Tammy leads a range of portfolios for the Board but has a key focus on building a new multi-site pā kāinga programme in the Far North over the next 2 years. # **Dr Marcos Pelenur**

# CE, EECA

Marcos is Chief Executive of the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority, the New Zealand Government agency responsible for supporting, encouraging and promoting energy efficiency, conservation and renewables. Previously, Marcos held a number of leadership roles across energy markets, natural resources and science, including stewardship of New Zealand's national science system. Before joining EECA, Marcos led the energy and sustainability practice for the Behavioural Insights Team, North and Latin America.

Marcos holds a PhD in Engineering from the University of Cambridge and is a registered Chartered Professional Member of Engineering New Zealand and the UK Institution of Engineering and Technology (IET).

Page leads Tapestry, a project at X, Alphabet's innovation lab. Tapestry is building Al-powered tools to make the world's electric grid visible so everyone can access reliable, affordable, and clean energy.

Before joining X, Page held roles as a go-to-market and commercial leader and advisor at several start-ups, two of which attained unicorn status: Sunrun in rooftop solar energy in the U.S., and Konfio in financial services in Mexico. She was previously co-CEO and founder of Clarus Power, a venture-backed residential solar customer acquisition platform. Page is a co-inventor of several U.S. patents in the energy domain. She earned a certificate from the Stanford GSB Summer Institute for General Management and holds a Bachelor of Science in Economics from Santa Clara University. She was recognized as one of the top 50 Climate Tech Operators in the 2021 Climate Draft and won Fin Earth's 101 Women in Climate Award in 2024.



**Briony Bennett**Senior Energy Innovation Manager, Ara Ake

Briony started her career as an electricity trading systems analyst at the European Power Exchange after completing a Masters in energy economics and policy at Sciences Po in Paris, France. She went on to work as a renewable energy policy analyst at Bloomberg New Energy Finance in London, U.K. before returning home to Aotearoa to make her contribution to the energy transition here. She has worked across both government and business to drive for change and innovation in our energy sector.



# Mike Casey | Dave Karl

#### **Rewiring Aotearoa**

Mike Casey is an entrepreneur and cherry orchardist from Central Otago who has electrified all the machines on his farm and demonstrated how the transition away from diesel can save farmers tens of thousands each year and significantly reduce emissions. He is also the CEO of Rewiring Aotearoa, a New Zealand charity dedicated to electrifying millions of fossil fuel machines across the motu as quickly as possible. Rewiring Aotearoa's Electric Homes report proved New Zealand had reached the electrification tipping point, where electric appliances and vehicles were cheaper than their fossil fuel equivalents over their lifetime, even with upfront costs and finance built in. The Electric Farms paper proved there are similar benefits for the rural sector if we can turn farms into power plants.



# **Dr Sea Rottman**

# **CE, Sustainable Energy Advice**

Dr Sea Rotmann is an energy justice and behaviour change researcher based in rural Mohua / Golden Bay. She runs a research consultancy called SEA - Sustainable Energy Advice Ltd, and has 20+ years experience working in and with national and local government, industry, and the community sector in Aotearoa, and overseas. She has led two global research collaborations under the Users-Centred Energy Systems Technology Collaboration Programme (Users TCP) by the International Energy Agency (IEA) since 2012: the first focused on Behaviour Change in Demand-Side Management, the current one (since early 2019) on Hard-to-Reach (HTR) energy users, energy injustice and hidden hardship. She believes that a truly just and sustainable energy transition is only possible if we prioritise the most vulnerable energy users and remove the current structural injustices from the energy system.

# **Dr Nevil Pierse**

#### Department of Public Health, Otago University

Professor Nevil Pierse is co-leader of He Kāinga Oranga – Housing and Health Research Programme. Originally a statistician by training, his current work is done in partnership with a wide range of stakeholders including government and community organisations and is focused on the design and implementation of natural experiments to improve the home and community environments.

He is currently working on the Healthy Housing Initiative, which looks at home interventions to prevent re-hospitalisation of children with housing-related disease. This programme has accessed and remediated over 30,000 homes in New Zealand and resulted in a decrease of nearly 10,000 hospital admissions. The Healthy Housing Initiative was awarded the Prime Minister's Spirit of Service Award in 2019.



# **Maria Owen**

# CEO, ImpactLab

Maria is the CEO of ImpactLab. ImpactLab connects decisionmakers in the social sector with data that helps them do good, better for their communities. Since launching in 2019, ImpactLab has estimated the impact of over 250 social interventions reaching 300,000 New Zealanders across diverse sectors including youth development, housing, education and financial wellbeing. Maria has a BA in Politics, Psychology and Sociology from Cambridge University, an MBA from Stanford University and was New Zealand's Hi Tech Young Achiever of the Year in 2021

# **Executive Officer, Community Energy Network**

Gareth has been the Executive Officer for the Community Energy Network for the last 8 years. Over that time Gareth has grown his understanding on what makes community enterprises tick and how valuable they are to the energy wellbeing sector. A fair chunk of his time is taken up working with Government agencies, researchers and sector partners to provide a community sector voice in policy development and funding decisions. The latest significant engagement has been as a member of the Energy Hardship Reference Group that has supported the EH Expert Panel in their deliberations over the last 18 months.
