## Bowling league prize fund examples

The writer shares their league's prize list for the Tuesday night season, which they had three options to choose from but ultimately chose this one. The league is divided into two halves with payouts for first and second place in each half. The writer created a spreadsheet to compare different prize lists and found that this one offered better payout percentages for certain places and sections. The prize list shows the amount of money available for each place (1-32) and the percentage of the total prize fund it represents. The writer also notes their personal bowling stats, including their average speed, medium revs, and high scores. Additionally, the writer provides a table showing the prize list divided into thirds, with totals for the top third, middle third, and bottom third. They note that if they were hoping to be in the top 10, List 2 would be the best option, but if they expected to place lower, List 1 (the chosen prize list) would be better. Overall, the writer's post is a combination of their personal bowling experiences and strategic analysis of the different prize lists available. The writer decided to take a cautious approach and chose option that seemed to have the best chance of success in most areas (1-16). They opted for List 1, which offered a higher payout. The prize structure consisted of three lists with different payouts and interest rates, ranging from \$200 to \$600. In addition to the prizes, there was also a team competition with 24 teams using a 7-point system. The top two teams in each half would win \$300, while everyone else would receive around \$19.60 per point. There were also individual game and series prizes, as well as a grand prize of \$1000. The event took place at a high-speed track with an 13-degree axis tilt, and the writer used a right-handed stroker ball. The speed was approximately 14 mph, with medium revs being used. The payout is considered to be around \$60,000. A bowling league was being discussed online. One person mentioned a high-paying league where they got \$19.60 per point, which seemed unusually high to others. They also talked about lineage costs ranging from \$8.50 to \$9.00. Another person shared that their own league had higher payouts but not nearly as much as this one. A 3 or 4-point per night system and a prize fund of at least \$60,000 were brought up. The online discussion mentioned various bowling-related topics such as bowlers' arsenals and different leagues' rules and costs. Given text here The rules of this league shall not conflict with USBC regulations. In situations not covered by league rules, USBC rules will apply. All members present at the meeting constitute a quorum and a simple majority of votes is required to adopt new league rules. The league president can only cast a vote in case of a tie. At the end of the bowling season, the league members must elect new officers such as President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer for the upcoming season. By a majority vote, the league can combine the offices of Secretary and Treasurer. The league will have two 12-week sessions, with a total of 24 weeks of bowling. The first session starts on (list date) and ends on (list date). There are no bowling nights during the holiday season from (list dates). The league meeting takes place on (date) to distribute payoffs and elect new officers for the next season. After completing elections, a three-game series "fun night" will be held. Participants must pay \$6 per game for lane fees plus an additional \$3 sweeper fee. Bowlers who are USBC members of the (name) Bowling Association can participate in teams with one person each. The league charges \$10 per session per bowler, with a \$6 lineage fee, a \$0.50 secretary/treasurer fee, and a \$3.50 prize fund. The secretary/treasurer fees will be paid twice, once at the midpoint of the season and after final averages have been submitted to local B.A. secretaries. Bowlers must provide their lane assignment numbers to be assigned lanes for each session. Drawing for lane assignments happens weekly, with random selections from (list lanes). Practice starts at 6:15 p.m., followed by league bowling at 6:30 p.m. A late arrival may draw a new lane and join the game if five frames are not completed on that pair of lanes. Points will be calculated based on the most pins bowled over a bowler's established average, or the fewest scores in case of a tie. Points will be awarded based on individual POA scores, with the highest score receiving 20 points and decreasing by one point for each subsequent score. This system will be used throughout the season, with bowlers establishing their average after three games and earning points accordingly. In the event of ties, points will be divided equally among tied positions. Prize funds will be determined by dividing total league points into the prize fund, minus special prizes, to determine the value of each point. Each bowler's payout will be based on the number of points earned multiplied by the value-per-point. The bowler with the highest average will be declared champion, while special prizes will be awarded for high average, most improved bowler, and highest POA series/game. League members must bowl at least 48 games to be eligible for these prizes. Pre-bowling will not be allowed, but makeup games (post-bowling) are also disallowed. Bowlers can pre-bowl under certain conditions, including arranging with the host center and bowling separately on each pair of lanes, which must be witnessed by a league officer or official. In case of any controversy or disagreement arising during league play, all disputes must be put in writing within five days and presented to the league president for resolution. The president will then form a three-member review panel comprising impartial bowlers not involved in the dispute. This panel will thoroughly examine the issue(s) and reach a decision prior to the next scheduled league session. All rulings by the review panel are binding and final, providing a fair and timely outcome for all parties concerned.
