<b>Saturday 5 July: Feria</b>  <b>Vigil Mass of 14th Sunday of the Year</b> <i>5.00pm STM: Teresa Brunnock &amp; Brunnock family RIP</i> <i>6.30pm ST: Int: Pro Populo</i>		In the Gospel of St John, the first words of the Risen Christ to his apostles, gathered in the Upper Room on the morning of the resurrection were: “Peace be with you”. In today’s readings from the Prophet Isaiah and the Gospel of Luke we find a similar theme appearing.  In our first reading, Isaiah is giving joyful thanks for the return of the Jews from their seventy year exile in Babylon. It is a homecoming which evokes all the emotion of such a moment, including the anticipation of a forthcoming era of peace, flowing across the land like a broad river. Isaiah also uses the powerful image of Jerusalem as “mother”, as one who will feed and nourish the returning exiles, just as a real mother does for her children. In the gospel, we hear of the seventy-two who had been sent out by Jesus to proclaim the good news of God’s peace with the coming of His Kingdom. This Good News was proclaimed to the people, who in spite of what Isaiah had prophesised all those years ago, still felt that this promise remained unfulfilled. The land remained occupied and desolate. They experienced a sense of internal exile in their own land. It seemed to them that any peace they were experiencing was very different from the one they were promised, for what they experienced, was an imposed peace, subject to Roman oversight. What the seventy-two found as they went around the towns and villages of Galilee was indeed a deep thirst for a lasting peace that would replace the bondage enforced on them by Rome. On their return to Jesus, they came back to him rejoicing, just like the exiles before them. Their proclamation to the people was that he kingdom of God and the peace which derives therefrom, was at last becoming both visible and tangible for the people as a real sign to be lived and experienced through their relationship with Jesus.

The message of the Kingdom of God, brought into the realm of human relationship as a gift of a totally new concept of peace. It takes us back to the very beginning as something new, something fresh, something re-born. In our second reading from his letter to the Galatians, St Paul spells this out in clear words: we have become a new creation through the cross of Christ in his resurrection. The beauty, the joy, the promises, the hopes foretold by the Prophets have not been negated or forgotten. They do not remain unfulfilled or abandoned, disregarded or ignored, bur rather lifted up and perfected. Of course, the wounds of Christ are still visible because we continue to deny and reject his peace, his shalom. But we are sent and commissioned every day and, in every place, to make his peace visible and tangible as our response to the grace and peace which Jesus Christ pours into our lives.

 <b>Saint of the Week: Friday 11 July Benedict, Abbot &amp; Patron of Europe</b>  Born in the central Italian mountain town of Norcia (Nursia) around AD 480, St. Benedict became one of the most important catalysts for the creation of a new European culture after the fall of the Roman Empire in the West (traditionally dated to AD 476). The system of monastic life he developed and nourished spread centres of prayer and hospitality throughout the continent. Benedictine monasteries were not only spiritual and cultural centres, but also a source of sustenance and relief for pilgrims and the poor. “Idleness,” writes St. Benedict in the Rule, “is an enemy of the soul; That is why the brothers have to devote themselves to manual work, in some hours, in others, to reading books containing the word of God.” Prayer and work are not in opposition, but establish a symbiotic relationship. Without prayer, it is not possible to encounter God. The monastic life, however, defined by Benedict as “a school of the service of the Lord,” cannot be without concrete commitment.
