BARON DI SAN SEVERINO new consul gen. of Italy in n.o

Baron Ferdinando Quaranta di San Severino arrived in New Orleans from Rome within the first week of July to take charge of his office as Consul General of Italy. He succeeds Dr. Roberto Cerchione. In his first press conference the Baron had this to say:

"To increase understanding is my aim. It is highly

important for a consul, especially a consul in such an important country as your own, to promote good will and understanding."

"This can be done through personal contacts by meeting all cross-sections of the populace, by taking an interest in your art, your culture, your way of life," he said.

He said he also considered it his duty to explain Italy to Americans.

As consul general in New Orleans, the baron will have jurisdiction over the states of Louisiana, Mississippi, Texas, Alabama, North Carolina, South Carolina and Florida. This is the largest Italian consular area in the country.

A native Roman, Baron di San Severino received a law degree from the University of Vienna before joining the Italian civil service in 1937. He served as a colonial administrator in Rome and Africa until he transferred to the foreign office in Rome in 1949. He was a protocol officer for two years before assuming a succession of consular posts in France, Spain, Rome, Germany and Scotland. His first tour of duty in the United States came in 1953 when he was appointed consul-general for the Pacific Northwest.

The consul-general's wife and 25-year-old son, Massimo, will join him later.

SCHIRO TO ASK FOR 16 STATUES

Mayor Victor H. Schiro said that he will ask that the 16 copper statues of maidens atop the old Post Office Building be given to the city of New Orleans if the Federal government plans to remove them.

The mayor said that he will ask members of the Louisiana delegation in Congress to help obtain them for the city if they are to be moved. The General Services Administration has announced that the statues may be removed as part of the renovation of the building.

Schiro said that he would like to have the statues grouped in clusters of four, representing history, the arts, industry and commerce, mounted on concrete bases at the four corners of a proposed reflecting pool in Duncan Plaza in front of the State Office Building.

The mayor also announced that he would inquire into the status of two other statues which he said are presently in storage in the city.

One statue is that of the Central American liberator, Francisco Morazan, which has been stored in a warehouse pending completion of plans for its erection in the neutral ground of Basin st. near the Municipal Auditorium.

The other statue is of the French heroine, Jeanne d'Arc, also believed to be stored in a New Orleans warehouse.

TRIP TO MEXICO READY--MAYOR

N.O. Goodwill Mission
Leaves Aug. 8

Plans for a goodwill mission to several cities in Mexico during August are nearing completion, according to Mayor Victor H. Schiro.

Sponsored by the City of New Orleans' International Relations Committee and the Office of International Relations, the tour will involve about 80 persons, mainly city officials and staff members. Included in the group will be Mayor and Mrs. Schiro, Councilman and Mrs. Joseph V. DiRosa, and Mario Bermudez, director of international relations.

Purposes of the visit, as outlined by Mayor Schiro, are:

—To offer the government of Mexico the necessary space for the erection of a monument of one of nation's selected heroes, in the Garden of the Americans, to be developed on the Basin st. neutral ground.

—To establish the necessary contacts and discuss a plan of action that will commence a cultural and tourist inter-exchange between Mexico and New Orleans.

—To give city personnel an opportunity to visit and observe the development and progress of Mexico City's municipal facilities.

—To discuss with Mexican representatives the possibilities of the promotion of tourism and commerce through the facilities that will be available in the new International Trade Mart.

The mission will be entertained by various private and official organizations and by mayors of Mexico City, Cuernavaca, Taxco and Acapulco.

According to Mayor Schiro, this is the first time in the history of New Orleans that a group in an official capacity has visited a foreign country in direct representation of the city.

The representatives will leave by plane for Mexico City Aug. 8. They are scheduled to return to New Orleans Aug. 19.

Coordinator for the mission at City Hall is Dennis J. Lacey Jr., executive assistant to the mayor.

BABY CHICKS FLY TO DESTINATION

Via Alitalia Air Line

The Alitalia Airlines reports that a new anchoring rig for transporting baby chicks by air which insures proper ventilation has been devised by Roy Dattman, Station Manager at the Boston airport for Alitalia Airlines.

