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Singapore introduced its Driver Improvement Points System (DIPS) in March 1983 to address errant drivers through a reward-punishment approach. This system aims to motivate motorists to adopt better driving habits by offering incentives to erase demerit points and reduce suspension periods. For new motorist license holders, 13 or more accumulated demerit points during their probationary period result in revocation of the license, requiring re-examination. Non-probationary drivers with no prior suspensions accumulate 24 or more demerit points within 24 months, leading to a 12-week suspension for the first offense, and subsequent suspensions increase by 12-18 weeks each time. License holders can reduce their suspension periods by completing a retraining course, except for third and subsequent offenses. During suspension periods, photocard driving licenses must be surrendered; those who complete the retraining course have their licenses returned after the reduced suspension period ends. Drivers who accumulate demerit points will receive a letter updating them on their status.
