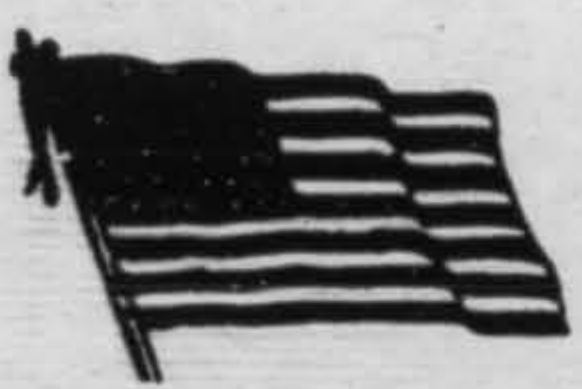
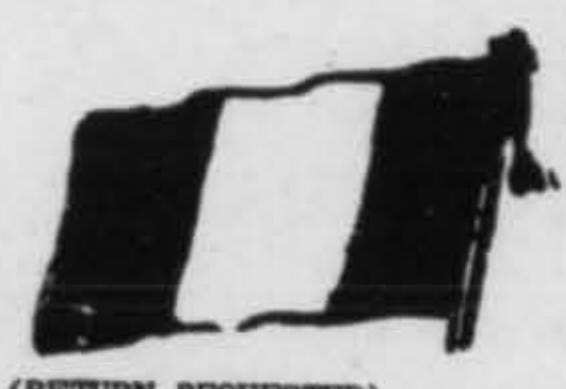

In 1872 REX was organized, there are many Carnival KINGS during the season of festivities, but there is only one King of the Carnival - REX THE MONARCH OF MISRULE. His motto is 'Pro Bono Publico'. His flag's color are Green for faith, Purple for justice and Gold which 'cries out' with the voice of power.

MARDI GRAS

This gay and unrestrained revel of people at play is mad and wonderful; the greatest free show in the United States. Mardi Gras is the last day before the beginning of Lent; the feast before the fast. Its name is derived from two French words-Mardi, meaning Tuesday, and Gras, meaning fat. The celebration always falls on a Tuesday, its date being regulated by the Gregorian Calendar which established the beginning of Lent in each given year.

The official Carnival season begins on the Sixth day of January, the feast of the Epiphany, the day on which the Magi visited the Infant Jesus; it ends with the dawn of Ash Wednesday, to many people the term Mardi Gras means the festivities in their entirety, but this is correct. The entire period of festivity is called the Carnival Season, consisting of the entire program of balls and parades. Mardi Gras is only Shrove Tuesday-one day. In some years the Carnival Season may last 60 days in other years there are only 30 days in which to have all the balls.

Carnival in New Orleans is also the social season. In no City in the United States is 'Society' so exclusive and so serious as it is in New Orleans. Debutantes view their debuts with the same concern with which their mothers and grandmothers viewed theirs. Their prestige and popularity are measured by the number of call-outs that they receive at the balls

ITALY SUPPORTS NATO NUCLEAR FORCE AND BRITAIN'S EFFORT IN COMMON MARKET

WASHINGTON-JAN. 18----- President Kennedy won Italy's cautious support for a NATO nuclear force, and its pledge to back Britain's effort to join the common market.

There were the outstanding points of a communique issued jointly by Kennedy and Amintore Fanfani, Italy's prime minister, after two days of talks.

The talks began shortly after French President Charles de Gaulle turned down Kennedy's invitation to join the Nassau pact-an agreement between Kennedy and Britain's Prime Minister Harold Macmillan to provide NATO with a multinational nuclear force.

De Gaulle made it clear at the same time that he opposes Britain's early entry into the European common market.

The Kennedy-Fanfani meeting provided the President with an important ally in his NATO family differences with the French leader, some diplomatic observers noted.

They feel also that by coming out clearly on Kennedy's side, Fanfani made a decisive step toward revitalizing his country's role in the Atlantic community and in isolating de Gaulle.

Kennedy and his guest, the communique said, agreed that increased invigoration of Europe-which means getting Britain and perhaps other western nations into the common market-would bring 'greater solidarity and prosperity' to Europe.

Fanfani, the communique said, pledged his country's 'continuing effort' in sup-

porting Britain's application for entry.

The Italian agreed that the U.S. proposals for a NATO nuclear force 'should receive the most serious consideration by all members of the alliance'-obviously including France.

