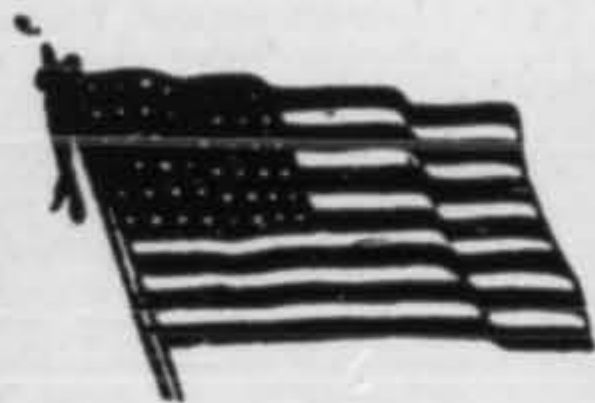
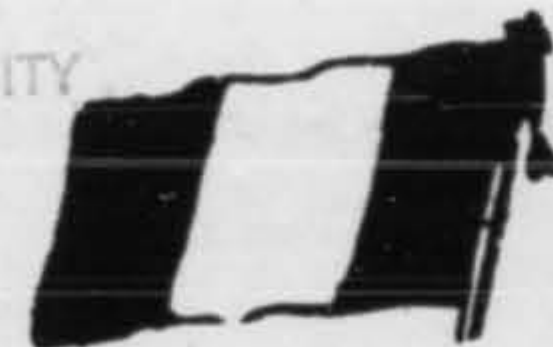

JUDGE GULOTTA SEEKS ELECTION

Candidate for Renaming
to Juvenile Court

Judge James C. Gulotta Thursday announced his candidacy for judge of the juvenile court of Orleans parish in the July 23 Democratic primary.

He has been serving as judge of that court since Jan. 6, 1961, by appointment, to fill the vacancy in Section A by the retirement of Judge John J. Wingrave.

Judge Gulotta, 38, is a native of New Orleans. He attended New Orleans public and parochial schools and received his law degree from Tulane university in 1949, and has practiced civil and criminal law since then.

He is a decorated combat veteran of World War II, receiving the Silver Star Medal for gallantry in action in the Pacific theater.

During the 18 months that he has served as judge, he said in a statement in behalf of his candidacy, he had made "a determined effort to deter the problems of juvenile delinquency in our community."

He said he has always conducted his court in a dedicated manner in the interest of "proper administration and dispensation of justice."

He said he has co-operated with the bar, social agencies, welfare and probation officers, individuals and civic groups.

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

By the Representative of the United
States of America in Congress
Assembled

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and Nature's God entitles them, a decent respect to opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed, but when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.

Rusk, Segni Review NATO, Mart Problems

ROME (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk had his first meeting with Italy's new president today and reviewed NATO and Common Market problems. Rusk, who came to Rome from Bonn on the third leg of his 10-day European trip, conferred with President Antonio Segni at the presidential palace within hours after his arrival.

Premier Amintore Fanfani and Foreign Minister Attilio Piccioni joined Segni for the talks.

Despite a full schedule, Rusk's 26-hour stopover here appeared almost a respite after his earlier talks on nuclear problems with President de Gaulle in Paris and on the Berlin crisis with Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, in Bonn. There are no such major problems in Italian-American relations.

In an airport statement here, Rusk did not show any unusual wear after his tough round of talks in Bonn and Paris, and he hailed the Atlantic alliance as "firm, solid and strong."

The meeting was Segni's first personal contact with a top

American policy maker since his election by Parliament last month. But Segni and Rusk are well acquainted. Until his election, Segni was Rusk's Italian counterpart as foreign minister.

Rusk headed for Italy after apparently reaching agreement with Chancellor Konrad Adenauer to leave the next move on the Berlin issue up to the Russians.

Greatly Encouraged

The U.S. Secretary told West German Foreign Minister Gerhard Schroeder, who saw him off, that "we go away greatly encouraged. I am looking forward to our next meeting, which I am sure will take place in the next few months."

Schroeder said the talks had produced "extraordinary unity on all decisive questions."

No real problems loom in Italian-American relations such as differences over Berlin which appear to have been ironed out in yesterday's five-hour Rusk-Adenauer meeting.

