Today, Remembrance services and parades are held on Remembrance Sunday. Children's uniformed organisations like Scouts and Guides join in.

Key Vocabulary Remembering people who died in wars, especially soldiers who fought Remembrance to protect others. An agreement between Germany, Triple Austria-Hungary, and Italy, who Alliance promised to support each other in war. An agreement between Britain, Triple France, and Russia, who promised to Entente support each other in war. Long, narrow ditches soldiers lived trenches and fought in during World War I to stay safe from enemy fire. The area closest to the enemy where Front line the most dangerous fighting happens in a war. Weapons, bullets, and bombs used by Munitions soldiers during war. The people and activities in a country The Home supporting the war from home, like Front working in factories or growing food. An agreement to stop fighting and Armistice bring peace, usually at the end of a war. A person who has served in the Veteran armed forces, often during a war.