Simple and functional, the rigging has proved to be an effective solution to provide and maintain sufficient air space around each box of chicks and is now in use at Alitalia cargo terminals in both Boston and New York City.

On a maximum load, 96 boxes are pre-assembled on pallets in rows of four by three for unitized loading in 12 stacks of eight boxes with air space between each stack.

The rigging assembly, a lattice structure constructed of light wood strips, is placed atop the stacks

of boxes which are anchored an intersected by nails through the center of each top box. Ropes attached to the ends of each lattice slat pull the entire framework tight to tie it to the pallet bed.

With these dual anchors, none of the boxes can shift in position nor can the air supply be endangered. The entire assembly is easily dismantled or attached for maximum speed in ground handling.

The first experimental model was displayed at the inauguration of Alitalia's new cargo terminal in Boston, and following its effectiveness, put into service.

Baby chicks are one of the major kinds of live animal shipments handled weekly and sometimes daily by Alitalia's cargo departments.

M'KEITHEN GIVES KAPLAN SPEECH

KAPLAN, La. — Public Service Commissioner John J. McKeithen, candidate for governor, told a crowd here on the eve of Bastille Day, that the occasion "was a fitting reminder that men must ever be on guard or God-given rights will be lost."

McKeithen said, "Let Bastille Day remind us that in this year of 1963 we are involved in a struggle against the federal government's attempt to seize control of our state and do away with our century-old way of life."

The commissioner warned that Louisiana faces its greatest crisis since reconstruction days and called on "all citizens to stand and be counted in this awesome struggle against the destruction of everything that we cherish and have fought for."

POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENTS IN ITALY

Premier Giovanni Leone won votes of confidence in both houses of Parliament, with the support of his own Christian Democrats and the abstention of the Social Democrats, Republicans, Socialists and Monarchists. Votes against the government were cast by the Communists, Liberals, and neo-Fascists. Mr. Leone is now expected to remain in office at least through October 31, the constitutional deadline for the approval of the budget for fiscal 1963-64. Prior to that date, the government can operate on deficiency appropriations and prorated spending authorizations already approved by Parliament.

In their voting the parties largely reflected their views of the Leone cabinet as a "bridge" toward a new center-left coalition of Christian Democrats, Social Democrats, Republicans, and Socialist, like the one formed in February 1962, to support the government of Christian Democrat Amintore Fanfani.

Official negotiations for the formation of a center-left coalition may be resumed next fall, after the Socialist party congress, now scheduled for October 25-29. The congress is expected to determine the position of the party on a number of foreign and domestic issues.

While the Leone government cannot rely on a stable majority in Parliament, it is nevertheless faced with increasingly urgent problems.

PORT COMMERCE RISES

International commerce of Italian rose from 21.4 million tons in January-March 1962 to 24.3 million tons in the first quarter of 1963.

AIRPORT COMMERCE INCREASES
Airport commerce scored new gains on the first quarter of 1963. As compared with January-March 1962, commerce increased by 28.5% for mail, express and freight and by 14.7% for passengers.

BUILDING BOOM CONTINUES

Housing units completed in the first quarter of 1963 were 52,650, up 7.8% from last year. Housing starts during the same period were 93,874, up 13.7% from last year. The above data refer to towns of over 20,000 inhabitants.

UNEMPLOYMENT DECLINES

A further decline in unemployment was disclosed by the May sampling of the labor force. According to the Central Institute of Statistics on May 10, 1963, unemployment totaled 462,000 as compared with 605,000 on April 20, 1962.

New Orleans, and from July

The exhibit, sponsored by
the Italian Institute for
Foreign Trade and the Italian
Ministry of Foreign Trade,
offers a collection of the
world-famous craftsmen
of approximately sixty
goldsmith and jewelry work-
shops from Valenza Po and
Vicenza, the "golden cities".
These cities account for
70% of Italy's jewelry
production. The city of
Arezzo is also represented
by Gori & Zucchi.

