<b>Monday 24 November: St Andrew Dung-Lac &amp; Companions.</b> Christianity was brought to Vitenam by the Portuguese .Jesuits opened a mission in the early 17th Century. Since then the Christians converts have suffered severe persecution throughout the period and up into the 20th Century. The number of martyrs remains unknown with estimates raising to some 300,000. Andrew Dung-Lac was a priest amongst 117 people martyred between 1820 and1862. All were canonised by Saint Pope John Paul. We recall their witness and pray for their intercession.
