

Bhekisisa

In 2023, DGMT's CEO David Harrison penned an op-ed that argued that food producers and government could team up to cut the price of ten staples, like maize meal, beans and eggs – by up to 20%. The idea grabbed attention, sparking debates at treasury, the presidency and Nedlac, and making headlines across TV and radio.

With three in ten children stunted from poor nutrition, the "ten best buys" plan put child hunger on the national agenda. A year later, ahead of the 2024 elections, Harrison challenged politicians again and called out an industry still slow to change.
