Daily CQ sessions to build meaningful relationships between scholars and trained educators.




Summer Uniform

Physical Education

We believe in the importance of physical activity and the introduction to sport. Our scholars take part in physical education weekly. During physical education, our scholars engage in various exercises and explore different sports, building healthy minds and bodies.

Clubs and Extracurricular Activities

Day-to-day enrichment is delivered through clubs, which are scheduled into the structure of the school week. Scholars participate in one club every term that falls into one of the following categories: sports, study, cultural, or projects.

Enrichment activities beyond school provide opportunities for SPARK High School scholars to socialise and develop leadership, interests, and hobbies. Whole school social activities are offered through events such as dance and community days.



Houses

Every scholar enrolling at our high school is assigned a house on their first day. Houses foster a sense of community and belonging among our scholars: Uhuru, Kuumba, Kubvuma, and Ubuntu. Scholars earn points for their house by demonstrating core values that contribute positively to the school culture or by showing excellence in academics.

Learning Materials fee

SPARK families are required to pay a once-off learning materials fee of R1250. This learning materials fee includes all classroom resources, workbooks and files. Parents must purchase consumable stationery such as pens, pencils, rulers, math sets and erasers for use at home and school. Scholars will also require a Casio scientific calculator to be used at home and school.

Device Purchase and Usage

All our high scholars are required to have digital access to textbooks and learning materials from grades 8-12 which serves as a personalised learning tool, enabling scholars to access their curriculum seamlessly both in and out of the classroom while allowing teachers to monitor engagement and progress. Parents are therefore required to purchase a personal device for their scholars for academic use.

POLICIES

Code of Conduct

Our Code of Conduct has been developed in accordance with the South African Schools Act and is aimed at establishing a disciplined and purposeful environment to facilitate effective education and learning at SPARK Schools.

Each SPARK scholar will be given a copy of this Code of Conduct via the Scholar and Family Handbook, distributed annually. Families are required to read through the Handbook with their scholar and sign the Handbook Agreement and return it to the scholar's educator for filing. By signing this Handbook Agreement, Families and scholars acknowledge they are informed of what they may not do or should do and what action will be taken against them if they contravene this Code of Conduct.

Anti-Bullying Policy

SPARK Schools does not tolerate bullying in any form, and all members of SPARK Schools staff are committed to promoting a safe and caring environment for all SPARK scholars. This policy defines bullying and details how bullying should be reported and the procedures we commit to taking to respond to and resolve allegations of bullying.

Diversity Policy

SPARK Schools is committed to upholding diversity by providing equality of opportunity and anti-discriminatory practice for all children and families. Discriminatory behaviour, intentional or otherwise, will not be tolerated at SPARK Schools, and breaches of this policy are dealt with according to the Code of Conduct.

Anti-Discrimination Policy

In accordance with the Diversity Policy, SPARK Schools is committed to upholding diversity by providing equality of opportunity and anti-discriminatory practice for all Stakeholders. This Policy applies to all employees, scholars, parents, visitors, suppliers, and related stakeholders. This Policy has been established to prevent and eliminate any unfair discrimination, clarify the procedure, responsibilities, and obligations of all SPARK Schools stakeholders in upholding anti-discriminatory practices, and establish appropriate and accessible interventions for stakeholders to address allegations of unfair discrimination.

Policy for the Resolution of Grievances

The SPARK Schools Policy for the Resolution of Grievances Between Families (Guardians) and School Staff Members was developed based on the recommendations of the Independent Schools Association of South Africa, of which SPARK Schools is a member. This policy informs the formal and informal procedures in place to address issues that may arise relating to the function of the school. We ask families with concerns to follow the informal and formal procedures within this policy to resolve their concerns with their school's leadership team.

Child Protection Policy and Duty to Report

SPARK Schools is steadfast in its devotion to protecting children at risk and ensuring that they can experience quality care and nurturing relationships. The Child Protection Policy aligns with the Children's Act and details our staff members' legal obligation to report suspected abuse based on an allegation disclosed or other reasonable grounds for suspicion. Our Child Protection Policy is implemented and enforced with the assistance of [SafeSchool](#), our partner on matters of child protection, duty of care, and safeguarding of our scholars and staff.
