, in a sense, is to stand on equal footing with others on commonly hallowed

ground.

By his trip Pope Paul offers a striking image of the new expanded horizon.

In the Holy Land, the major Christian shrines are shared by the different churches, and the larger proportion of them are under Eastern Orthodox jurisdiction.

Pope Paul's announced objective for the trip is to offer "an expression of prayer, penance and renovation" in behalf of peace and Christian unity for "the glory of Christ and of His Church."

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New Orleans East First Residential Area Starts

Construction has started on the initial residential development in New Orleans East.

Centex Construction Co. of Dallas is working on the first five model homes in Village de l'Est and also has contracted to build houses on the first 200 home sites in the initial residential development which will consist of 2400 lots.

The development is in the extreme southwest corner of New Orleans East's huge residential section just north of the Chef Menteur hwy. at Michoud blvd.

The five model homes, expected to be completed at the end of this month, will be typical of the units planned for the initial area. Houses will be in a price range of \$19,950 to \$25,750, on lots 60 by 110 feet.

1963 GREATEST BUSINESS YEAR Economic Records Highest In New Orleans History

The story of business progress in the Crescent City is an old one, but the facts and figures for 1963 are like none ever seen before.

Analyses of 16 important barometers adequately measuring major facets of the local economy substantiate this conclusion.

A preliminary report by the Chamber of Commerce of the New Orleans Area says, in effect, that the city and its people have never had it so good.

The local standard-of-living, propelled by record employment and personal income figures, reached an all-time peak.

FACTORS IN UPSURGE

The report, prepared by Arthur S. Graham, director of the chamber's research and statistics department, listed these major factors as contributing to the city's 1963 surge:

—Production contracts of more than \$750 million and construction projects of almost \$25 million at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Michoud operations;

—A phenomenal increase in ship building at local yards;


A former employee of the Illinois Central Railroad, he operated the P&M service station at Gov. Nicholls and North Rampart streets for the past 15 years.

WALKING ALONG THE VIEUX CARRE

ST. MARY'S ITALIAN CHURCH THROUGH 200 YEARS

To introduce, in a worthy manner, our new column: WALKING ALONG THE VIEUX CARRE, we begin to write about a venerable Church in the French Quarter, known as St. Mary's Italian Church on Chartres Street near Ursuline.

As source material we are using the wonderful and superb treatise of the historic complex of the old Ursuline Convent and Church by Roger Baudier.

On the hallowed grounds, where these structures rise one can read the history and wander through two centuries of the old City of New Orleans.

As one passes through the doors of the Church or thru the ancient doors of the Lodge fronting Chartres Street into the garden of the Rectory -once the Ursuline Convent- you have a definite feeling of stepping into the long past and memories of events become part of us from French colonial days to somewhat recent times.

It was on this spot that everything came to be and here it was that everyone who was somebody left an imprint permanent as history and stirring for its impact "pon customs and traditions still alive in this Crescent City."

At this time we will only mention that St. Mary's, which is now the Church of the Italians, is a simple but imposing building. This edifice, which is joined to the old Ursuline Convent, was dedicated in 1845. At one time it was the Church of the Archbishop and the greatest feasts of the year were celebrated here with impressive ceremony.

The building was designed by the famous New Orleans architect DePouilly, and, within, one can observe a glass window commemorating the Battle of N.O. in 1815.

We are grateful to Father Vincent Liberto O.M.I. present Pastor of St. Mary's for having suggested to us to write about his Church in which he takes great pride as he carries on his pastor-

ral mission since January 20, 1952.

Fr. Liberto came from Texas and he tells us that when he undertook his duties he felt as if he went way back in time and he comes out into the 20th century as he crosses the boundary of the Rectory on Chartres Street.

FROM ITALY TO ST. PHILIP STREET IN NEW ORLEANS

The year was 1890 when Signor Giuseppe Ruffino and his wife Teresa landed in New Orleans, located themselves in the 600 block of St. Philip Str., and started a bakery business.

The couple, though enterprising, perhaps little realized the usefulness of the bakery plant. In fact Mr. and Mrs. Ruffino were to become the parents of ten children. To-day, 73 years later, six of them either live or conduct their business in the same 600 block. They were actually seven up to last year, when Joseph Jr., died. We can almost say that this is not only an unusual but unique case.

The Ruffinos can easily claim to be the largest family of Italo-Americans in New Orleans, certainly it's the largest and closest within the French Quarter.

The seven boys and three girls came in this order: Frank A., Sam, Fanny, now Mrs. Nick Evola, Susann, now Mrs. Sam Curcuru, Nick, Jennie, now Mrs. James Emola, Dominick, Joseph Victor and Vincent who is the owner and operator of Ruffino's Italian restaurant at number 625 St. Philip.

