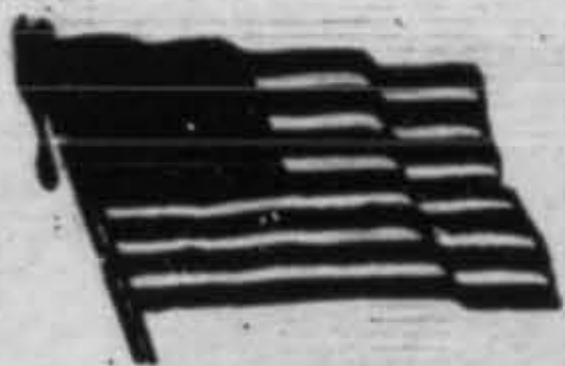

We honor the veterans of the past and their defence of America's freedom today. We cannot in conscience at this hour of our Nation's need merely pay lip service. We must win the people of the world to freedom. Our enemies work unceasingly for world enslavement. It is for us, as dedicated Americans, to work with greater fervor for liberty. It is for us to overcome apathy, to dispel misunder-



THE BIRTH OF THANKSGIVING DAY

THANKSGIVING DAY, annual holiday by proclamation of the President for the District of Columbia and of governors for the various states. The custom was originated by the Pilgrims in 1621 following their first harvest. About 10 years later various colonies occasionally set aside a day for prayer and thanks until in 1680 in the Massachusetts Bay Colony it became a recognized annual holiday.

The governors of these colonies appointed the date for thanksgiving and the Continental Congress made provision for the days of thanksgiving annually during the Revolution, with the exception of 1777. In 1789 Washington proclaimed a day for offering thanks and again in 1795. Acting upon a resolution of Congress, President Madison set aside a day for thanks after the war of 1812. In 1817 New York adopted Thanksgiving Day as an annual holiday and by 1858, Thanksgiving Day was observed in 25 States and 2 Territories. In 1864 President Lincoln designated the last Thursday of November for Thanksgiving, and each President followed the precedent. In 1939, President Roosevelt moved Thanksgiving Day a week forward, and observance by the states was divided in 1939, 1940 and 1941. In 1941 Congress made legal the former day of observance.

CHARLES GENDUSA CANDIDATE FOR ORLEANS PARISH SCHOOL BOARD



Charles Gendusa, 28, 6072 Warrington Drive, is one of the six candidates for the Orleans Parish School Board in the general election to be held on Tuesday, November 6th.

Mr. Gendusa is a native born citizen of Italian American lineage, an Army Reserve Officer, a graduate of Jesuit High School and Tulane University, he attended Loyola University, transferring to Tulane where he graduated in 1956 with a Bachelor of business Administration and in 1960 with a Master's degree in the same subject. He is a licensed Certified Public Accountant.

He married Marilyn Misuraca in 1956, who is a public school teacher in Orleans Parish. Charles now teaching Accounting at Loyola.

Mr. Gendusa is the only candidate for the Orleans Parish School Board who is of Italian-American descent, and he feels that his family background will not cause him to favor one group over another.

"I believe that through conscientious examining of the expenditures of school funds, we will be able to get more out

the tax dollars. This will be more necessary now, than it has ever been in the past as the result of the great increase in school child population."

"I also would like to see a greater co-operation between the Orleans Parish School Board and the various private school system for the benefit of all of the school children in Orleans Parish Mr. Gendusa stated."

In announcing his candidacy, Gendusa said, the need to accommodate the growing school population exists now, and there is no need to wait.

"As a result of the increase in the population of school children and industrial expansion such as Michoud, present facilities are inadequate."

"People who advocate waiting for capital expenditures in our school system are living in the past. This need has been with us for a long time. The situation is now acute."

Gendusa said he believes the "frills ought to be taken out of public education and the funds put into basic needs."

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LOUISIANA EXPOSITION MULTI-MILLION DOLLAR INDUSTRIAL ADDITION TO GREATER NEW ORLEANS AREA

Articles of Incorporation have been filed with Secretary of State Wade O. Martin for the Louisiana Exposition Corporation.

The Louisiana Exposition will employ approximately one thousand people and will be a multi-million dollar industrial addition to the Greater New Orleans area. The park will be similar to Disneyland but depicting Louisiana factual and romantic history it will tentatively encompass 150 acres.

Literally hundreds of suggestions are under consideration for major exhibits in the Louisiana Exposition. For example:

JEAN LAFITTE AND BARATARIA PIRATES

Barataria was the bayou headquarters of Jean Lafitte, Dominique you and their band of pirates, privateers, and smugglers LaFitte, probably the most familiar individual in Louisiana and New Orleans history, was on various occasions rogue, businessman, traitor (according to Governor Claiborne) and hero (again according to Governor Claiborne) of the Battle of New Orleans. Visitors to the Lafitte exhibit will embark by river boat and enter a reproduction of the Louisiana swamp of a hundred and fifty years ago. Winding through a maze of bayous during the course of the trip to the famous pirates island kingdom, the visitor is caught in the crossfire between pirates and gendarmes, attacked by alligators and fired upon by pirate cannons. The tour guide "sets the stage" and keeps a running commentary that, theatrically, creates an atmosphere of suspense, excitement and drama.

