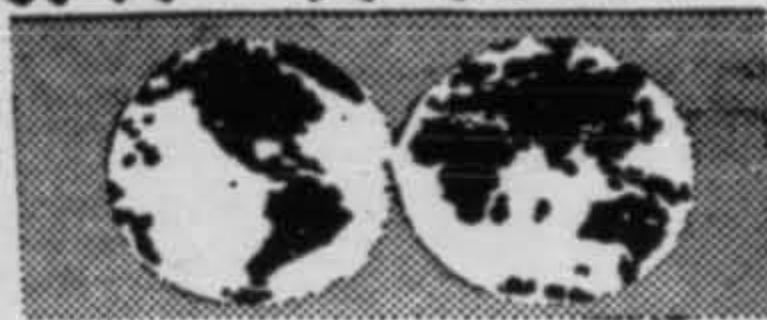
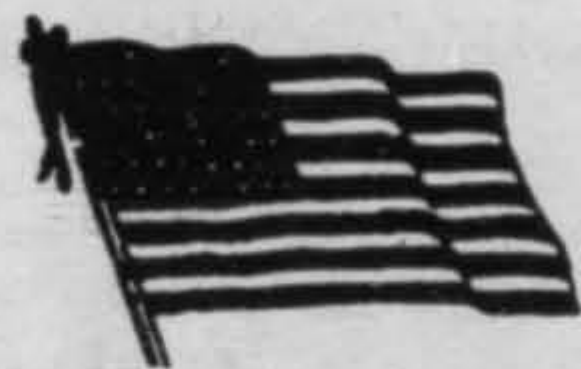

PREDICTION BY C OF C
RESEARCH DIRECTOR

Arthur S. Graham, director of research and statistics division of the Harbor of Commerce of the New Orleans Area predicted a very successful 1963 for the next business year. He predicted that the population would increase to 937,000; a slow but steady increase in employment; an increase in capital investment in new and expanded industries; an increase in local payrolls to \$1.5 billion dollars; an increase in development in the petrochemical field; an expanded employment at the Michoud Saturn rocket plant to over 7,000 employees; the tide-water channel will be opened to sea-going vessels by May, 1963; full development of the New Orleans East area; a probable 5% increase in all types of construction an uppage of nearly 1% in wholesale sales; a 7% increase in bank debits to a new record of more than \$17.6 billion dollars; bank clearings will continue upward; homestead and saving institutions will set another high record in 1963; building permits in the unincorporated sections of Jefferson Parish may soar to \$68.6 million dollars, while within corporate New Orleans, the total may reach and pass \$100.4 million dollars.

According to Mr. Graham, the record for 1962 was good, setting a number of records in the fields of endeavor that New Orleanians were working in and that many increases during the year just past will continue to improve in 1963.

Fanfani Backed in Second Vote

ROME (AP)—Premier Amintore Fanfani won Dec. 6 his second vote of confidence in 24 hours. The Senate voted 79-44 to approve a recent reshuffle in cabinet posts. The Chamber of Deputies voted its approval Wednesday night.

Representatives of right-wing groups had claimed the changes in the center-left coalition government indicated growing concessions to the Socialist party. The Socialists back Fanfani's Cabinet but have no seats in it.

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ECONOMIC NEWS FROM ITALY

POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENTS

Christian Democrat Deputy Carlo Russo, 42, heretofore Undersecretary for Foreign Affairs, was appointed Minister of Posts and Telecommunications. Mr. Russo replaces Christian Democrat Senator Guido Corbellini, 72, who became Minister without Portfolio for the coordination of scientific research. Edoardo Martino, Christian Democrat, 52, was appointed Undersecretary of Foreign Affairs. Cristoforo Pezzini, 70, Christian Democrat, became Undersecretary of the Budget, to fill the vacancy created by the death of Deputy Dino Penazato.

By a vote 333 to 57 the Chamber of Deputies passed the bill for the nationalization of electric energy, previously approved by the Senate. The bill establishes a National Electricity Authority (E.N.E.I.) with the exclusive power to produce, transport, transform, distribute and sell electric energy. A petition claiming that the bill is unconstitutional was submitted to the President of the Republic on November 30.

