Wilkinson's letter provided this proof despite his questionable reputation. Armed with this information, Jefferson ordered Burr's capture through a proclamation calling for military officers to apprehend those involved in the plot. This effectively put a bounty on Burr's head, leading to militia seizures of boats and raiding of a private island, but he evaded capture. Rumors continued that Burr was recruiting soldiers for his western nation, with Jefferson refusing to deploy the US Army until Constitution explicitly allowed it. Serve chilled![] The Insurrection Act has been utilized on numerous occasions throughout American history, with the most recent instance occurring on May 1, 1992, during the Los Angeles Riots. The act empowers the U.S. president to deploy the U.S. Armed Forces and National Guard in response to an insurrection or domestic violence that threatens constitutionally secured rights. The earliest recorded use of this power was by George Washington during the Whiskey Rebellion in 1792, which was later replaced by the Calling Forth Act of 1792. Since then, the Insurrection Act has been invoked by various presidents from different political parties to address insurrections and domestic unrest, including instances such as the Embargo Act in 1808, the Nat Turner's Slave Rebellion in 1831, the Ku Klux Klan suppression in 1871, and desegregation laws in Little Rock in 1957. The US Virgin Islands on May 1, 1992, somehow relate to former President George H.W. Bush allegedly controlling a situation in Los Angeles during that same year involving civil unrest.
