#### **OUTCOMES FOR PUPILS**

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The outcomes for pupils at St Luke's Catholic Primary School are outstanding. The pupils are proud of their faith, their school and their school community. It was obvious as the inspectors walked around the school and spoke to various groups of pupils, including the School Council, Mini Vinnie's and the Cafod Group that there is an atmosphere of trust and respect. The behaviour of the children is excellent.

The pupils spoke with confidence and understanding about their Mission Statement and the work they do within the school and the wider community. Within school, the Year 6 pupils share with staff the responsibility for supporting the younger children. An example of this is at lunch-time when children are seated in family groups and a member of Year 6 is allocated a dining table. It is their responsibility to ensure the welfare of all pupils and to report any incidents. This year the school introduced a House system for the whole school. Again, the pupils talked enthusiastically about this provision and their role within the school. In the wider community, the school has joined together with other local schools and churches to celebrate events including Christmas and Easter. Pupils are also actively involved in supporting the local food bank. The Cafod group run a Fairtrade stall in school on parents' evening and can explain in detail the work of Cafod and the importance of Fairtrade.

Standards in Religious Education are high and pupils' achievements are evidenced by their work in books and through other activities and events. High expectations are maintained through lesson observations and book scrutiny. Teachers are developing a more creative approach to the teaching of Religious Education, including an increased use of drama and information technology, which is popular with the pupils. Pupils are given opportunities for independent learning. An example of this was observed by the inspectors when following a class lesson on justice and injustice, a group of Year 6 pupils were asked to work independently to research and prepare a power point presentation on the subject of Justice. The pupils worked diligently and with confidence to complete their task.

Collective Worship is an integral part of daily life at St Luke's. Pupils are given the opportunity to participate in a variety of styles of prayer and are actively encouraged to take an active role in the planning and preparation. The pupils are introduced to formal prayer from an early age. Pupils take ownership for the updating of the Prayer Table within each class, ensuring the resources reflect the liturgical time of year. Each class has a display which reflects the current topic and celebrates the pupils' work

The Sacramental programme is a very important part of school life. The older pupils talk with pride about the support from both school and parish. A day of reflection at the centre at Noddfa is now offered as part of the programme and is very popular with the children.

#### LEADERS AND MANAGERS

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The leadership of the school is outstanding. The focused and dedicated Headteacher who is also the subject leader, together with the Governing Body and Senior Leadership Team, ensures the school is an integral part of the community and of the parish. The Catholic ethos of the school is paramount.

The Governing Body shows its commitment to all aspects of school life by keeping itself fully

informed about what is happening in the school and by keeping up to date with changes in legislation and guidance information. The majority of the governors are also parishioners. The Chair of Governors is a frequent visitor to the school, is familiar with the workings and daily routines and is known by the pupils. The governors receive regular reports from the Headteacher and were actively involved in writing the Self Evaluation Form.

Last year the Senior Leadership Team conducted a full review of the assessment process in Religious Education. From this they highlighted areas for improvement and implemented a new system which included staff training. This has had a clear and beneficial impact on assessment in Religious Education ensuring regular assessment informs future planning.

Senior leaders recognise the importance of staff development and actively encourage and support staff to grow in their own faith. All new members of staff are given a school Religious Education handbook, which provides clear guidance on the expectations when working in the school. The school has identified the creative curriculum as an area for development over the coming years and has planned for the appropriate training and resources to ensure quality provision.

Questionnaires returned by parents show that the vast majority of children enjoy attending the school, with ninety nine percent of questionnaires indicating that parents are happy with the values and attitudes that the school teaches. Parents commented that

"one of the biggest strengths of St Luke's is the values the children learn through Religious Education. These are reflected in their behaviour and the way they interact together." Another parent reported that "there is such a warmth about the school."

#### PROVISION

The quality of the provision at St Luke's Catholic Primary School is outstanding. In the lessons observed by the inspectors, there was clear evidence that lessons were linked to prior learning with a range of differentiated activities in every class.

Systems are in place to make effective use of assessment, recording and monitoring of pupils' progress. Marking ensures that positive feedback is given and areas for improvement are offered to all pupils, including both verbal and written comments. Teachers are now developing a more creative approach to the teaching of Religious Education, incorporating the use of ICT, art and effective questioning.

The inspectors observed a range of teaching styles, good deployment of support staff and good use of questions, but in a few cases better use could be made of more open questioning. In discussion time, pupils were encouraged to share opinions, which they did confidently and with respect for the views of others which may differ from their own. The introduction of Philosophy for Children (P4C) has had a positive impact on the quality of thoughtful questioning and opportunity for reflection on key issues.

The curriculum is relevant to the needs of the school and designed to meet the needs of individuals. Evidence indicates that through enriched learning experiences pupils make at least good progress and show a good understanding of Christian life. Pupils learn about other faiths and cultures, including Judaism and Islam. Visitors from other faiths are welcomed into the school to talk about their faith and beliefs. Parents are informed about their child's achievement in Religious Education in the end of year report.

Collective Worship at St. Luke's is outstanding and is central to the work of the school. Children are encouraged and supported in developing their understanding and response to the world around them. Through Collective Worship there is a real sense of belonging to a community which has the love of Christ at its heart. Pupils are actively encouraged to involve themselves in the prayer life of the school. Opportunities for prayer both formal and informal are presented throughout the day and the Angelus has been successfully introduced into the school day.

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#### **OVERALL EFFECTIVENESS**

St. Luke's is an outstanding Catholic school, which because of the school community's commitment to living out its Mission statement provides a Catholic education that enables children to achieve high standards in their religious education and nurtures their spiritual and moral development. The welcoming environment, the care given to displaying all pupils' work and the high quality of the pupils' written work demonstrates day to day that the pupils feel valued and all their efforts are acknowledged. Pupils enjoy their prayer time and celebrations, and they enthusiastically raise money for the wider community in need.

The Headteacher has developed a professional and dedicated team. Together they provide a calm and safe environment that enables St. Luke's to continue to grow and build on the already outstanding success.

Whilst recognising and celebrating the achievements of the staff and pupils it is recommended that to improve further the school should:

- consolidate the assessment process ensuring good practice informs future planning
- develop further the creative curriculum, ensuring all staff have access to the creative Religious Education training identified for this academic year
