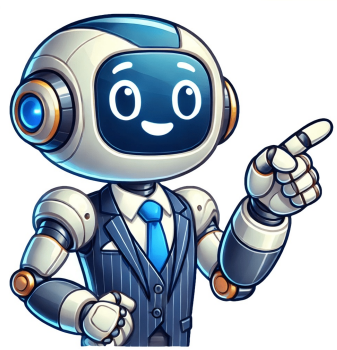


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Planets alignment 2025

This linear appearance explains why planetary alignments often form almost straight lines in the sky. Some might wonder if a "planetary alignment" and a "planetary parade" are interchangeable terms. While "planetary parade" isn't a formal astronomical term, it's colloquially used to describe multiple planets appearing together in one night or several planets located within the same zodiac constellation in astrology. There are various types of planetary alignments based on the participating planets: - A mini alignment involves three planets. - Small alignments consist of four planets. - Large alignments have five or six planets involved. - The term "great" or "full" alignment refers to all the planets in our Solar System, often including Pluto. When two planets are near each other in the sky, it's called a conjunction. However, this isn't yet considered an alignment. For those interested in observing planetary alignments, we've outlined key events for 2025-2026: - August 10: A large morning alignment of six planets. - February 28, 2026: Another large evening alignment involving six planets. - April 18, 2026: A small morning alignment of four planets. - May 12, 2026: A mini evening alignment of three planets. - August 12, 2026: A large morning alignment with seven planets. - November 14, 2026: A small morning alignment of four planets. The night sky offers a fascinating spectacle the movement of planets across the horizon. One notable alignment features five to seven planets aligning in the sky, such as August 10, 2025, where Mercury, Venus, Jupiter, Uranus, Neptune, and Saturn congregate. Upcoming alignments include February 28, 2026, with Mercury, Venus, Neptune, Saturn, Uranus, and Jupiter appearing together in the evening sky, and August 12, 2026, featuring Jupiter, Mercury, Mars, Uranus, Saturn, and Neptune. However, it's essential to note that most of these alignments are not imminent, so they shouldn't be relied upon for excitement. The media often highlights highly anticipated planetary alignments, such as September 8, 2040, when five naked-eye planets Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter, and Saturn will appear together in the sky. The crescent Moon will also be visible between Venus and Saturn. Another notable alignment is March 15, 2080, where six planets, including Uranus, will be visible in the morning sky. Further ahead, the Solar System's planets are predicted to align on May 6, 2492, with all planets gathering on one side of the Sun just before dawn. Additionally, November 7, 2176, and May 19, 2161, will feature similar alignments. Planetary Alignments: A Rare Celestial EventThe outer planets are visible in the sky above you around their oppositions, and you can use the Star Walk 2 app to find all the planets and learn about their visibility conditions. However, it's unlikely that all the planets will align perfectly in space because their orbits aren't on the same plane. Yet, every now and then, they gather closely together around the Sun and appear in the sky simultaneously. The next great planetary alignment will occur on February 3, 2034, when seven planets Venus, Mercury, Jupiter, Mars, Neptune, Uranus, and Saturn will be visible in the sky at the same time. This event is called a planetary parade or alignment of six planets, which will take place around August 10, 2025. During a planetary alignment, some people claim that it causes tsunamis, earthquakes, and other global disasters. However, this is completely false. Alignments don't affect gravity or human life but are rather cool stargazing events. To spot the planets during an alignment, you can use the Star Walk 2 app or wait for the Full Moon to join the scene. The best time to view all seven planets in the Northern Hemisphere will be after sunset on February 28, 2025, at around 8:30 p.m. local time. It's worth noting that not all planets are visible to the naked eye during an alignment. For example, Uranus and Neptune might be too dim to see, while Saturn will be harder to spot due to its position close to the horizon. A good telescope is necessary to catch the full display of all seven planets. Six planets including Mercury, Venus, Uranus, Neptune, Saturn, and Jupiter are set to align in the sky on August 10, 2025. This rare occurrence happens when their different orbital distances and speeds bring them into a cluster on Earth's nightside. The conjunction isn't uncommon but becomes rarer with each planet added to the chain. For instance, every 39.6 years, Mercury, Venus, and Earth align within 3.6 degrees in the sky. However, all eight planets won't be aligned that closely before the sun becomes a red giant. To observe this celestial event, we recommend using online tools like Time and Date or Stellarium to find viewing dates and times based on your location. For mobile users, Sky Tonight is a free app that can help you locate this alignment. With warm summer mornings in the Northern Hemisphere being ideal for planet-watching, it's an excellent opportunity to observe six planets simultaneously. Magnitude 5.7 celestial object visible in Taurus only under perfect dark-sky conditions can be easily spotted with binoculars. In Pisces, locate faint Neptune (mag 7.8) towards the southwestern direction; powerful binoculars are necessary for visibility. Saturn (mag 0.7), with its distinct yellowish glow, is situated near Neptune in Pisces. To confirm whether you're looking at a star or planet, utilize the free Star Walk 2 app, which provides an interactive sky map tailored to your location through augmented reality mode. A nearly Full Moon in Aquarius appears below Saturn and closer to the horizon, fully illuminated and possibly larger than usual, but its brightness may outshine Neptune. The large planetary alignment on August 10, 2025, will be visible in the mornings around this date: begin observing about an hour before sunrise. Certain locations will offer better viewing conditions as the planets rise higher above the horizon; Mercury favors southern latitudes. Note that August 10, 2025 is a median date, and the perfect date to view the alignment may vary depending on your location. Your device's camera lets you match your screen's image of the sky with the real thing. Tap a planet icon to find it in the sky, or use AR mode for an immersive view with a sky map overlaid on your surroundings. The Planet Walk feature helps track planets easily. For a great view, go somewhere with a dark sky and clear horizon, without obstacles like trees or buildings. Make sure you're looking at planets, not stars - they don't twinkle!
