


### COLUMBUS DAY

### A NATIONAL

October 12. Today we again pay tribute and homage to the discoverer of our North American continent, Christopher Columbus. His exact date of birth is unknown, but we can approximate it in or about the year 1446. The place of his birth is accepted as Genoa but in that also there is room for conjecture. To many of us the story of Columbus has become almost a legend. He was the son of a humble family of wool-combers whose land holdings were barely enough to eke out a meager existence. His early education was neither through nor comprehensive and as he grew up, more and more of his training came from his practical experience rather than from his formal education.

It is accepted in many areas that Columbus showed an early interest in the adventure and appeal of a maritime career for himself. His first voyage was in year 1460, and from that time until he was about twenty-four he made numerous voyages which were to serve as his lengthy apprenticeship. During these voyages he learned the ways of the sea and the ways of the men of the sea, particularly those occupied in piracy and slave trading. It is true that there is an abundance of conjecture concerning both these practices but it has become accepted that many Portuguese ships and captains profited from these two endeavors.

It was about this time that Columbus moved from Genoa to Lisbon as the maritime industry grew. The knowledge of his life here is also very limited but it is known that during these years he became a skillful draftsman and map-maker. He also engaged in commercial enterprise or what we may term speculation. It is hard to believe but during the next twenty three years up until 1492 little is known about the actions of Columbus other than the fact that he made voyages during this period. Soon after Columbus reached Lisbon, he became possessed with the idea that important discoveries could be made by sailing due West. Since much of the credit given Columbus is dependent on this idea it should be noted that as early as 1474 he had formed and declared in letters the purpose of visiting and exploring the unknown regions of the East if at all possible, by sailing West. To enumerate the trials and errors, the plights and disappointments and the hardships and tragedies that preceded the culmination of his dream has filled volumes. All of these tend to add to, rather than detract from, the credit of Columbus. Others perhaps were as familiar with all the geographical facts and ideas that had filled his head. Perhaps even others saw the conclusion to which these facts pointed.

WHEN President Roosevelt, on April 30th 1935 affixed his signature to the Joint Resolution of Congress declaring Columbus Day, October 12th, henceforth to be proclaimed a national holiday, it marked the culmination of a 28-year campaign on the part of the Italians in this country, and especially a few leaders, to have the great navigator's exploit officially recognized by the country. Largely through the tireless and unceasing efforts of Judge John J. Freschi of the General Sessions Court in New York City, who is known as "the father of Columbus Day," was this brought about, assisted by the "Columbus Day League."

To quote from the first issue of *Atlantica*, in November 1923, when it was known as the *Rivista d'Italia e d'America*, and was published in Rome: "Yet while in Italy the people and official representatives of many nations, for the first time, celebrated the day of the discovery of the New World through the efforts of an Italian, we must not forget another Italian — a humble printer — who, with a faith more unique than rare, fought for some thirty years to have North America

officially proclaim October 12th a legal holiday.

"In the United States many States, beginning with Colorado in 1907, celebrate on October 12th the discovery of the great new continent by the great sailor from Genoa.

"The tenacious advocate of this great Latin holiday—Angelo Noce—who also came from the same city, was brought to America by his parents at the age of three in 1850, and he lived as a proud Italian among other immigrants who had come to America from all parts of the world.

"Angelo Noce died in Denver on January 6, 1922, alone, poor and tired, yet happy and satisfied with his work and the result already obtained.

Senators Robert Wagner and Royal S. Copeland of New York, Congressman James M. Fitzpatrick of the 20th Congressional District in New York City, Gr. Uff. Generoso Pope, and former Judge Albert H. Vitale.

The campaign began, according to Judge Freschi, as far back as 1906 when the measure was first introduced in Washington. At that time Judge Freschi went to the Capitol accompanied by Antonio Zucca, Vito Contessa, Pietro Acrivelli, Rofrano, and Bernardino Ciambelli and urged the





## IL CORPO DELLA PACE

I rapporti annuali al Congresso i quali ammontano ad oltre un continuo di pubblicazioni di svariate dimensioni da parte di molte diverse agenzie governative, rappresentano un dovere presidenziale. Detti rapporti costituiscono nella maggioranza una pratica generale, ma uno di essi che potrebbe essere considerato fuori dell'ordinario fu inviato, lo scorso 27 luglio, al Congresso dalla Casa Bianca. Questo fu il rapporto annuale di un'Agenzia fuori dell'ordinario, il Corpo della Pace.

Il Corpo della Pace è in esistenza da meno di un anno. Il suddetto fu il primo rapporto annuale, coprendo il periodo dalla creazione del Corpo lo scorso settembre alla fine dell'anno fiscale governativo, giugno 30. Durante il suo primo anno di esistenza, il Corpo della Pace da una semplice idea si è sviluppato in un effettivo programma estero. Nel marzo del 1961, il Corpo della Pace non aveva volontari, personale, moduli per domande d'accettazione, progetti...niente, ad eccezione di un Ordine Esecutivo inteso a creare una Agenzia che non sarebbe stato approvato dal Governo prima di sei mesi.

Le radici dell'idea del Corpo della Pace ebbero origine meno di due anni fa. Fu precisamente nel novembre del 1960 che John F. Kennedy, allora Senatore espresse le sue idee nei riguardi di un Corpo della Pace in un discorso durante la campagna Presidenziale in California. Giornali, gruppi civici e collegi assorbirono l'idea immediatamente e divennero interessati nella sua realizzazione. Di fatti, un gruppo Di cittadini in seno alla vecchia International Cooperation Administration incominciò a studiare la prospettiva prima ancora dell'inaugurazione del Presidente Kennedy Presidente Kennedy.