New Orleans is noted for its fine eating establishments and among the big names is Ruffino's. Here wining and dining can become an inexhaustible subject of conversation. The menu does not need translation, but is given in a form so that any patron may select without embarrassment. All offerings have a definition, such as: VEAL SCALLOPINI: veal simmered in marsala wine with tomato sauce, mushrooms and spices.

Charlie Weaver, Claude Mauberret Jr., members of the Metropolitan Opera, when in the city, and other VIP stop to eat at Ruffino's.

Vincent Ruffino is proud to tell of a prominent businessman who, on a flight from Chicago to visit N. O. for the first time, had heard of Ruffino's from a traveling companion as a choice place for food. The gentleman is now a regular patron as he comes in town.

Mr. Vincent Ruffino is married to the former Anna Tamburello and they have three children: Vianne, now Mrs. Leonard James Jr., Charles and Frankie. Incidentally the name Vianne is a contraction of vincent and Anna.



A stroll along the "banquettes" of the Vieux Carré is rewarding with its glimpses of beflowered patios, quaint arched carriageways, unusual and fascinating old iron knockers and "peek-thru" openings in the heavy wooden doors which guard the entrances to the patios. Many of the balconies are graced with flower boxes from which brilliantly colored blossoms vie for attention.

LBJ IS PUSHING ALLIANCE PLANS

Seeks Latin Economic Development Goal

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson appears determined to make the Alliance for Progress move closer in 1964 to its goal: Stimulating economic and social development in Western Hemisphere nations.

Friends of the President say he feels the alliance concept is one of the best plans yet devised to help this country's southern neighbors—if they will cooperate more and if bottlenecks in Washington can be cleared away.

Johnson already has moved in an attempt to solve the latter problem, putting coordinator of all United States-Latin American relations in the hands of one man—Thomas C. Mann.

Some Latin American officials have said that once there are signs of more imaginative action in Washington, the hemisphere nations will be inclined to do a better job of pushing for alliance projects.

Mann, as undersecretary of state for inter-American affairs, has been given much broader power than his predecessor, Edwin L. Martin.

La marcha de la exportación italiana es muy satisfactoria, sobre todo considerando la siempre viva competencia en los mercados extranjeros.

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

DECRETO N°. 23

OSWALDO LOPEZ ARELLANO, Jefe de Gobierno de Honduras, haciendo uso de las atribuciones que le confiere el Decreto Número Uno de las Fuerzas Armadas, emitido el 3 de octubre 1963, y CONSIDERANDO: Que el pueblo hondureño ha otorgado su mas amplio respaldo al Regimen de las Fuerzas Armadas surgido el 3 de octubre, y que, como resultado de esa adhesión popular, la paz, la tranquilidad y el orden se han afirmado solidamente en todos los departamentos de la República.

CONSIDERANDO: Que el Gobierno Militar considera como uno de sus deberes más imperiosos auspiciar y fomentar el normal desenvolvimiento de todos los sectores sociales, económicos y culturales del país y que han desaparecido ya los motivos de orden público que forzaron a las F.A. a establecer en la República un estado de emergencia que las circunstancias demandaban.

Artículo Único. A partir de esta fecha queda suspendido en todo el territorio nacional el Estado de Sitio implantado por Acuerdo de las Fuerzas Armadas del 3 de octubre de 1963.

HOMBRES DE HONDURAS. - Uno de los personajes de mayor relieve internacional en el Gabinete del Gobierno Militar de Honduras que preside el Coronel Lopez Arellano, es el Ministro de Relaciones Exteriores, Licenciado JORGE FIDEL DURON. Profesional del Derecho, graduado de la Escuela de Leyes de la Universidad de Loyola en Nueva Orleans, regreso a Tegucigalpa por el año de 1933, se incorporó al Foro Hondureño y fundó su Bufete de Abogacía con gran éxito. Hombre de múltiples actividades, se dedicó al periodismo y es escritor de altos vuelos. Su columna 'MOSAICO NACIONAL' es ampliamente leída en Honduras y fuera de las fronteras patrias.

Incansable viajero, deleita a los lectores con sus amenas crónicas de sus viajes por países de América y Europa. No ha mucho escribió notables artículos bien documentados en el diario 'EL DIA' de Tegucigalpa, denunciando la infiltración comunista en Honduras.

El Lic. Duron ha tenido gran figuración en la vida cívica, política, social, intelectual y cultural de Honduras. Miembro destacado del CLUB ROTARIO INTERNACIONAL, por muchos años editó la REVISTA ROTARIA DE HONDURAS.

