THE PRESIDENT'S PERCH



Question for you:

What is currently thought to be the leading cause of bird mortality in the US?

- 1. climate change
- 2. bird window collisions
- 3. feral cats

Answer—bird window collisions. And not birds flying into skyscrapers, but birds flying into the windows of our homes! Researchers from the Acopian Center for Ornithology at Muhlenberg College in Allentown, PA wrote in 2023: "50% of bird—window collisions leave no measurable evidence of a strike, and as much as 70% of stunned victims likely succumb from a collision." *Oh my gosh, 70%!*

"Anyone who lives near a window has an opportunity to take action," says Connie Sanchez, program manager for <u>Audubon's Bird-friendly Buildings initiative</u>. Through <u>Audubon bird-friendly buildings</u>, she urges people to explore ways to increase the visibility of transparent and reflective surfaces in their homes to prevent collisions. For more help, you can also visit this website: <u>stop bird collisions</u>.

We are still hoping for a donation of a mounted duck to use at tabling events in the community. There is nothing like the chance to see a bird close up to draw people over to our table!

Also, if you are out and about and see any "good" pine cones, we could use some for our Nurture the Nature Lover days for school children at TREC and other events. "Good" is any pinecone that is not broken, and allows people to spread shortening in the little crevices to make birdseed stick. Please collect and save for us! They can be dropped off at the front desk at the Tom Ridge Environmental Center, or we can pick them up.

In Memoriam Don Snyder



Presque Isle Audubon lost another respected and long-time member with the death of Don Snyder in July. Don was involved with PIA for decades; as a Board member, Christmas Bird Count participant, and field trip leader. From his obituary: "After earning his BS in Biology at Manchester College, IN, Don earned his MS and PhD in zoology from Ohio State University culminating in 1963. He went on to complete twelve post-doctoral projects and over 30 scientific publications, mostly regarding ornithology. He was known for inspiring his students to pursue careers in ornithology and natural sciences, and several became life-long friends. In 1996, Don retired emeritus from his teaching career at Edinboro University of PA, but did not slow down his passion for the outdoors and birding." He will be missed.



HABITAT RECOGNITION PROGRAM

The Pennsylvania Audubon Council, in partnership with PA Audubon chapters (like Presque Isle Audubon) and Bird Town PA, invites you to join our Bird-

Friendly Habitat Program! It recognizes and celebrates properties that provide essential food, water, shelter, and nesting places for birds while using sustainable practices. It's designed to engage, educate, and empower individuals to rethink yards, balconies, and community green spaces, turning them into functional habitat that is both beautiful for you and beneficial for birds. By registering your property, you'll be automatically connected to your local Audubon chapter so you can discover the bird walks, events, and social opportunities happening right in your community.

Homeowners, renters, schools, parks, businesses, and community spaces can apply. Properties of any size — from small yards to large parcels — are eligible as long as they meet the habitat requirements. Small green spaces, balconies, terraces, and container gardens can provide valuable habitat if designed thoughtfully with native plants and bird-friendly practices. Schools, places of worship, and municipal properties do not have to pay a fee!

To qualify for the **Bird Habitat Recognition program** and receive your yard sign, your property must have items from each of the four pillars of healthy habitats: **Food, Water, Shelter, and Nesting**. We recognize that individuals seeking recognition for a small space, such as a patio or balcony, may offer alternative options for bird friendly habitat, so exceptions will be considered.

Food: Include plenty of options that reflect bird-friendly food groups like berries, seeds, nectar, insects, and more. Seed, suet, and nectar feeders are also encouraged. At least two items from this list are required.

Water: Provide clean water sources that offer birds water to drink, bathe, and preen. This might include natural streams and rain gardens, or bird baths and drip fountains.





Shelter: Aim for a variety of sizes and textures to provide safe haven for nesting and protection from predators. Hedgerows, brush piles, and nesting boxes are all good choices.

Nesting: Offer natural and human-made options for birds to construct their nests. This might include clusters of trees (even snags or standing dead trees), shrub thickets, and nest boxes.

Further details about each of these four pillars are included on the application itself. Ready for the next step? Submit your application and \$30 fee to join the fun! The application fee helps to support and grow the program, while spreading the word across the state about the benefits of Bird Friendly Habitats. You'll get your Bird Friendly Habitat sign delivered in person by someone from Presque Isle Audubon, or through the mail.

She was excited to have a pair of monarch butterflies spend a successful summer in her garden, along with many other pollinators. Colleen also saw many garden spiders, Cross Orb Weavers, which will be good food for baby birds next spring. These spiders also provide webbing as a nest building adhesive. **Congratulations, Colleen!**

We hope you follow her example and sign up, and then send us pictures of your sign on your property. Join our flock, and help protect habitat and inspire conservation across Pennsylvania!



Soaring, Together

This summer, three of our PIA members attended the National Audubon Leadership Conference.

We'll highlight some of their experiences in each of our upcoming issues!

Sharing the Magic of Bird Migration and Motus

This July, I had the opportunity to attend the Audubon Leadership Conference in Montréal, where I joined a fascinating session about Motus—a powerful tool that's transforming how we understand bird migration.

So, what is Motus? The word comes from Latin, meaning movement, and that's exactly what it's all about. Motus is an international research network that studies the movements of birds, bats, and even insects. Scientists place tiny, lightweight tags on animals, which then send signals to receiver stations (called "Motus towers") scattered across the landscape. Each time a tagged animal passes by, the tower records its journey.

Think of it as a global "check-in" system for wildlife! The data collected helps scientists learn where animals travel, how long they stay in certain areas, and what routes they rely on. This information is vital for conserving migratory species and protecting the habitats they need to survive.

Here's the exciting part: Presque Isle is home to two Motus towers! That means birds stopping here on their epic migrations are part of this international tracking effort. The next time you see a warbler flitting through the trees or a hawk soaring over the lake, it may be carrying a tiny tag that contributes to groundbreaking research.

Our Wider MDUBON COMMUNITY



At the Leadership Conference, we were reminded that Presque Isle Audubon is part of something much larger than our local chapter work in Erie and Crawford counties. Across the region, fellow Audubon chapters are doing incredible things to protect birds and habitats, engage their communities, and inspire conservation.

One example is the Southern Maryland Audubon Society (**somdaudubon.org**), whose members are active in everything from habitat restoration to educational outreach. Taking a look at what other chapters are doing can spark ideas, foster collaboration, and remind us that we're all part of a vibrant, connected network working for birds.

Motus is science, technology, and conservation coming together—and it's happening right here in our own backyard.