Quando l'Ordine Esecutivo inteso a creare il Corpo della Pace fu emesso, il nuovo gruppo venne a trovarsi di fronte a sette importanti problemi. Ci erano abbastanza Americani qualificati, in grado e desiderosi di rispondere all'invito del Corpo della Pace? I Governi stranieri farebbero richiesta di tali volontari per sopportare i loro bisogni di mano d'opera? Era possibile scegliere i volontari qualificati per il servizio? Potevano questi essere adeguatamente istruiti onde evitare le difficoltà degli Americani che precedentemente non avevano avuto successo all'

measure before the committee. Though it was defeated, the bill was brought up again in succeeding Congresses, but its progress was interrupted by the war. Meanwhile various States were officially proclaiming Columbus Day a State holiday, beginning with Colorado in 1907, and now only 13 States do not officially celebrate the holiday.

"ENO, which always remembers Noce with nostalgic affection, should worthily honor the memory of this other son of hers, humble, but noble and generous, who worked, fought and triumphed for the ideal of having the Americans celebrate the memory of Columbus, of having universally celebrated the date of the discovery of the new continent.

"Columbus Day has been proposed as a national holiday by the entire country in a bill presented at Washington by a committee of Italians and Americans, headed by Judge John J. Freschi, one of those Italo-Americans who, though devoted sons of the land where they were born, do not for that reason renounce the language, the traditions and the native land of their fathers.

"The Italian societies of North America and the Italian press of the great and hospitable country have also made assiduous efforts for this assertion of public and official recognition for the great navigator."

The above article was written by Dr. Giovanni Perilli, who has, in a volume entitled "Colorado and the Italians of Colorado," amply documented the writings and the life of Angelo Noce.

**T**RABAJO en este diario desde hace cuatro años. Creo que uno o dos compañeros de redacción me estiman en cierta forma. Los demás no llegan a estimarme ni a aborrecerme. Son elementos neutros, a cuyo lado desfila mi persona sin causarles ninguna impresión.

Cuando arribé a este periódico fue con el propósito de hacer literatura, de desleírme en palabras, de hacer pompas de colores. Pronto me di cuenta de mi error, cuando cayeron sobre mí los telegramas noticiosos de los correspondentes. Entonces comenzó mi suplicio, ya que los remitentes carecían de toda imaginación literaria, de todo contenido informativo.

Me topaba de pronto con esta dura realidad, que me golpeaba como un puño en la cabeza. Sumiso y manso me entregué a la tarea de componer informaciones. Entre mejor las dejaba, más telegramas venían. Me sublevé al fin contra tanta desvergüenza. ¿Cómo es que enviaban más correspondencias a sabiendas que las que habían mandado no servían y que por eso se les tuvo que hacer de nuevo?

Falta de decoro literario, de responsabilidad personal. Mi indignación subía más cada día, al punto de sentirme enfermo. Planeé un recurso para deshacerme de ellos, o al menos para obligarlos a escribir mejor. Les envié un telegrama circular concebido en estos términos:

"Señor de mi consideración: yo soy el que recibe y compone las correspondencias que usted manda a este diario. Como son tan mal escritas, están a punto de causarme rabia. Le advierto que conozco bien su dirección, y que cuando esta enfermedad se me declare, pasará por donde usted clavándole los dientes."

Después de enviar este recado me quedé satisfecho, creyendo que había alcanzado mis propósitos. Ilusión vana. Dos días más tarde estaba otra vez la lluvia de telegramas, con la diferencia que estaban peor escritos que los anteriores. Uno de los correspondentes hasta tuvo la singular falta de vergüenza de hacerse el gracioso. El recado que me envió decía más o menos:

"Estimado señor: no me sorprendió el caso de su próxima enfermedad. Yo estoy inmune a esa dolencia, pues cada día me curo la rabia que me causan mis informantes."

¿Habrá visto tanto descaro?

Bueno, pero en verdad, si esto era terrible, más insufrible era el caso de los espontáneos colaboradores del diario. Confieso plenamente que en poco tiempo me aburri de estar lanzando al mercado de las letras tantos nombres de ignorantes que se hacían aparecer como escritores.

El director me llamó un día y me alargó un papel desde su escritorio. Tomé el papel y comencé a ojearlo. El director me dijo:

Confieso, que yo no soy religioso, pero terminé de arreglar el escrito con las cruces hechas...

Por fin una vez me quedó viendo el director. Era en los días en que estaban dando algunos preavisos. Yo sentí que una canica mediana me daba saltos por

### CREDITO BARATO ALA PARA COMPRAR PRODUCTOS MEXICANOS

Las líneas de crédito que el mencionado banco abrirá en cada caso a las instituciones de los seis países centroamericanos, servirán para la exportación y por lo tanto, la producción agrícola e industrial de México.

Las ventajas inmediatas que el sistema reporta a los industriales comerciantes y exportadores en general, son estas:

- 1) Vender sus productos en Centroamérica, a plazos hasta de un año;
- 2) Cobrar inmediatamente, en México, el valor de las mercancías exportadas;

- 4) Competir en igualdad de condiciones de financiamiento, con otros países altamente industrializados.
