Alcohol Harms: A Child Profection Crisis

April is Alcohol Awareness Month, and alcohol misuse isn't solely an adult issue. When adults consume alcohol heavily, children and teenagers often bear the brunt, facing consequences that threaten their well-being.

Research indicates that:

- * Violence against children is strongly linked to adult alcohol misuse, particularly within homes.
- Teenagers may turn to alcohol as a coping mechanism, to fit in, or to escape challenges.
- * South Africa has one of the highest rates of Foetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASDs) globally.
- * Heavy drinking contributes to car accidents, drownings, unsafe sexual practices, and crime, all of which directly or indirectly impact children.
- * Despite the liquor industry's contribution of approximately 3% to South Africa's GDP, the societal costs of alcohol-related harm are estimated to be between 10-12% of the GDP.

To address this crisis, the World Health Organization recommends:

- 1. Increasing the price of alcohol through taxes and minimum unit pricing.
- 2. Limiting the availability of alcohol through restricted sales times and locations.
- 3. Banning alcohol advertising, sponsorships, and promotions.

Implementing these measures can significantly reduce alcohol consumption and its associated harms.

It's time to prioritise our children's safety by challenging the normalisation of heavy drinking. By creating supportive environments and enacting effective policies, we can ensure that every child grows up in a safe and nurturing community

Child Outcomes Evaluation

The SmartStart Child Outcomes Evaluation was released – and the results are more than promising. In just 8 months:

- ★ Children "on track" rose from 45% to 65%
- The achievement gap between the richest and poorest nearly closed
- SmartStart children outperformed the national Thrive by Five benchmark