Valenza Po, located be-
tween Milan and Turin, and
two largest industrial
cities in Italy, has a
century-old tradition in the
making of fine jewelry. The
first workshop was opened
in 1860 by the goldsmith
Morasotti and since then a
multi-million dollar indus-
try has developed, in which
40% of the population of
Valenza Po are employed. The
production varies from the
mass produced to the very
expensive; but all articles
are known world-over for
their distinctive, tasteful
and novel design, undisputed
quality and accurate work-
manship. To keep alive the
tradition of exquisite
jewelry, a government-
sponsored vocational school
has been established in
Valenza, along with a
laboratory officially autho-
rized to issue certificate
of analysis for precious
stones. An impressive array
of gold jewelry from the
city's workshop may be
examined in the permanent
showroom in Valenza Po by
all those engaged in the
jewelry trade.

Vicenza, another important
city in the Italian jewelry
industry, is located in
northeast Italy. A L.S.O.
boasting a century-old
tradition in jewelry pro-
duction, this city organizes
each September the National
Jewelry and Silverware
Exhibition of Vicenza,
including displays not only
of exquisite jewelry but also
of dining and decorative
silverware, sacred art,
precious and synthetic
stones, and machines and
equipment used in the
manufacture of jewelry.

The Goldsmith's Associa-
tions of Valenza Po and
Vicenza and the well-known
firm Gori & Zucchi of Arezzo
have selected the most
distinctive and exquisite
jewelry for this traveling
exhibit, which is being
accompanied on its tour of
the United States by Dr.
Giovanni Mastropalo of the
Foreign Trade Institute of
Rome, Miss Rosanna La Valle
of the Valenza Po Gold-
smith's Association, Miss
Maria Teresa Bruzio, and
Mr. Ugo Bertelli of the
Vicenza Goldsmith's Associa-
tion.

Compagno Cites Role of Judge

Peter J. Compagno, candidate for judge of section G of the Criminal District Court said that even though it is the jury which decides to invoke the death penalty, the judge is "the officer required to place the stamp of officialdom on the decision" and to see that the execution is lawfully carried out.

"Thus the judge cannot avoid thinking of himself as the principal performer in the somber drama," Compagno said. "His mind might insist on having it otherwise, but his spirit denies him the apology."

In a public appearance yesterday Compagno declared that the complexity of the question of leniency for first offenders is so great that "no matter how thoroughly and thoughtfully he has weighed the circumstances in this kind of a case the judge, after sentencing the convicted criminal, can be expected to go to bed later that night with a measure of uneasiness lurking in his mind."

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INMINENTE DIVISION DEL COMUNISMO MUNDIAL

Al defender Rusia su conducta en el Caribe, el Partido Comunista Soviético publicó una histórica declaración de discordia con los chinos comunistas que promete provocar la división definitiva del movimiento rojo mundial.

El extenso documento acusa a los chinos de tratar de separar de la jefatura soviética a los comunistas del mundo, y encausarlos por la senda que conduce a la guerra nuclear. Dicha declaración fue publicada en Moscú al término de mas de una semana de negociaciones entre los rusos y chinos destinadas al parecer contra toda esperanza de eliminar la brecha que se ha venido ahondando al correr de los meses y los años.

Los comunistas soviéticos atacaron directamente a sus correligionarios chinos por su aserto de que aun después de una guerra nuclear habria aun suficientes trabajadores para crear "una civilización mil veces mas elevada bajo el comunismo".

La declaración rusa tambien acusa a los chinos de burlarse de la necesidad del desarme, y de tratar de aumentar la tirantez entre la Union Soviética y los Estados Unidos. Al negar que Nikita Krushchev hubiera retrocedido ante la presión norteamericana en el asunto de los proyectiles en Cuba, señala que se habia obligado al mismo Presidente Kennedy a prometer que

no invadiria a Cuba, evitando así una conflagración atómica.

Una de las cosas que mas molestan a los rusos, es la tentativa que atribuyen a los chinos de dividir a los partidos comunistas en varios paises del mundo.

La division en el comunismo responde entre otros motivos, al hecho de que el Partido Comunista ruso, se desenvuelve ahora en un pais relativamente prospero, y debe encarar el hecho de que el mundo "capitalista" no muestra senales de derrumbarse de un momento a otro.

Los rusos afirman que no es que su impetu revolucionario haya menguado, sino que han tenido que enfrentarse con el hecho de que una guerra con los Estados Unidos podria destruir aun el sueño del comunismo.