The two leaders also agreed that there was need 'to modernize both the nuclear and conventional weapons and forces which their countries contribute to the alliance.' This may lead to replacement in Italy of Jupiter intermediate-range ballistic missiles with Polaris-type rockets.

But while lining up with Kennedy on both vital issues, the Italian head of government is understood to have urged the President to give De Gaulle another chance to reconsider his double-barreled rejection. There were strong indications that Fanfani has offered to put out feelers toward Paris and even to mediate in this dispute, if De Gaulle offers him any encouragement.

City, Etruscan Fort Unearthed

ROME (AP) — Excavations north of Rome have turned up an iron age city and an Etruscan stone fort, archeologists said. Among those who took part in the digging was Sweden's King Gustaf VI Adolf, an expert on the pre-Christian civilization of the Etruscans.

MARDI GRAS CLIMAX OF CARNIVAL

Mardi Gras came to New Orleans with Iberville as far back as Shrove Tuesday 1699. On his way up the Mississippi River he stopped for a short rest on a small bayou and called it Bayou Mardi Gras. The first Mardi Gras festivity in New Orleans is not known, but by 1766 it was an established custom. After 1850 there arose a hue and cry against Carnival and the press insisted that Mardi Gras be abandoned. The end seemed in sight. In 1857 there were rumors that a new organization would parade on Mardi Gras night, with it, the entire appearance of Carnival changed for all future and

subsequent celebrations. The first parade held on February 26 1884, had only two floats. On one rode Comus on the other Satan. The maskers walked before and behind these two floats. The Daily Crescent, a leading newspaper, the next day printed the following account: 'Led by the festive Comus high on his royal set, and Satan high on a hill, far-blazing a mound with a pyramid and towers from diamond quarries hewn, and rocks of gold, the palace of great Lucifer was followed by devils large, and devils small, devils with horns and devils with tails, and devils without either'. The Comus Ball at the Gaiey Theatre located on Gravier St. between Baronne and Carondelet presented four gorgeous tableaux.

Chicken-Cheese Bake Fine Party Fare



For extra-special guests, every homemaker naturally wants extra-special meals. To meet the "what to serve" question, the Borden Kitchen has developed a delicious combination of chicken and cheese, sprinkled throughout with mushrooms and olive slices. It is appropriately called "Company Chicken-Cheese Bake." It can be made in two stages. Cook the chicken in advance, and then combine with other ingredients and bake 30-35 minutes at mealtime. Company Cheese-Chicken Bake (Makes about 6 servings)

Cut chicken into serving pieces. Coat chicken lightly with combined salt, pepper and flour. Cook, in hot fat in skillet until golden brown but not thoroughly done. Layer half the chicken, rice, shredded cheese food, mushrooms and olives in 2-quart casserole. Pour half of cream and sherry over this. Layer the remaining chicken, rice and cheese food on top. Arrange remaining mushrooms and olives over mixture. Add remaining cream and sherry. Sprinkle with almonds. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 30 to 35 minutes or until almonds are browned and cheese is melted.

*2 3 cup uncooked rice—(packaged pre-cooked rice may be used.)

Bank of La. Stock Up to \$953,340

Capital stock in the Bank of Louisiana has been increased from \$715,000 to \$953,340.

James F. Quaid, president, said the \$238,340 increase was made possible through the issuance of 23,834 additional bank shares.

"Accordingly the bank's surplus increased from \$190,544 to \$258,880, an increase of \$68,336," he said. "Undivided profits likewise increased to \$219,201.75 from \$123,865.75."

"The outlook for 1963 in New Orleans is highly encouraging, with the growth of normal industry and commerce bolstered by the ever growing NASA and allied projects certain to provide a good business climate," Quaid added.

All officers and directors were re-elected.

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Three Election Issues Cited. By M'Keithen

BATON ROUGE (AP) — Public Service Commissioner John J. McKeithen names bond issues, a code of ethics and education loans as the issues in his bid for governor of Louisiana.

In television programs over nine TV station, McKeithen touched on the bond issues, a public question since Gov. Jimmie H. Davis' administration enacted \$180 million in bond programs.

The public approved the latest \$60 million for highways in last November's general election.

Gets Support

McKeithen, from Columbia, is getting some support for his campaign from some of the old Long leaders. He once was House floor leader for the late Gov. Earl K. Long.

Mentioning what he considered key campaign issues, McKeithen said, "We must have a code of ethics for all (state) employees and officials—including the governor."