The leaders of the four parties comprising Premier Amintore Fanfani's parliamentary majority (Christian Democrats, Republicans, Social Democrats, and Socialist) met in Rome to discuss the legislative program for the next few months. They agreed to continue their cooperation in support of the center-left government and to expedite parliamentary approval of major items of legislation such as the reform of the Senate, the establishment of the semi-autonomous region of Friuli-Venezia Giulia, the enactment of a 15 per cent withholding tax on corporate dividends, and a bill to foster the formation and enlargement of small, owner-operated, farm holding. No definite agreement was reached on the legislation for the establishment of regional administrations on the Italian mainland. The Christian Democrats are seeking the enactment of legislation on the powers, sources of revenue, and staffing of the center-left coalition demand legislation on the election of the Regional Councils (legislatures). The party leaders will meet again in January to review the parliamentary agenda and to set the date of the parliamentary election, which is to be held in the spring.

Foreign Trade Minister Luigi Preti discussed Common Market commercial policies in a press conference held in Washington. Mr. Preti indicated that Italy is opposed to discrimination against U.S. imports. He suggested that the problem of discrimination may be alleviated by Britain's entry into the European Community. The Minister also stated that Italy will support a commercial policy designed to expand the flow of tropical agricultural products into the Common Market. On December 1st, Mr. Preti met with Dr. Arthur Schlesinger Jr., Special Assistant to the President to discuss Italy's political and economic outlook.

Preliminary reports suggest that Italy is again developing a substantial balance of payment surplus, in spite of a record level of commodity imports.

FOOD AND AGRICULTURAL NEWS

SUGARBEET PRODUCTION REPORTED AT 6.7 MILLION TONS

The 1962 sugarbeet harvest is reported at 6.7 million

tons, with an average polarimeter reading of 16.45. Production of sugarbeet has declined steadily from the peak of 1959 (11.4 million tons). The 1961 harvest was 7.0 million tons.

PRODUCTION OF STRAWBERRIES REACHES 50,000 TONS

The strawberry crop is reported at 50,000 tons. The area harvested was 8,000 hectares (about 20,000 acres). The main production centers are Verona, Bologna, Ferrara and Rome. Italy is Europe's largest producer of strawberries.

INDUSTRIES

ADVERTISING EXPENDITURES ESTIMATED AT \$229 MILLION

Total advertising expenditures in 1962 are estimated at 140 billion Lire (\$224 million). The percentage breakdown by medium is as follows: newspapers and magazines, 40.4; television 9.29; radio 6.43; movies 6.79; outdoor 10.71; other media (signs, mail, samples, book matches, calendars, prizes, etc.) 26.78.

ALFA ROMEO, PROGRAMS REVIEWED

Programs of Alfa Romeo, the automotive affiliate of PINMECCANICA, the state-controlled financial holding for engineering industries, were reviewed by the Milan Daily 24 Ore. Alfa Romeo is investing 100 billion Lire (160 million) in a new automobile plant at Arese (Milan), to replace the old and famed Portello plant. At Pomigliano d'Arco (Naples), Alfa Romeo is expanding and improving facilities for the overhauling of aviation engines inclusive of jet engines such as the Avon and Conway. It is also producing parts for the supersonic jet fighter F 104 G. Renault R4 cars are being assembled at Pomigliano. Diesel engines are being produced for Renault as part of an order for 230,000 units. Production of trucks is being concentrated at Pomigliano d'Arco.

2 N.O. JUDGES ARE INSTALLED

MacHauer, Bucaro Take Oaths of Office

A ceremony Wednesday in the Municipal Court building honoring two judges marked their entry into new terms of office.

They are Judge David H. MacHauer of traffic court and Judge Andrew G. Bucaro of municipal court. Judge MacHauer, appointed to the post in 1961, was elected in 1962. Judge Bucaro was appointed in 1955 and was elected without opposition last year.

At Wednesday's ceremony Associate Justice Walter B. Hamlin of the Louisiana Supreme Court administered the oaths of office.

Judge MacHauer's commission was presented by George W. Reese Jr., attorney. Bentley G. Byrnes, attorney, gave Judge Bucaro his commission. The ceremony was sponsored by the New Orleans Bar Association. The Rev. Edward L. Hughes, pastor of St. Dominic's Church, gave the invocation and the benediction.

Mayor Victor H. Schiro, one of the speakers, lauded the judges for their devotion to duty and said the city administration is endeavoring to provide better quarters for their activities. Philip Gensler, NOBA president, introduced persons of prominence attending.

Judge MacHauer, in an acceptance speech, said his coming years in office will be devoted to the fair administration of justice and the raising of the court's level in the public eye.

Judge Bucaro said justice is meted out in the court on the basis of fair treatment for the individual. He praised fellow Judge Paul P. Garofalo for his efforts in bringing dignity and efficiency to the court's operations. Judge Garofalo said he and the other judges will give their utmost cooperation to Judge Bucaro and the others.

MEXICO Y CHILE POR EL DESARME MUNDIAL