In a statement at Rome's sun-baked Ciampino airport Rusk called the NATO alliance "firm, solid and strong—there is no problem about that basic commitment."

Friendship Sound

Picconi said in a welcoming address that "Italo-American friendship is as sound and sincere as it could be. We shall co-operate as in the past to meet all demands which could bring about world peace."

Guidance Counselor Files for July Election

Joseph J. Logreco, a guidance counselor in Orleans parish schools, announced that he is actively seeking election to the State board of education.

The Democratic primary to fill a vacancy on the board is scheduled for July 28.

Logreco, who resides at 841 S. Claiborne with his wife, the former Barbara Colleen Hallaron, is a native and lifelong resident of the Second Congressional District.

He attended elementary and secondary schools of New Orleans, graduated from the University of Southwestern Louisiana and received a master's degree from Louisiana State university.

He announced a platform affecting four areas of education "much in need of immediate consideration." They are:

Providing maximum benefits in return for the tax dollar.

Staffing schools with certified teachers in newly developed areas.

Improving academic and vocational services "mandatory in this space age of ours."

Promoting educational opportunities for the handicapped "so as to increase the possibilities of their becoming self-sustaining."

In a statement in behalf of his candidacy, Logreco said:

"I am primarily interested in providing educational services for all of the people of this district from childhood to adulthood.

"Schools of this district have contributed much to the economic, cultural and social life of the

state. A greater contribution can be made if the educational system of Louisiana is developed to its greatest potential.

"Excellence in education appears to be in high demand today and this excellence is assuming a greater importance in the race for survival.

"Much of Louisiana's educational structure is excellent; however its balance will be improved if competent individuals dedicate themselves to this.

"It is with a sincere desire to offer my talents, drive and insight into educational matters that I take this step."

Logreco stated he had served on numerous local, state and national committees of education dealing with such matters as finance, curriculum and teacher welfare.

He is a combat veteran of World War II, having served in the Asiatic Pacific area.

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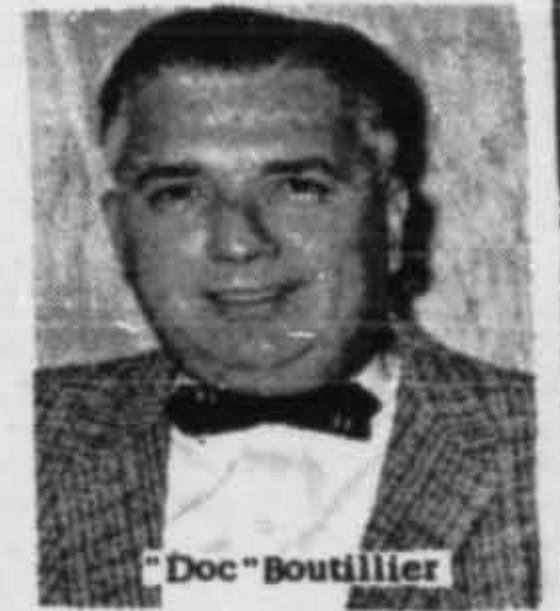
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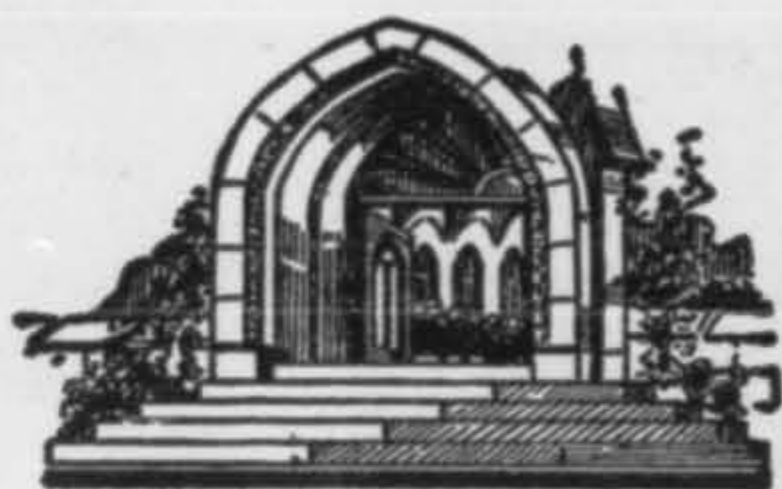
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'Garments of Gladness' Worn in Ceremony

Special Ceremonies at

The "garment of gladness" was received by three seminarians of the New Orleans archdiocese Sunday morning.