Durante el gobierno de la Junta Militar que depuso al régimen de don Julio Lozano Diaz, el Lic. Duron fue Ministro de Relaciones Exteriores. Cruz.

A principios de 1963, cuando se reunió en la capital de Honduras, la Gran Convención del Partido Nacional para postular candidatos para autoridades supremas, el Lic. Duron fue postulado primer designado a la Presidencia de la República, postulación que fue muy bien recibida por la ciudadanía.

Morrison logró consolidar sus fuerzas en Nueva Orleans y en los Distritos Municipales del Sur del Estado, habiendo triunfado en 26 parroquias o distritos con una mayoría de 140.000 votos, que le dan derecho a entrar en la segunda elección que se verificará el 11 de los corrientes, siendo su opositor John McKeithen, habil político actual Comisionado de Servicios Públicos. Hasta el momento de escribir estas líneas, todo indica el futuro triunfo de Morrison. Se le han unido muchos de los candidatos derrotados. El Alcalde Schiro de Nueva Orleans, que apoya a Gillis Long, está ahora con Morrison, así como otros líderes políticos de la metrópoli y de otras poblaciones importantes del Estado. Se dice que McKeithen tendrá el apoyo del Gobernador Davis ya que su punto principal de controversia será el asunto racial, alegando que Morrison obtuvo los votos del "bloque negro".

Una noticia importante que fue muy bien recibida en los círculos marítimos y comerciales de Nueva Orleans, fue la del reconocimiento diplomático del Gobierno Militar de Honduras por el Gobierno de los Estados Unidos de América.

Como se sabe, más del 68% del comercio de importación y exportación de Honduras se realiza con los EE.UU., y en gran cantidad a través del puerto de Nueva Orleans. En reciente conferencia de prensa en Tegucigalpa, El Jefe de Estado, Coronel Oswaldo Lopez Arellano, declaró a los correspondientes nacionales y extranjeros, que su gobierno respetaría y cumpliría con todos los tratados y compromisos internacionales.

MAS APOYO QUE NUNCA DARA EL GOBIERNO DE LOS ESTADOS UNIDOS A LA ONU

A través de las maravillosas facilidades de la televisión, la semana pasada tuvimos ocasión de presenciar la sesión de la Asamblea General de las Naciones Unidas en la cual se presentó por primera vez en su calidad de Presidente de los EE.UU., el Exmo. Lyndon B. Johnson.

El Primer Mandatario hizo un llamamiento en favor de una nueva era de esperanza y progreso para "esa tercera parte de la humanidad que todavía está acosada por el hambre, la pobreza y la enfermedad."

En un discurso que nos recordó el lanzamiento del NEW DEAL por el Presidente Franklin D. Roosevelt hace 30 años, Johnson comprometió el apoyo de su administración a las Naciones Unidas "más que nunca".

Dió a la Asamblea General un voto de Año Nuevo de una nación acongojada que se compromete a hacer de la paz mundial, de los derechos civiles y del bienestar humano "no una ilusión, sino una realidad".

"Estados Unidos quiere ver terminar la guerra fría. Queremos verla terminar de una vez y para siempre" dijo el nuevo Presidente y los soviéticos señalaron que tal expresión había sido el punto más constructivo en su primer discurso como jefe ejecutivo en esta ciudad.

El Presidente Johnson estuvo durante más de media hora estrechando manos de los integrantes de un compacto grupo de funcionarios de las Naciones Unidas y de diplomáticos de las 113 naciones que se hallaban congregados en la sala indonesia, cerca a la sala de la Asamblea en la que, durante 15 minutos, hizo uso de la palabra oficialmente ante un recinto colmado por el público, pese a los estrictos controles de ingreso.

El Presidente Johnson llegó al edificio de las Naciones Unidas protegido por unos 7.000 policías de la ciudad de Nueva York y oficiales federales, flanqueado además por los guardias de las Naciones Unidas dentro del edificio, todos los cuales recordaban el asesinato del Presidente Kennedy, cometido hace menos de un mes en Dallas.

El Presidente y la señora Johnson fueron recibidos a la entrada por el Secretario General Thant y el presidente de la Asamblea, Carlos Sosa Rodríguez, de Venezuela.

Los delegados se pusieron de pie y aplaudieron cuando Sosa Rodríguez presentó en términos sencillos al Presidente Johnson. Luego el Primer Mandatario comenzó a hablar gravemente rindiendo un homenaje a Kennedy.

"Mi Nación ha perdido a un gran líder... esta Organización ha perdido a un gran amigo... la paz mundial ha perdido a un gran campeón", dijo el Presidente.
