Enhancing Exceptional Learning at the Civitan Children's Center

KCARC is thrilled to announce an exciting expansion and enhancement of the exceptional early learning opportunities at the Civitan Children's Center. Thanks to a collaborative effort with the Mayor and the City of Vincennes through a HELP grant, along with support from the Early Years Initiative grant via Early Learning Indiana, our young learners will embark on a journey filled with innovative multi-sensory experiences, dynamic curriculum, and evidence-based goal tracking aimed at bolstering their readiness for Kindergarten. The grant funds, managed by the Southern Indiana Development Commission, will also facilitate ongoing professional development for our employees through Building Blocks Regional Training Center.

KCARCs' vision is to create a high-quality, integrated learning environment that welcomes children of all abilities, which includes the addition of an eighth classroom. This new space will enable us to welcome 10 to 14 more students, with all designs prioritizing accessibility. The classroom will be equipped with new changing tables, furniture, tables and chairs, toys, art supplies, projectors, and whiteboards, all crafted to foster a decade of enriching learning experiences.

The common area of the Civitan Children's Center will be transformed to include a Learning Tree library, a serene quiet zone, illumination tables, sound treatment, and specialized equipment to enhance motor skills. KAPLAN Early Learning Company was present to assist in the setup of this new equipment and to provide employee training on innovative teaching methods, utilizing these resources.

The playgrounds will be revitalized, featuring new shaded areas, sandboxes, and toddler-friendly play equipment.

The support from Vincennes Community School Corporation, the City of Vincennes, Packaging Corporation of America in Vincennes, KAPLAN and Building Blocks has been invaluable in driving these improvements forward. Watch for our upcoming "Open House" to view the fresh, new spaces.



You don't have to have an intellectual diagnosis for someone at KCARC to do the best they can to help you when you need help. Lowe says the best part of her job is helping people to get the resources they need, and she enjoys seeing how it changes the lives of people.

KCARC specifically provides services supported by Medicaid Waiver programs. She can help clients with those processes, and then once they are established, accessing and using those services. KCARC has a desire to help in our community as a whole though. Not just Medicaid Waiver recipients.

A large part of what Lowe does is building connections. She says that there are people that donate money to many organizations, but it might surprise you to know that the biggest needs are not money in these cases. It is time and compassion. More people that are willing to offer their time, compassion, and their skills are needed.

Lowe says, "Volunteering and just sharing your talents are so helpful. If you love cooking, why not share that passion by teaching someone or whipping up a meal for them? Are you skilled at sports? Rachl Ballard, Curriculum Coordinator at KCARC is all smiles after being surprised with a cake and balloons to recognize her latest accomplishment!



Easter fun!



I always enjoy the Easter Holiday. I enjoy all of the goodies, Easter egg hunts and spending time with my family. KCARCs' Day Program participants enjoyed baking up some delicious cakes and coloring eggs.

With all of this festive preparation it reminded me of great memories I have of when I was younger. My family and I colored Easter eggs, enjoyed going to church and hunting eggs. It was a challenge with 4 brothers, but, it made for a fun and exciting Easter!



I will always remember sitting down to ham, mashed potatoes, noodles and of course amazing sweet treats. All of these things prepared by my mother who had wonderful compassion and a great smile.

One of my favorite desserts is actually something that is a little bit healthy and I am going to share it with you. It is an Easter egg fruit tart. It is chocolate-free with plenty of colorful fruit and it is shaped like an Easter egg. This is a super simple dessert that is easy to customize. Here is the recipe so you can enjoy it too.

Crust:

1 ½ cups (162g) graham cracker crumbs 7 tablespoons (99g) unsalted Challenge Butter 1/4 cup (50g) granulated sugar

Filling:

34 cup cold heavy whipping cream 8 ounces cream cheese, room temperature

4 cup granulated sugar I teaspoon vanilla extract I teaspoon lemon juice

Topping:

I pound Assorted Fruits (approximately) 2 tablespoons apricot or raspberry jam

2 teaspoons lime juice or water



Instructions:

- 1. Make the crust, stir together the Graham Cracker Crumbs, melted butter and sugar. Press into the bottom of a 10- inch tart pan and chill.
- 2. Make the filing: add heavy whipping cream to a large bowl and beat with a hand or a stand mixer until stiff peaks form. Refrigerate while making
- 3. Add cream cheese, sugar and vanilla to another large bowl. Mix using a hand or a stand mixer until smooth and creamy.
- 4. Add whipped cream to the cream cheese mixture and us a spatula to fold in.
- 5-Serve chilled within one day. You can make the cheesecake up to 24 hours ahead, just don't top it until the day of serving.