Ordained deacons were the Rev. Joseph Latino, New Orleans; the Rev. Donald Ledet, Thibodaux; and the Rev. Gary O'Bryant, Pensacola, Fla.

The special ceremonies were conducted by Archbishop John P. Cody in the chapel of Notre Dame seminary. Ordinarily deacons are ordained just before Christmas, but Archbishop Cody said that he obtained permission for the ceremony now because of the scarcity of priests in the archdiocese.

During the ordination to the diaconate, the major order next to the priesthood, the three were invested with the stole, a symbol of priestly authority. They also received the dalmatic, called the "garment of gladness" in the ceremony.

The three will be raised to the priesthood next June.

Relatives and friends of the new deacons were guests of the archbishop at a breakfast following the ceremony.

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WHAT ITALY IS READING

\$ *I Preti sono uomini* by Padre Sisto Pelaya
(Publ. Scena Illustrata - Roma, Lire 1200).

This is a slim one hundred page book by a Franciscan monk who obviously was tired of being one. In it he uses a fictional old parish priest, a young curate and an old bishop to air his views on reforming the Catholic Church. The young curate and the old bishop in the story see eye to eye on these reforms, but the wicked old parish priest manages to have them both ousted from their posts. Written with naive vehemence, the book has attracted attention following the measures taken by the Vatican in depriving the author of his sacerdotal powers and privileges. Indeed, one can hardly see what else the Church could have done, for the reforms envisaged by Father Pelaya, taken as a whole, are in the nature of an invitation to the Church to commit suicide. There is little that one might call Franciscan in these pages.

GIORNATA DELL'INDIPENDENZA

ACNS-Circa 186 anni or sono un gruppo di uomini si riuniva nella città di Filadelfia. La guerra tra i coloni americani e la Bretagna Imperiale era già cominciata, e quegli uomini del Congresso Continentale erano convenuti per decidere se quella dovesse essere una guerra per l'indipendenza.

La loro decisione fu immediata. Il 4 luglio 1776 essi adottavano il documento noto alla storia come la Declaration of Independence. Il momento era così giunto per dar voce all'aspirazione umana di essere liberi ed indipendenti. Ma le loro circostanze non erano, in quel tempo, invidiabili.

Come i capi coloniali con vennero in Filadelfia, la notizia della guerra fu straziante. Solamente alcuni giorni prima, l'esercito mal ridotto di George Washington operante il Long Island aveva sofferto un'altra in una serie di sconfitte, mentre altre notizie indicavano che New York City era sotto attacco. Fu allora, come riferisce Tom Paine, che "gli animi degli uomini furono messi a prova". Fu allora, riferisce il medesimo, che "i soldati di stagione estiva" e i patrioti al sole disertarono la causa americana.

Cio che poteva loro sembrare una causa in perdita, continuarono nella loro determinazione di formulare parole alle quali gli uomini ricorrerebbero per secoli, parole di fronte alle quali le tirannie crollerebbero.

"Noi sosteniamo l'evidenza di tali verità" affermava la Declaration of Independence, "che tutti gli uomini sono nati eguali, che sono dotati dal loro Creatore di certi inalienabili diritti, tra cui la vita, la libertà ed il raggiungimento di uno stato felice, che il popolo ha il diritto di alterare o abolire qualsiasi forma di Governo che tentasse di distruggere

tali aspirazioni".

Avendo affermato la preziosità dell'individuo e dei suoi diritti quale creatura di Dio, e avendo condannato la dominazione da parte di un despota straniero, gli uomini del 1776 dichiaravano che "queste Colonie Unite sono e devono esserlo di diritto, Stati liberi ed indipendenti". A sostegno di tale dichiarazione, essi concludevano: "Noi rispettiamo a vicenda le nostre vite, le nostre fortune ed il nostro sacro onore."

