When Jacob Batalon, best known for his role as Spider-Man's friend, appears on screen with his easy charm, even mundane scenarios seem pleasurable. However, directors Cohen and Halberg rely too heavily on loud jump scares, diminishing their set pieces' impact. Despite predictability in its jokes, twist, and overall approach, Tarot manages to keep itself from overstaying its welcome or forcing an overly complex message. It's a personality-less horror focused solely on delivering chilling scenes rather than character development or plot complexity. Its modest goal is to scare, and it barely succeeds at that.
