Modern calligraphy pens

For pointed nib calligraphy, I recommend the Moblique (2 in 1) pen holder by Louis Creations. It's an excellent tool that can transform into a straight holder and store your nib. The Nikko G nib is popular for its ease of use and medium flexibility. Sumi ink is also a great value for the price - it's excellent for beginners to experiment with different calligraphy styles. Manuscript has a great nib pen set for those who want it all in one package. They offer a straight pen holder with pointed nibs, which includes five different flexible nibs and a small bottle of black ink. This can be a more expensive option but considering you won't need two separate nib holders makes it worth it. Brush pens are a great alternative for those who want to try brush lettering or calligraphy. There's a lot of variety out there, with different sizes, nib flexibilities, and ink flows available.