In una lettera a sua moglie Abigail, John Adams, uno dei firmatari della Declaration of Independence e più tardi il nostro secondo Presidente, esprimeva il suo convincimento che la Giornata dell'Indipendenza dovrebbe essere "celebrata da future generazioni come il grande anniversario. Essa dovrebbe essere solennizzata, scriveva Adams, "con pompa e parata, con giuochi esport

e sports, con illuminazione, ecc., da una parte all'altra del Continente, da ora in poi, per sempre".

La profezia di John Adams si è attuata. Per la maggior parte degli Americani, il Fourth of July è sinonimo di fuochi artificiali, scampagnate famigliari, una giornata nel Paese o alla spiaggia, l'inizio di un'altra estate. Ma il significato e l'importanza della giornata non dovrebbero essere dimenticati nella gaiezza del trastullo estivo. Nelle nostre lettere ad amici e parenti in altre terre, oltre a descrivere come in fatti abbiamo trascorso la festività, dovremmo parlare anche della Declaration of Independence, emessa 186 anni fa, e spiegare ciò che essa significhi per l'America ed il mondo.

SE CONTROLA UNA EPIDEMIA EN HONDURAS

A principios del mes llego a la ciudad de San Pedro Sula, Republica de Honduras, un equipo de medicos, bacteriologos y enfermeras del ejercito de los Estados Unidos con el fin de ayudar a combatir la gastro-enteritis que se desato atacando a los niños en aquella ciudad y zonas adyacentes. Permanecerán en Tegucigalpa por diez semanas durante las cuales participaran en todos los actos del colegio y llevarán la vida normal del estudiante de secundaria hondureño. EL DIA DE LA LIBERTAD DE PRENSA

"En 1953, ano en que se instituyo el Dia de la Libertad de Prensa, 50 millones de personas en Argentina, Colombia, Cuba, la Republica Dominicana y Venezuela, carecian de libertad de expresion y de libertad de prensa. Hoy suman 16 millones, las personas a quienes les estan negados esos derechos fundamentales en Bolivia, Cuba, Haiti y Paraguay. El peligro de

perder, no solo la libertad de prensa, sino tambien todas las demas libertades puede ser actualmente mayor que en cualquier otro momento. Ese peligro esta representado por la existencia en Cuba de un regimen comunista decidido a infiltrarse en todos los demas paises del Hemisferio Occidental y a subvertirlos. Teniendo a La Habana por base, el comunismo internacional amenaza con igual fuerza a los gobiernos democraticos de America y a la prensa libre del continente. Solo cuando se haya establecido la democracia en Cuba y el comunismo internacional haya perdido su base de operaciones en nuestro hemisferio considerara la Sociedad Inter-Americana de Prensa que ha ganado su mas grande batalla por la libertad de prensa en America.

IL COMMERCIO CON GLI STATI UNITI

ROMA-(Interest) - Le esportazioni dall'Italia verso gli Stati Uniti d'America nel primo trimestre del 1962 sono notevolmente aumentate, passando da 82,4 a 102,7 milioni di dollari. L'aumento rispetto allo stesso periodo del 1961, è del 24,6 per cento. Esso è dovuto a quasi tutti i gruppi di prodotti, degli articoli di abbigliamento, dalla calzatura ai tessuti, ai cappelli di paglia, dalle motociclette alle automobili ed alle varie merci.

L'aumento delle nostre esportazioni negli Stati Uniti ha determinato la diminuzione del disavanzo commerciale da 140,6 a 105,1 milioni di dollari. Questo aumento è il risultato di una maggiore domanda interna ed anche di un'azione più penetrante dei nostri prodotti e più penetrante dei nostri esportatori sul mercato americano. Proprio alcuni giorni or sono è stata annunciata l'apertura di un grande magazzino a New York di una tradizionale ditta fabbricante di ceramiche italiane. Questo è un esempio delle possibilità che si aprono alle nostre tipiche industrie, specie nel settore abbigliamento.

Di contro trova, o che le esportazioni dagli Stati Uniti verso la Italia sono diminuite a causa della minore domanda italiana di grano americano; esse sono passate da 223 a 207,8 milioni di dollari, con una diminuzione del 6,8 per cento.

Il XXI Congresso Mondiale della "Pax Romana" avrà luogo a Montevideo dal 15 al 30 luglio p.v. sul tema generale: "La responsabilita sociale dell'Universita e dell'universitario".