"There is a need for listing all employees, classified and unclassified," he said, referring to civil service. "We need a fair return in the investment of idle state funds. The people of Louisiana want and are entitled to good, stable and economic government and I propose to give them the kind of government they desire."

Improve Image

"Louisiana has the greatest potential of any state in this union, but we must by aggressive, sincere and capable leadership improve its image in the eyes of the world before this potential can be realized."

"We have struggled for decades to bring our educational institutions up to the required standard. We cannot afford to break the faith with our youth by failing to provide the opportunity for a good education."

Guaranteed Loans

"I propose, if elected governor of Louisiana, to initiate a program of state-guaranteed loans which will enable every deserving boy and girl who has a real desire and needs an education, to attend one of our colleges or universities."

"These loans must be repaid by the student when she or he has graduated and obtained employment. This program will not only make it possible for thousands of our youth to prepare themselves for industry and professions, it will not only relieve the parents of tremendous financial burdens, it will teach these boys and girls the meaning of responsibility. They will appreciate their education and will make better citizens for tomorrow."

Verdi Festival Set By Opera Company

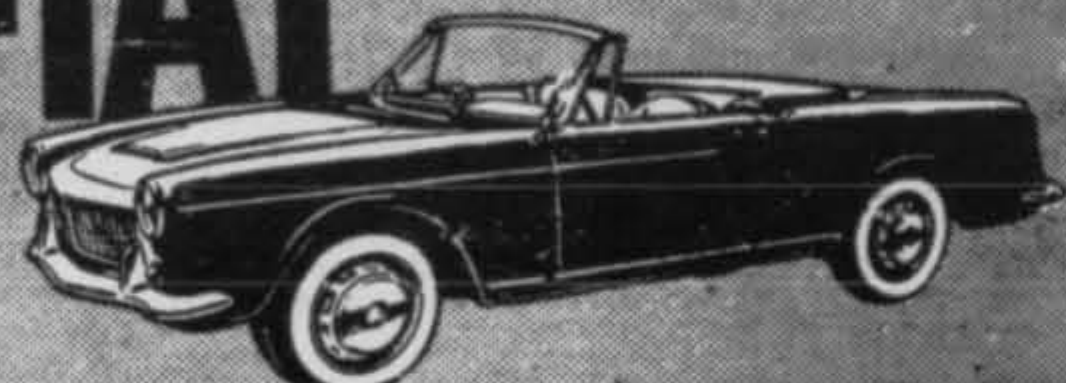
ROME, Italy (AP) — Rome's opera company is planning to make the 1963 season a special festival in honor of Giuseppe Verdi.

ROME (AP) - The Italian Soccer League disclosed recently it was continuing what the country's sports writers call "an anti-doping campaign."

The league began a series of spot checks last season to determine whether players were using pep pills or other stimulants. Players were selected at random for physical examinations after the weekly matches.

A league announcement said the players of four major league teams - Atalanta of Bergamo, Sampdoria of Genoa, Spal of Ferrara and Venezia of Venice - were examined by doctors after last Sunday's games. The results will not be made public for several weeks.

Many non-Italians play for the four teams.

Many Americans, Britons and Irishmen studied under him in Rome.

He was beatified in 1887, the first step on the road to sainthood.

Cardinal Cushing also disclosed that Cardinal Bea had been invited to address a centennial meeting sponsored by Harvard University's divinity school. Cardinal Cushing also said Cardinal Bea may speak at Boston University, which is affiliated with the Methodist church, and may go on a "stump tour" for Christian unity in several Eastern states with Cardinal Cushing.

Mantova prima col Mantegna, Treviso poi con il Cima, hanno insegnato; e certamente la prossima mostra del Carpaccio è frutto delle esperienze che in questo campo la provincia ha saputo offrire. Negli ultimi tempi, infatti, l'eco suscitata da quelle esposizioni ha, per dir così, messo sotto accusa l'iniziativa veneziana: se si consultano le cifre, si può constatare come Venezia, malgrado le sue tradizioni e l'alta qualità delle mostre, non abbia saputo eguagliare il primato di Mantova, che con i suoi duecentomila visitatori fa impallidire le sessantamila "presenze" riscosse dal Crivelli e le stesse centocinquanta mila del Giorgione.

Treviso, con ottantamila visite, ha anch'essa superato diverse tra le mostre del Palazzo Ducale. Infine, la Biennale, massima asse dell'arte figurativa contemporanea, ha totalizzato 134 mila "presenze".
