The head of a clan is called the owokasolya, with subdivisions under their leadership. Initially, there were five original clans referred to as Banasangwa, which included Ffumbe, Lugave, Ngonge, Njaza, and Nyonyi. Currently, 46 clans are recognized by the Buganda kingdom. Clans in Buganda are named after their adopted totems. The primary totem is called omuziro, while the secondary totem is referred to as akabiro. Eating one's own totem is considered taboo among clan members. The Abalangira is the royal clan of Buganda, with men known as abalangira and women as abambejja. The royal clan, also called olulyo, lacks a totem, distinguishing it from other clans. It traces its paternal lineage back to Kintu, the first Muganda and Kabaka of Buganda. Each clan has unique names and mottos (omubala). The Butiiko Clan's motto, for instance, is 'Weekirikite, Ggunju ajja gabolokota teggwa nte'. Similarly, the Kayozi clan's secondary totem is Nsombabyama, with their clan head sitting at Kyango mawokota. In Uganda, there are many different clans, each with its own unique identity and traditions. The clans are often identified by their primary totem, which represents their connection to nature and their place in society. There are 25 clans listed in total, each with its own clan head, who is responsible for guiding the clan and making important decisions. Some of the clans have additional secondary totems that represent different aspects of their identity or cultural practices. The clans also have unique mottos, which reflect their values and goals. These mottos often emphasize the importance of unity, cooperation, and mutual respect among clan members. The clans are situated at various locations such as Bukibondwe, Bugabo Buvuma, Bulemeezi, Mulema, Buddu, Mbazzi, and Kyaggwe. Their clan mottos (omubala) include phrases like "Kibondwe yeddira Nsuma, Kibondwe atambula," "Mayengo tutu," and "Omusajja Kalamazi ne jjo ndiramaga."