La actual discordia entre las dos potencias comunistas, tendra sin duda alguna, repercusion en los centros comunistas del mundo. Ya han aparecido cismas potenciales o reales en los partidos comunistas de Europa occidental y aun de Europa oriental. El desafío a la jefatura soviética tendra necesariamente que debilitar el dominio ruso de las organizaciones comunistas a traves del mundo.

Segun los ultimos informes publicados por la prensa mundial, ya se ha observado una tendencia hacia una linea mas independiente en Rumania, y la enfermedad parece altamente contagiosa.

El 28 de octubre del año pasado, Krushchev anunció que habia ordenado que se retiraran los proyectiles. Esto fue después que el Presidente estadounidense John F. Kennedy tendió un cerco de buques norteamericanos de guerra en torno a Cuba, y les ordenó que interceptaran las naves soviéticas destinadas a la isla. Los barcos rusos dieron media vuelta.

La carta no menciona la advertencia de Kennedy de que los cohetes lanzados desde Cuba contra los Estados Unidos encontrarian inmediata represalia de éstos contra la Unión Soviética.

En cambio, si dice que "nunca antes estuvo la Humanidad tan cerca del borde de una guerra termonuclear como en octubre del año pasado".

Defiende Rusia su Conducta en el Caribe

Acusan a los Chinos de Haber Capitulado en la Crisis Cubana

MOSCU. 14 de julio. (AP).— Al rechazar las acusaciones que hacen los chinos rojos con respecto a graves errores cometidos en el Caribe, la Unión Soviética dice que el año pasado envió proyectiles a Cuba al recibir un aviso confidencial de que era inminente la invasión de la isla por los Estados Unidos.

Los rusos aseveran que su resuelta actitud evitó la invasión que exigían "los aventureros estadounidenses que querían llegar hasta el fin". Pekin lanzó diatribas al primer ministro soviético Nikita S. Krushchev, poco después que el mundo se tambaleó en el otoño pasado al borde de la guerra, diciendo que el jefe ruso cometió un disparate al remitir los proyectiles a Cuba, para tener que retirarlos luego ante las exigencias estadounidenses.

La actitud de los soviéticos con respecto a este espinoso asunto frente a Pekin, se explicó en una extensa carta abierta del Comité Central del Partido Comunista soviético a los comunistas chinos, publicada en "Pravda" y distribuida anoche por la agencia informativa TASS.

Cuantioso Préstamo Solicita El Salvador

GUATEMALA, 14 de julio. (AP).— Un préstamo por 15 millones de dólares solicitará el gobierno salvadoreño a la Agencia Internacional de Desarrollo (AID) para la ejecución de sus proyectos de agricultura, educación y economía.

Voceros oficiales indicaron que en breve, el proyecto de solicitud será enviado al Congreso Nacional para su aprobación. El préstamo, de ser acordado, se distribuirá así:

8.900.000 dólares para agricultura; 4.500.000 dólares para economía y 2.000.000 para educación. El préstamo sería a 40 años, con 10 como período de gracia y un interés del 3.25 por ciento.

DISCREPANCIA DE EU E INGLATERRA, POR CULPA DE CUBA

LONDRES, 14 de julio. (AFP).— La utilización de la isla de Barbados como escala de los aviones de fabricación soviética con destino a Cuba, es una nueva causa de discordia en las relaciones anglo-norteamericanas ya bastante "tensas" respecto a Cuba, afirma hoy el diario londinense "Sunday Telegraph".

Tres aviones "Ilyuchin 12", con destino a Cuba, y procedentes de Conakry, han hecho escala en esa isla desde diciembre pasado, anuncia el diario. Este tráfico es objeto de las protestas del Gobierno norteamericano que pide a los británicos que prohiban el acceso al aeropuerto de Barbados, a los aviones cubanos de fabricación soviética que se encuentran en tránsito.

El "Sunday Telegraph" subraya que estas protestas fueron rechazadas sistemáticamente por el Gobierno británico, el cual señaló en varias ocasiones que el Derecho Internacional, tal como se interpreta en Londres, no autoriza a rechazar el derecho de escala a aviones civiles pertenecientes a un país (Cuba) con el cual Gran Bretaña mantiene relaciones amistosas.