Upon arrival at the pirates den, an isolated, moss draped coastal island, the visitor disembarks and is free to tour at leisure the pirates treasure house, camp, and a pirate ship.

In order to "return to the mainland" the visitor is given an option of riding in a pirate pirogue or walking across a section of "extremely dangerous" quicksand.

ROCKET SHIP TO THE MOON

With the advent of the Michoud Industrial Complex in the Greater New Orleans area a trip to the moon would be in order as one of the major exhibits and tours.

After a mood setting, dramatic, countdown by

the guide our visitor would "blast off".

The rocket ship would stop off at a "space platform" in orbit to take on supplies and to allow the visitor an opportunity of a porthole view of outer space in all its majesty.

When the trip resumes, television receivers show the tourist the earth receding and the gradual approach to the moon.

After a "crash landing" in which the space ship penetrates the crust of the moon the visitor disembarks into a fantasy of chrysalis caverns and seeping "moon dust". An illusion of a gravity difference can be created by artificially changing the horizon. Aircraft pilots are acquainted with this sensation called Vertigo.

The visitors are rescued and returned to earth to the New Orleans Inter Space Passenger Terminal where he is transported by moving sidewalks to the Terminal administration building where he has the option of viewing authentic contemporary space missiles, rockets, and equipment in a "museum" atmosphere or enjoying an old fashioned southern fried chicken dinner, or both. The dinner will be a welcome respite after five weeks of "space rations".

MILNEBURG JOYS

The exhibitions Major attractions can be viewed at ground level from a three hundred passenger narrow gauge steam train encircling the outer boundary of the park. The train would be a miniature reproduction of New Orleans' famous "Smokey Mary" that years ago was used by thousands of Orleansians as an excursion train to Milneburg Park formerly located at what is now the vicinity of Elysian Fields and Lake Pontchartrain. Smokey Mary was retired in 1944 but will always live as part of New Orleans' romantic past.

Literally dozens of other exhibits can be considered. The material to select from is unlimited. For example: Battle of New Orleans, Steamboat Era, Irish Channel, Confederacy, Yancy Derringer, Jim Bowie Acadian Story (Evangeline) Mardi Gras, Cotton and Sugar Plantations, Dueling Oaks, Huey Long Era, Pan American Trade Center French Opera, Spanish Era, New American Era. A special advisory committee is being set up to develop these and other themes both fact and fiction.

Sister Natalie came to New Orleans in 1921. Her first assignment here was at St. Elizabeth's children's home. She has been with Hotel Dieu since February, 1936. Her assignment for several years at Hotel Dieu has been directing the sewing room, collecting clothing and directing a department which provides clothing for the poor. She also visits hospital patients and works with the Ladies of Charity, an organization of sisters and lay women who aid the underprivileged.

The second holiday is Thanksgiving Day on Thursday, November 22, this is actually the oldest holiday observed in America. It started when the pilgrims in the colony of Massachusetts observed it as religious duty to the Almighty for the blessing and sufferings they had received in their new homes, fat removed from many of their kindred.

These days November 11 and 22 are national holidays, on proclamation by the President of the United States; a legal holiday in many states, proclaimed by the governors; with proclamations in the cities, towns and hamlets, as announced by the mayors, police juries, county commissioners and leaders of the communities.

UN RAPPORTO SULLE RADIAZIONI ATOMICHE

(American Council)

Dopo quattro anni di studio, un comitato Scientifico formato di 15 Nazioni delle Nazioni Unite ha emesso un rapporto sugli effetti delle radiazioni atomiche. Il suddetto costituisce senza dubbio il rapporto più completo che sia mai stato compilato in merito a tale difficile soggetto. Ma per quanto completo esso possa essere, il Comitato accentua in questo rapporto la urgente necessità di ulteriori ricerche nei molti aspetti della radiazione e delle sue conseguenze biologiche.

Il Comitato non ha condotto le sue proprie ricerche, ma ha, invece, studiato il lavoro di scienziati in molti Paesi. Che cosa ci dice il rapporto oggi in merito al problema poco noto delle radiazioni atomiche?

Ciò che maggiormente ci interessa è, naturalmente, il possibile effetto della radiazione su noi stessi, specialmente sui processi umani della riproduzione, e la parte che essa esercita nella causa del danno al sangue e ad ossa o delle altre malattie. È noto che le particelle infinitamente piccole create al momento della divisione degli atomi, possono penetrare e determinare dei cambiamenti in alcune delle cellule del corpo umano,

Il Comitato Scientifico sta cercando di determinare l'ammontare della radiazione cui è esposto l'uomo, e come la radiazione è distribuita nel corpo umano, su periodi di tempo, e nelle varie aree geografiche. Il Comitato ha, particolarmente, specificato l'ammontare e rata d'esposizione agli organi riproduttivi umani, e alle cellule nelle quali la radiazione potrebbe produrre cambiamenti maligni. Il midollo osseo che produce sangue, potrebbe essere così affetto da causare leucemia, e le cellule che rivestono le superfici delle ossa potrebbero essere così affette da produrre tumori maligni.

Non va però dimenticato che è impossibile sottrarsi completamente a radiazione indipendente dal luogo di abitazione. Siamo esposti a radiazione naturalmente occorrente durante tutta la nostra vita. L'ammontare varia, ma proviene dallo spazio sotto forma di raggi cosmici e materiale radioattivo nella crosta della terra, mare e atmosfera.

Gli uomini ovviamente possono vivere con questa radiazione naturale. Noi siamo interessati alla radiazione artificiale oltre il livello naturale

Considerando le condizioni del mondo, la prima domanda che ci viene in mente è quella relativa al "fallout" derivante dalle prove delle armi nucleari. Il Comitato ha concluso che il relativo rischio della radiazione dovuta al "fallout" su un periodo di 8 anni terminato nel 1961, è stato solamente una frazione del rischio di radiazione derivante da sorgenti naturali. La media del relativo rischio è stata di 1/10 a meno di 1/4, secondo la parte del corpo considerata.

Il Comitato ha anche paragonato la radiazione naturale con i relativi rischi d'esposizione derivanti dagli usi medici della radiazione come strumento per diagnosi. Qui, di nuovo, il rischio nell'uso medico costituisce solamente un'azione di quello nella radiazione naturale, sebbene tale frazione sia leggermente superiore a quella per "fallout", da 3/10 a 8/10.

In fine, per quanto riguarda il "fallout" derivante dagli esperimenti di armi nucleari, buona parte di esso è stato depositato nelle altitudini temperate del nord più che nelle altre parti del globo, ma il relativo rischio d'esposizione non è tanto grande quanto quello derivante da radiazione naturale. Ma, nonostante tutto ciò che è stato detto, le quindici Nazioni del Comitato Scientifico, com-

presi gli Stati Uniti ed Unione Sovietica, hanno all'unanimità concluso che, poiché anche una esigua percentuale di radiazione può causare danno, "un successo nella cessazione completa degli esperimenti nucleari arricchirebbe beneficio alla presente e future generazioni dell'umanità".

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AMERICA LATINA APOYA A LOS EE. UU. 100% ACTUALIDAD POLITICA EN LATINO - AMERICA EN EL EMPROLIO CUBANO

El pueblo y gobierno de los Estados Unidos han visto con gran satisfacción el apoyo unánime de las repúblicas latino-americanas, miembros de la Organización de Estados Americanos, a la resolución del Presidente Kennedy de establecer un bloqueo marítimo contra Cuba para que la Unión Soviética continúe enviando armamentos a la isla de Fidel Castro en aquella isla en donde se ha podido comprobar que los comunistas tienen y siguen construyendo bases de proyectiles nucleares que constituyen una amenaza para cualquier nación de este hemisferio y para la paz mundial. Como todos nuestros lectores comprenden, la solidaridad de todas las naciones de este hemisferio es sumamente importante en este momento crítico para el mundo entero.

La proclama del Presidente Kennedy pide el completo paro del suministro de armamentos soviéticos a Cuba y la abolición completa de las bases de proyectiles nucleares establecidas por el gobierno ruso en dicha isla que Castro ha convertido completamente en un satélite del soviet violando los postulados de la Doctrina Monroe y otros tratados hemisféricos.

NICARAGUA

Ante el respetuoso asombro de cuantos lo escucharon, embajadores y

observadores del mundo entero, el Presidente de México, habló de una gran revolución de las naciones de América Latina, Asia y África que, sin sacrificar las características propias a cada región, logra una de las tentativas más generosas de nuestro siglo.

"Transformar la situación social y económica de nuestros pueblos sin sacrificar los derechos individuales y sin renegar de nuestra tradición cultural".

Hubo un momento, sentencio López Mateos, que el mundo parecía dividirse en dos bloques.

Por fortuna, esta concepción ha tenido que ser abandonada y la existencia de países con una política internacional independiente, así como otros factores de signo semejante, han mostrado que la realidad contemporánea es más compleja y rica de matices.

El Presidente López recalco las palabras cuando dijo que la preservación de la paz es materia estrechamente ligada al desarrollo pacífico e independiente de las naciones de América Latina, Asia y África.

En un torrente de consignas internacionales el Presidente de México subrayó, en particular, las siguientes:

La cooperación internacional debe estar libre de toda presión política. Corresponde a cada nación, por medio del esfuerzo diario y del diario sacrificio, crear la nacional riqueza y distribuirla equitativamente.

El principio de autodeterminación debe extenderse, como de hecho ocurre ya, a la esfera de la economía, sin que eso signifique, ni mucho menos, el desconocimiento de los compromisos libremente aceptados y que precisamente por ello son demostraciones de soberanía.

La salud del comercio exterior requiere la estabilidad de los precios de las materias primas. Sin desarrollo económico no podrá haber verdadera justicia social y sin justicia social no habrá paz entre las naciones. El discurso del Presidente de México, de gran trascendencia, ha sido comentado por la prensa mundial.
